Laura Ure Tells of D.C. Trip

Question: How about your trip?

Answer: We left Boise airport, Tuesday, November 15. We arrived at our hotel, near the capitol that evening, in time to see the Arab riots, staged at the time of Sadat's arrival for his visit with President Carter. We talked to police about it. They said they were worse than any of the riots they had here in the '60's and '70's.

On Wednesday, we went sight seeing.

On Thursday, we visited Al Ulman's office, to check about the testimony the next day. Then we visited the capitol and several buildings of the Smithsonian Institute.

On Friday, Robert, Jim Mathews and the Idaho onion grower testified before the Executive Trade-Tariff Committee of the Diplomatic Corps. They devoted two hours to onions. There were other growers there from Colorado and California.

We did more sight seeing on Friday and Saturday. It was very warm there.

We came home on Sunday. Q. We hear all about a dirty, polluted city, Washington, D. C. What was your impression?

A. This was my second visit. I was there when I was in high school. It is a beautiful city. There are so many cultural and historical things to go to and to see. We went to the Lincoln Center, to a concert, one evening. Another evening we saw Robert Vaughn at the National Theatre in "F.D.R." It was wonderful. He was the only one in the show.

Q. How did Robert and Jim get picked to go?

A. They were picked by the Malheur Onion Growers Association.

Q. What were they supposed to do in Washington?

A. They were sent to tell the U.S. onion grower's problems to this committee.

They were making an appeal to them not to take the tariff off onions shipped from Chili.

Q. Was it easy for them to go talk to the people in government?

A. There has to be some preparation. They talked to Al Ulman. A person from his office helped them about the committee. They had to have their testimony all figured out and typed up, with 20 copies of each one's testimony. These copies had to be sent in ten days or more ahead to the committee. One the day they testified, they were treated with interest and respect. There was a time limit for each one, but they were not hurried.

Q. Do you think individuals can take their problems to the top-can they be heard?

A. I do believe so, personally, I think the letters we write, especially to our elected representatives are very effective.

Jim and Shirley Mathews had a thrill, Sunday morning. They were watching TV in their room and heard that the President and family were attending church in a Baptist Church not far from their hotel. They went down in time to see President Carter, his wife and Amy come out of the church. President Carter put his wife and Amy into the limousine, but he stopped to talk to the people who gathered around. His wife got out of the car and joined him. Jim and Shirley were in the crowd when she walked through, passing very close to them. The President and his family seemed like any other family coming out of church.
