

INTO COUNTY TREASURY

SHERIFF DUBBIN TURNS OVER \$6417.23 IN 1898 TAXES.

Progress in the Collection of the Special Bicycle Tax—110 Receipts Issued Yesterday.

Another installment of 1898 taxes was yesterday turned into the county treasury by Sheriff F. W. Durbin. The payment amounted to \$6,417.23 and is the fourth remittance that has been made to County Treasurer Downing. With the preceding three payments of \$6,256.99, \$7,243.45 and \$11,053.17, yesterday's turn-over makes a grand total of \$30,970.84 that has been applied on the 1898 roll. Deducting that amount from the total tax of \$218,779.44, leaves a balance to be collected of \$187,808.60.

FEES AND EXPENSES.

For Bringing Insane Patients and Convicts from Portland, Go to Multnomah County.

Secretary of State F. I. Dunbar recently asked Attorney-General D. R. Blackburn for his opinion on the matter of the fees and expenses, claimed by the Multnomah county officers for bringing convicts to the penitentiary, and insane patients to the asylum. Following in the question: "Will you please advise me whether or not, in your opinion, I should issue warrants in payment of fees for transporting convicts to the state penitentiary, and patients to the insane asylum, when conveyed by the sheriff of Multnomah county or his deputies, in favor of the sheriff or deputy performing the service, or in favor of the county treasurer of said county?"

The attorney-general in deciding the matter, under the statute (session laws of 1895, pp. 80, 81 and 82) regarding the payment of fees and expenses, to the sheriff of Multnomah county, for conveying prisoners and insane patients to Salem quotes part of section 6, of that law as follows:

"In counties of more than 50,000 inhabitants the fees now paid by the sheriff for transporting and conveying convicts to the state penitentiary and insane and idiotic persons to the state asylum, when conveyed by such sheriff in pursuance of the adjudication of any authorized tribunal of the state, shall be paid into the county treasury of such county, and the sheriff so conveying such convict, insane or idiotic person shall only be entitled to receive the actual expenses incurred by him from such county, when the said expenses shall have been audited and allowed as other claims are audited and allowed against the county; and in no case shall the sheriff in such counties

of more than 50,000 inhabitants be allowed to receive any compensation from the state whatever for the transportation or conveying of such convicts, insane or idiotic persons, but all fees now allowed by law and paid by the state for such services shall be paid into the county treasury of such county."

Continuing the attorney-general says: "I am of the opinion that when a convict is conveyed to the penitentiary, or an insane or idiotic person in conveyed to the asylum by the sheriff, or by a deputy sheriff of Multnomah county, you are required by law to draw your warrant for the expenses and transportation for such conveyance and transportation in favor of Multnomah county, and that the sheriff or his deputy must look to the county for his expenses in the matter prescribed by the act of 1895."

A LONG TRIP.—Miss Bertha Von der Green arrived in the city on the overland train last evening from her home in Curry county, at the mouth of the Rogue river. Miss Von der Green had a very round-about and tiresome trip, which lasted just a week. A week ago yesterday she was put into a life-boat at the Port Orford wharf, by means of ropes and transferred from the boat, after its passage out to sea, to the coasting steamer Luella, which proceeded to Tillamook bay, to load lumber at the Truckee mill at Hobsonville. She went from Hobsonville to Garibaldi, where she took passage on the steamer Harrison to Astoria; thence by train to Portland, and on to Salem in the same way. The young lady did not enjoy her ocean voyage as she was fearfully seasick. She comes to work in the Salem woolen mill as a weaver, at which trade she has been employed for three years in the Bandon, Coos county, mill. Mr. Wilbur, the present superintendent of the Salem Mill, formerly held the same position in the factory at Bandon, and Miss Von der Green came upon recommendation and notice from him.

AN ACCIDENT.—Yesterday afternoon, Robert Henderson, pressman in the Statesman job printing office, met with an accident that will oblige him to abandon his position for several days. While working about the job press his right hand was caught in the ink rollers and, before the machinery could be stopped, his arm had been drawn in and caught between two roller cog-wheels and the press bed, very severely lacerating the fleshy part of the arm. The ugly and painful wound was promptly dressed and the young man made comfortable. It was almost miraculous that he escaped without the fracture of one, if not both of the bones in the forearm. Mr. Henderson will go to McMinnville today to remain with relatives until able to resume work. The accident, though not of a serious character, is much regretted by the faithful and ambitious young workman because of the enforced idleness it entails.

HOME ON A VACATION.—Miss Kittie Harbord, who spent the past nine months in Philadelphia attending the Philadelphia Institute of Pharmacy, returned home on last night's overland train, to spend the summer vacation in "Old Webfoot." Miss Harbord enjoyed her work very much, and when the institute closed on March 8th, bringing her first year's work to a close she passed a very satisfactory examination. She visited relatives at Burlington, Illinois, and Council Grove, Kansas, before returning to Salem, but of all places visited Miss Harbord holds Salem in the highest estimation. She will remain in this city until next September, when she will again return to Philadelphia, to take up her work in the college, and she hopes to complete the course in another two years.

