PTSA IN ACTION

Work and The American Family

Over the course of the twentieth century, noteworthy changes have occurred in the timing of major family events like marriage, birth and death. Women are now having their first child later, spacing their children closer together, and having

fewer of them. There is generally a 20-year period between flight of the last offspring and the death of one of the parents. As a result, according to sociologist Mary Jo Bane, couples in the future will spend 18 percent of their married lives raising young children, a century ago that figure was 54 percent.

About 40% of all marriages are currently ending in divorce; 30-40% of the widowed elderly live with at least one relative. In short, modern American families are in the process of "becoming."

What, then, is a family? Neither in this country nor elsewhere does membership in a family necessarily depend on living together. The most common family

form outside the industrial west is the "extended family," as contrasted with the more common American "nuclear family." "The nuclear family is limited to a married couple and its children."

Each type of family, nuclear and extended, has its advantages and casts. Ours—the nuclear family—gives us independence, mobility and privacy. To get these, we tend to trade off sociability, daily help with the child care and household tasks and nearby relatives with whom to pool resources when times are hard. The high value we place on independence also increases the pressure to be successful in the labor market.

Time, Work, and Families. One mother responded to

the question, "Did it change you to become a parent?" as follows: "I don't know whether it changed me—it brought things to light that I never knew were there, maybe, tremendous sense of responsibility, an awful sense of time, none of it, and continuous care."

We distinguish, between work time and free time. In the past people had a more "task-oriented" notion of time and its use. They plowed until the field was done or it was too dark to see. Work and leisure were more closely woven together than they are in today's "clock-oriented" society.

"The rhythms of women's work in the home are not wholly attuned to the measurement of the clock," for

women in the present as well as in the past. Both parents find it difficult to separate the recreational from the work aspects of child care. So the family, unlike the work place, is often a place where work and play remain closely integrated.
