

TWO DECREES RENDERED.

Circuit Judge Tolse Settles a Dispute Over a Gravel Bar—Foreclosure Suit.

Judge R. P. Tolse, of department No. 2, Marion county circuit court, yesterday rendered two decrees, in the following cases, to-wit: D. S. Bonney, vs. D. S. Bentley and D. F. Wagner, and T. T. Geer, et al., vs. John G. Wright. The case of Bonney vs. Bentley and Wagner, resulted from a dispute as to the title to an island. The island in question is located in the Willamette river about a mile above Salem and is considered chiefly valuable for its sand and gravel deposits. It appears from the records that about ten years ago the state sold the island, consisting of about seventeen acres, to G. B. Wagner Sr., as swamp land. In 1890 Mr. Wagner mortgaged the island for \$200 to B. S. Bonney, of Woodburn. Soon after this Mr. Wagner died and the United States government decided that the island was not swamp land and it was allowed to be selected as state of Oregon school land, and as such was sold to George D. Goodhue. To make his title good, Mr. Goodhue induced the Wagner heirs to quit-claim deed to him their rights. He then sold the island to the Salem Improvement Co., and it was by that company transferred to D. S. Bentley & Co. In the meantime the state land board had decided that the Wagner heirs had been unjustly deprived of their rights and so made it deed to Mr. Goodhue convey to him five-ninths only of the island, which fraction he conveyed to the Salem Improvement Co. About two months ago, B. S. Bonney, through his attorney, E. P. Morcum, of Woodburn, began suit to foreclose the old Wagner mortgage for \$200 and interest, etc. D. S. Bentley & Co., through their attorneys—Bonham, Jeffrey & Martin—replied that Wagner never legally owned the island. Judge Tolse's decree grants to D. S. Bentley & Co. the rights asked for by their attorneys. It appears from the records that D. S. Bentley and D. F. Wagner, not "Wagner," now own the island jointly.

In the foreclosure suit of T. T. Geer, et al., representing the state board of school land commissioners, vs. J. G. Wright, a decree was rendered as prayed for in the complaint. Judgment for about \$2500 was asked and the foreclosure of the mortgage on the Commercial street store building.

TO FRUIT GROWERS.

Address Issued by the President of the State Board of Horticulture.

Portland, Oregon, May 12.—Editor Portland: The season is at hand for the cultivation of and caring for our fruit trees this summer. The small crop likely to be gathered this fall, owing to the unseasonable climatic conditions, will have a tendency to cause many growers to neglect their trees when they need the utmost care and nursing. It is very human to do our utmost when everything is flourishing, and profits apparently large, to force matters; and equally human to drop everything when the reverse is the case. In several of the reports issued through the press and leaflets by the United States weather bureau, it is stated that the unseasonable cold wave in February had done little or no damage. These reports are, no doubt, compiled from the statements received from local observers and correspondents throughout the state, and coming from such a source and high authority as the United States weather bureau, are presumed to be correct and reliable, and are very naturally believed by the fruit-growers. Advice received at this office, however, from practical fruit-growers and members of this board from the various districts, are of a different nature, and the damage done is becoming more and more apparent every day, especially in the middle Willamette valley and parts of Eastern Oregon; the Umpqua and Rogue river valleys escaped without injury. We know now that thousands of young fruit trees have been killed on lands not adapted to fruit raising, and thousands of others planted on more favorable land have been seriously injured, and if neglected many will either die or become permanently crippled, and such trees need our utmost care right now. The con-

tinued cold rain, which makes the fruit drop, naturally tends to discouragement, and in addition, neglect of the orchard will invite fungus diseases and insect pests, and for these reasons alone the spray pump must be kept going, regardless of any crop or no crop. We would therefore urge most earnestly upon owners of injured or fruitless trees, not to become discouraged, but to give their trees extra care, by pruning off injured limbs, spraying, and most thorough cultivation of the soil, for they need it much more right now than if in healthy condition. Good result is certain to follow by the fruit some of these trees may yet bear this year being larger and finer, and by reason of this extra care such trees will start with renewed vigor and reward their owners for this additional work with an abundant crop the coming year. Reverses are met with in all walks of life—the merchant, the banker, the artisan and the grain farmer all share alike in off years, so to speak; why should the fruit-grower be exempt even in this most favored state of ours? Oregon fruits are finding favor in many old markets, and with the new markets opening up to us, the demand is certainly increasing, but this demand is only for first-class fruit, and such fruit cannot be grown on neglected and diseased trees. The up-to-date fruit-grower will give his best thoughts, care and attention to his trees at such a time as the present, is sure to win in the end, by abundant crops and remunerative prices; hence we would say to all orchardists: Don't despair, don't get discouraged, but keep on right along as if we expected a most bountiful harvest, and good results are certain to follow. OREGON SHAD.—Many Salemites, not being acquainted with the member of the fish family, called shad, hesitate about purchasing that fish, fearing they may not get a bargain. Shad is comparatively a new-comer in the local market. He is a native of the Atlantic ocean and was brought to this state and planted in the Columbia river, and is considered one of the best food fishes. At this season of the year they are to be caught in great quantities. Though a salt-water fish, every spring they ascend the river streams to spawn. There are three species of shad and they are found on the coast of Great Britain, and other European shores, great quantities being captured annually in the Nile. Those caught on the Atlantic coast, and especially in the Nile, are a very coarse-meat fish, the Pacific coast variety being a much better food fish. Although they have been on this coast but about three years, they are now quite plentiful. In the early part of the season the local market is supplied from California, but the fish caught there are inferior in quality to the Columbia river shad. At the present time the market is being supplied from Portland. The first supply from California, retailed at 15 cents per pound, but the fish is now being sold for 6 cents in the Salem market.

