## Cetters TO THE EDITOR

Editor, The Journal: I do object to the overheated and somewhat distorted way Carter and Company are marketing the treaty.

First, they launch heir campaign long before the text is available, thereby giving them a chance to dominate the debate by their explanation of objectives and principles, minus discussion of arrangements to attain those objectives and apply those principles.

Secondly, I cannot buy the argument that the military importance of the Canal has diminished significantly because we now have a 'twoocean Navy' and because large carriers and supertankers cannot go through it.

We don't have a 'twoocean Navy' -what we have is one Navy split between two oceans. I am surprised that even the Carter Crowd would strain the truth this badly. Moreover, those large carriers are few in number and the need for the Canal for the rest of the Navy in time of war in both oceans is great indeed.

You and I differ on the wisdom of turning over the Zone to Panamanian jurisdiction. I see this as the way to defuse tension realistically, feeling that this is the principal issue that inflames Panamanian passions. Doing so alters our outmoded nial stance for whatever value that will bring in the amorphous court of world opinion.

However, once we agreed to grant the Panamanians jurisdiction over the Zone, we need not have been as generous and forthcoming as I fear the text of the treaty will show us to have been. For example, why so much compensation on top of the tremendous physical plant they get in the Canal property and on top of the big input to their economy through our presence-some

\$165 million a year....? The angry roars of disapproval are not going to fade away. Americans in all walks of life can recognize grandstanding press agentry of the type the Carter Crowd is conducting in an effort to sell to the Senate a bill of goods the people of this country won't buy. There may be enough suckers in the Senate to go for this garbage. But those who vote for this or any other treaty with Panama are guaranteeing their defeat when they come up for reelection.

Americans are not going to sit still for amputation of a part of the United States to appease a mouse that roars.

Wilton Carey Jackson of Nyssa has spent his life working as an industrial and civic leader. He

He was born Sept. 12, 1920, in a teacherage in Little River, Tex. He studied at Texas Military College and Mississippi State College before joining the U.S. Air Force in 1943.

From 1943-45 Jackson served in the European Theater with the 17th Bomb Group. He was disharged as a captain, having received the Air Medal with 11 bronze oak leaf clusters, the Distinguished Flying Cross. Croix de Guerre avec palm, Presidential Citation oak leaf cluster. European Theater ribbon and three Bronze

He married his wife Margery in 1945 and shortly thereafer quit his job as a shoe clerk for business career in manufacturing and selling

In 1948 he bought the Ideal Gas store in Nosea. As president of Ideal Gas, Inc., he directed the companies growth from 100 customers in 1948 to 12 plants serving more than 6,000 retail customers throughout parts of Idaho, Oregon, Washington and Montana.

He engineered and patented a liquified petroleun gas weed control burner that was instrumental in the control of noxious weeds throughout the United States and several foreign coun-

Jackson founded Propane Supply, Inc., a wholesale distributor of natural gas liquids, in 1963. This firm serves many industrial and reside accounts throughout the northern tier of states from coast to coast with its product imported from Canada.

He was president of the Founders Service Or-ganization of the Malheur Memorial Hospital in 1951, Toestmasters Club in 1952, Idaho Liquifirst Gas Association in 1945, Nyssa Chamber of Commerce in 1956-57, Nyssa Chapter of Ameri-can Field Service 1967-79 and Nyssa Industries 1969 to date. He was a trustee of the Nyssa School Board 1958-63 and chairman of the board in 1963, district director of National Liquified Petroleum Gas Association from 1967 to date, and is now a member of that association's

political action committee.

Jackson, with eight children, has been active in Boy Scouts and Girl Scouts, and was fondly known as Mr. Girl Scout by the Nyssa Cadettes. He received a Bicentennial Salute from the Small Business Administration in 1976.

"Jackson's really energetic and a good busi-nessman," said Merv Hutchinson, controller of Propane Supply, Inc., in which Jackson sold his interests in July. "He's concerned about the betterment of our community.