Munkers estate, in which they have a one-twenty-second interest, was allowed.

A. B. HAMMOND'S WORK

THE MONTANA CAPITALIST IS AN IMPORTANT MAN FOR OREGON.

Full of Ambition and Having an Iron Endurance He Will Do Great Good.

(From Daily April 25th.)

One of the greatest hustlers of the Northwest is A. B. Hammond, principal owner of the Oregon Central & Eastern, organizer of the railroad from Astoria to Portland and from the Gateway City to Seaside, promoter of the cannery combine on the Columbia river, and connected with many other schemes for the development of Oregon's resources—more especially the northwestern, central and southeastern portions thereof.

Mr. Hammond is growing to be an important factor in the business life of this state, and if he meets with no reverses his word will some day pass for law with a very large body of men in Oregon and adjoining territory. The people down at Astoria are proud of Mr. Hammond and his achievements. They say the combine of the canneries, which he succeeded in effecting, is proving beneficial to the fishermen and other workmen, and they think it will result in good to the fishing industry in many other ways. They hint slyly to the fact, too, that this was a smooth scheme to get control of nearly all the valuable waterfront at Astoria, a matter of no small importance to a railroad man as ambitious as Mr. Hammond seems to be. To say nothing of his associates and backers. What has been secured as a mere incidental may in time be worth millions, actually and strategically; and Mr. Hammond is doing something with his properties. He is not going to let them lie and rot or be idle and eat their heads off in taxes, etc. He has reduced the running time of his trains between Portland and Astoria to three and a half hours, and he expects to bring it down to three hours for the summer travel. This is very good, considering that the distance is a hundred miles, and that it is a new roadbed. It was a long time before a good gravel pit could be found for ballast for the roadbed. But one was developed last fall and since that time thousands of loads of it have been hauled onto the road, making one of the most solid and reliable grades on the coast.

In connection with the summer travel, it may be mentioned that Mr. Hammond has also not been idle in regard to his interests at Yaquina bay. He has made arrangements for the running of two sleeping cars from Portland every Saturday night during the summer. They will be hitched on to the overland Southern Pacific train, and switched onto the O. C. & E. tracks at Albany. The passengers will wake up in Yaquina City, going through without a change. The return will be made on Saturday night. The round trip rate will probably be made about \$6 from Portland and \$5 from Salem, including the two nights on the sleeper. This will help the Yaquina bay country a great deal. It will make the liveliest summer season ever experienced over there.

There is a rumor that Mr. Hammond and his associates are to build a big sawmill at or near Astoria, and that they are to extend the railroad from Seaside into the tall timber of the Nehalem region to secure an abundant and cheap supply of logs. There are great possibilities, looking to the future, in connection with the coal fields of the Nehalem, not to mention the extension to Tillamook bay, around which cluster various rich resources, mostly in an undeveloped state. In the not distant future, probably this road will connect with the O. C. & E., running through the Grand Ronde pass and Salem, and into the vast empire of Southeastern Oregon, and on to transcontinental connection. This is the natural and logical goal of all these varied enterprises. Something may, of course, depend upon the continuation of the Yaquina harbor improvement, but the prospects for this are more brighter. And then there are steamer connections with the Yaquina road and the Astoria road to be considered, touching at various coast ports and running to San Francisco.

Altogether, Mr. Hammond finds himself a very busy man. So much so, that he has not time to go to Montana, where his ventures need his attention; so that, during the past few weeks, two of his managers and business associates have come to the coast to consult with him. One of these was at Yaquina when the Willamette valley representatives presented their case to the board of government engineers, on Friday last. This gentleman has charge of an enterprise, owned largely by Mr. Hammond, for making power on the Atlantic slope and selling it on the Pacific slope! The reader will find this easier of belief when he is told that it is in Montana, near the summit of the Rocky Mountains. They make the power with the aid of the power from a stream that finds its way to the Mississippi and the Gulf of Mexico, and they deliver and sell it in the city of Butte. Just now they are adding to their facilities in some way.

What sort of a man is this great hustler, Mr. Hammond? As quiet a gentleman as you would meet in a day's travel. Probably weighing 170 pounds, wearing a beard slightly tinged with gray; but in the very prime of life. High forehead and prominent chin—a Napoleon face. The writer believes the secret of Mr. Hammond's success—or the two secrets—is his iron endurance under hard work, and his nerve; that is, his steady nerve. He does not allow himself to be discouraged or to get excited in the face of difficulties. He is a Joe Simon in this phase of his nature. Cool under the greatest difficulties. Working to plans and as unswerving as the gaze of the sphinx. Oregon will do well to watch the career of this man of business. He has caught the spark of ambition in the electric climate of Montana, and he will blit this to steady old Oregon.