THE MUTE SCHOOL.—The commencement exercises at the deaf-mute school, yesterday afternoon, brought out a large number of friends of the pupils. The program, as published in Sunday morning's Statesman, was carried out and several interesting exercises were held. Four of the pupils were graduated, as follows: Daisy McFarland, of Lane county; Ella Bales, of Multnomah county; Katharine Chapman, of Josephine county, and Zephra Harper, of Multnomah county. A most interesting and enjoyable afternoon was spent by the members of the school and the visitors. Among the latter were State Superintendent and Mrs. J. H. Ackerman and Miss Lillian Ackerman, of Salem, and Mrs. H. E. Bickers of the reform school. Today a number of children leave for their homes and the remainder will depart tomorrow, to spend their vacations with their relatives.

FOR A DIVORCE.—Wallula A. Laughhead, through her attorney, W. A. Moore, yesterday instituted in the circuit court, divorce proceedings against Carlisle H. Laughhead to whom she was married in this county on March 5, 1882. Plaintiff alleged that defendant willfully deserted her April 30, 1888. In addition to asking for the dissolution of the marriage contract, plaintiff asks for the custody of their children—William, aged 16, and Florence, aged 14—whom she has supported since being deserted by her husband; that the court award judgment against the defendant for a reasonable sum for the support of her children and for the usual costs and disbursements.

MILITIA ENCAMPMENT.—The Oregon National Guard will hold an encampment during the month of July, beginning about the 10th and continuing ten days, and Salem has an opportunity to secure this encampment for the fair grounds, if efforts are made, with this end in view. Other towns in the valley are anxious to secure this coveted prize and a prize it is, for it will bring many visitors to this city. General C. F. Beebe will be in Salem today to look into the matter, and it is to be hoped that the Capital City will make efforts toward having the fair grounds chosen for the encampment.

HOPS CONSIGNED.—Ben F. Shepard, of Gervais has consigned the 1899 crop of hops from an 18-acre yard to Adolph Wolf and Son, of Silverton. Six cents per pound is to be advanced for harvesting purposes on September 1st.

SOUTHERN OREGON FAIR WANTS AN APPROPRIATION.

The Decision of Attorney General Blackburn Is That the Society Has No Valid Claim.

(From Daily May 16th.)

Upon the request of Secretary of State F. I. Dunbar, the attorney general, D. R. Blackburn, has prepared an opinion regarding the payment to the Second Southern Oregon District Agricultural society, of the appropriation of \$4,934.30, made by the legislature at its last session for the relief of the Second Oregon District Agricultural society. The text of the decision, which was given to the public yesterday, is as follows:

"Your favor of the 12th inst., in which you ask me: 'Which board of commissioners—the Second Southern Oregon District Agricultural Society or the Second Eastern Oregon District Agricultural Society—is entitled to a warrant for the appropriation for the relief of the Second Oregon District Agricultural Society, of \$4,934.30,' has been received.

"The appropriation referred to is found on page 243 of the session laws of 1899, and is part of the act entitled 'An act to appropriate money for the payment of certain specified claims against the state of Oregon.' It reads as follows: 'For the relief of the Second Oregon District Agricultural Society, \$4,934.30.'

"The Second Eastern Oregon District Agricultural Society was created and organized under and by virtue of the provisions of an act of the legislature at the regular session of 1899. (Hill's Ann. Laws, p. 1820.) And it is specially provided in and by said act, (p. 1822) that the state shall in no event be liable for any premium awarded or debt created by said board, or any society, under its control beyond the amount annually appropriated by this act, and the sum of \$1500 was appropriated annually for said society. The said society, and any and all persons dealing with it had full notice and knowledge of the provisions of said act, and all those who dealt with the society, on a credit, did so at their peril, well knowing that the state was not liable for any of its indebtedness beyond the amount of its annual appropriation, and that they must look to the society, and not to the state, for payment out of the annual appropriation.

"The Second Southern Oregon District Agricultural society was created by an act of the legislative assembly in 1893 (Session Laws of 1893, page 113). The sum of \$600 was appropriated to be paid annually to carry out the provisions of said act. No provision was inserted in this act to the effect that the state should not be liable for any indebtedness of said society beyond the amount appropriated, but, without this proviso, the state is not liable, and if the society incurs any indebtedness, the state ought not to pay it. The state is, therefore, not liable for any indebtedness created by either of these societies. The original appropriations in their interests were matters of favor and not of right, and the expenditures of these organizations, as well as all others, should be limited to the amount of income.

"But a demand has been made on you by the Second Southern Oregon District Agricultural society for a warrant in its favor for the amount appropriated in 1899, viz: \$4,934.30. There was, as I am informed, no application made by said society to the legislature in 1899 for any pecuniary relief and there is nothing in the records of said legislative assembly to show that the said society needed or was entitled, *ex gratia*, to any appropriation for the payment of any indebtedness.

"This is a special relief appropriation, and it now appears from said appropriation bill, or otherwise, that said Second Southern Oregon District Agricultural society has any right to demand of you a warrant for said sum of money, or that it is entitled to receive the same or any part thereof and authorized to receipt therefor.

"It is my opinion that you are not authorized to comply with the demand made, and that you have no legal right to issue in favor of said Second Southern Oregon District Agricultural Society, a warrant for the amount of said appropriation, or any part thereof.

"The other district, not having applied for the fund, I have not passed upon that portion of your question."
