SALARY OF VOLUNTEERS

THE WAR DEPARTMENT CHANGES AN IMPORTANT DECISION.

Soldiers Paid by State While Awaiting Muster-in to Be Also Paid by the Government.

Gov. T. T. Geer yesterday received a long message from the war department, relative to the pay of the volunteers during the time they were awaiting muster-in. Following is the telegram in full, as given out by the executive department yesterday:

Governor of Oregon:—The following decision was made by the comptroller this date, namely: "In a decision construing a statute, rendered by me on September 30, 1898, a copy of which decision is herewith transmitted, I used the following language:

"For all payments made by the governor to such militiamen, for services rendered by them between the day on which they had their names enrolled for service in the volunteer army, and joined for duty therein, which is the day their pay and allowances shall be deemed to commence, by the United States, under the act of July 7, 1898, and the day they were afterwards accepted into the United States army, deductions should be made by the pay department of the United States from the pay that would be due the soldier if such payments had been made by the governor, in order to prevent a double payment to the soldier, which the law does not contemplate."

"On mature deliberation, I am of the opinion that I was wrong in such holding. No deductions should be made by the pay department from the pay that would be due a soldier under the act of July 7, 1898, on account of any payment that may have been made under the state militia law to him by the governor or state authorities, from the date of his enrollment or joining for duty, to the date of his acceptance into the volunteer army of the United States. The governor or state authorities make this payment to him as a state soldier, and because congress has seen fit, by the act of July 7, 1898, to reimburse the governor of the state for these payments, is not sufficient reason for the government, by indirection, to take away from the soldier what had been paid him by the state, and no sufficient reason why the act of July 7, 1898,

should be evaded. Hence, I hold that no stoppage or deduction should be made in a soldier's pay, on account of any payments made him by the governor of a state, or state authorities, as a militiaman, before his acceptance into the volunteer army of the United States, and said decision is modified as herein set forth."

This for your information. By order of the secretary of war. (Signed) H. C. Corbin, adjutant-general. Adjutant-General B. B. Tuttle said yesterday that this order would in no wise effect the Oregon volunteers, or the state, as the state did not pay the men who enlisted, those men only who were rejected being paid for their time while in camp awaiting examination.

Knight speaking the words that bound together the two young people's lives, the reverend gentleman having performed the same ceremony for Judge and Mrs. Terrell many years ago. DEATH IN AN AVALANCHE.

More Victims of the Treacherous Alaska Snowslide.

The news of more victims of the treacherous snowslides in the Alaska mountains, last December, is daily brought to light.

Mrs. John McLeod, now residing near Aumsville, in this county, has just received the intelligence of the death of her oldest brother, Emory Warren, in the far North. Mr. Warren and a friend left Lake Linderman on December 5th to go over the mountains, on business, promising to be back in four days. As they did not return Mrs. Warren, who had accompanied her husband from Virginia to the gold fields, sent some neighbors to learn what had happened, and on December 13th the bodies of the men were found deeply buried in the snow.

The men were on their way back to camp when the slide occurred, and had evidently camped at the foot of the mountain, and the avalanche must have occurred in the night, while the men were sleeping. Mr. Warren was a man of sterling worth, and his death is a cruel blow to his wife and family, and a large circle of friends.

ATTORNEYS PROTEST.

Text of a Remonstrance Now Being Circulated in Salem.

The following remonstrance is now being circulated in this city, and the names already signed to the same show conclusively the feeling of the bar of Salem; it is published by request:

To the Legislative Assembly of the State of Oregon—Gentlemen:

"We, the undersigned, attorneys of the City of Salem, hereby protest against the passage of Senator Adams' bill repealing the act of 1893, creating the office of additional judge for the Third judicial district. The legal business of this district has largely increased in recent years and indications are of still greater increase in the near future. The district now has (as shown by the recent vote for secretary of state) a larger population by over 8000 than any other district in the state, the next largest being the Fourth district, and that has four circuit judges. The only way that one judge could do the business of the district at all would be to revert to the running of referee courts, which are both expensive and unsatisfactory. An additional term of court each year was granted Tillamook county by the recent special session of your honorable body, and it cannot be long until Polk county and also Yamhill county will be wanting three terms of court each year, instead of two terms, as at present. Experience has shown that courts to do full justice to the weighty matters that come before them should not be hurried, but should have time for the careful and deliberate consideration of the many complex questions that arise. FORTIETH ANNIVERSARY

OF OREGON'S BIRTH AS A STATE TO BE CELEBRATED.

Legislators Arranging for a Proper Commemoration of the Event—Speakers Secured.

The fortieth anniversary of the admission of the state of Oregon to the Union will be fittingly observed by the two departments of the Oregon legislature, assisted by the residents of the Capital City, on Tuesday, February 14th. The matter of arranging for a proper celebration of the event is in the hands of a joint committee of the present session of the legislature, and is composed of the following named gentlemen: Senators W. Kykendall and John Mitchell, Representatives J. Thornburg Ross, W. L. Cummings and E. W. Graoe. While the arrangements have not been perfected, the committee has made such progress that insures a celebration at once elaborate and appropriate in honor of the fortieth anniversary of Oregon's birth as a state.

In fact the celebration will be of a dual character, inasmuch as February 14th marks the fiftieth anniversary of the extension of United States laws over the then territory of Oregon.

Senator Kykendall, chairman of the legislative committee on arrangements, yesterday afternoon made a verbal report to the senate, giving an outline of the work of the committee and the progress thus far made.

It is proposed to hold the exercises in the legislative chamber of the house. There will be a morning session, for which three addresses have been arranged, one each to be delivered by representatives from the executive, judicial and legislative departments of the state. In the afternoon it is proposed to have an oration delivered, the exercises including vocal music. A banquet will probably be held in the evening.

Senator Kykendall reported that the committee had issued invitations to the following named gentlemen to participate in the exercises: Orator, Hon. Geo. H. Williams; speakers, Hon. Stephen Lowell, of Eastern Oregon, (judicial); Hon. W. P. Lord, of this city, (executive); and Hon. Rufus Mallory, of Portland, (legislative).
