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ONE ACTION TRIED

BUSINESS IS SLACK IN JUDGE BURNETT'S DEPARTMENT.

Cost of the June Term of the Circuit Court Is Light—Nearly All Jurors Discharged.

(From Daily, June 15th.)

In Judge Burnett's department of the state circuit court yesterday, the major portion of the business requiring the attention of the court at this time, was adjudicated. At the convening of the court, yesterday morning, the case of J. R. White, plaintiff, vs. B. P. Taylor, defendant, an action for money, was called, and a jury empaneled, consisting of the following named gentlemen:

A. E. Linn, A. T. Wain, T. F. Walker, L. J. Priest, Elwood Small, Henry Gerwig, Charles Long, J. H. Mann, Ellis Stevens, S. R. Scott, J. B. Settlemier, E. A. Stanton.

The action was brought by the plaintiff for the purpose of recovering the amount of a commission, alleged to have been earned by the plaintiff, in securing a purchaser for defendant's farm, which claim was disputed by the defendant, Mr. Taylor. Testimony was introduced by both parties, and the case went to the jury soon after 2 o'clock yesterday afternoon. That body retired, and in exactly seven minutes, returned into court and rendered a verdict for the defendant, M. W. Hunt and Tilton Ford appeared for Mr. Taylor, while the interests of the plaintiff were looked after by Sherman Condit & Park.

Judge Burnett, after receiving the verdict of the jury, discharged all the jurors from further attendance upon the court, except A. T. Wain and Ed. G. Patterson, who are retained for a day or two, and may be used as a nucleus for a jury, in case any of the cases still remaining on the docket, should be tried before a jury.

This term of the court has been one of the cheapest Marion county has ever experienced. The grand jury was only in session two days, and cost the county, for the term, but \$41 for mileage and per diem of the members of the grand jury, the number of miles traveled by each being given in the following, and the compensation including pay for the two days served.

TWO CASES TRIED

WORK OF THE STATE CIRCUIT COURT YESTERDAY.

Grand Jury Found Not True Bills in All Cases Examined, and Was Discharged.

(From Daily June 14th.)

When Judge Burnett opened department No. 1, of the state circuit court for Marion county yesterday, the case for the Bauer-Schwitzer Hop & Malt Co. was called for trial, the following named jurors being selected to hear the evidence.

J. M. Lawrence, Ed. G. Patterson, A. E. Linn, Elwood Small, Chas. Long, A. T. Wain, H. S. Belle, D. J. Leightner, J. B. Settlemier, H. Boaster, M. Quinn, T. F. Walker.

After a portion of the testimony had gone to the jury, the plaintiff filed a motion for a nonsuit and, upon agreement made with the defense, was allowed to withdraw all documents annexed to the depositions of witnesses residing in California, substituting copies for the original documents. The motion was allowed and the case closed.

The next case called for hearing before a jury was the action in which Fred Hurst was plaintiff and Fred Achilles defendant; the action was begun before Justice of the Peace H. A. Johnson, and was brought to recover damages for the amount of taxes due on certain property transferred by defendant to plaintiff, and which the defendant, after agreeing to pay them, had neglected to settle. In the justice court the plaintiff recovered judgment, but the defense appealed to the circuit court. Here the case went before the following named jurors, the hearing beginning at about 2 p. m. yesterday:

Ed G. Patterson, George B. Miller, T. F. Walker, J. B. Settlemier, Henry Gerwig, J. H. Mann, Ellis Stevens, Chas. Long, Elwood Small, S. R. Scott, George Fendrich, E. A. Stanton.

At 3:15 the case was submitted, and at 4 o'clock the jury submitted a verdict for the plaintiff in the sum of \$7.16.

The case of W. E. Mitchell, plaintiff, vs. the Oregon Woman's Flax Fibre Association, an action for money which had been referred to a referee, came up on the report of the referee, and upon motion of the plaintiff, the report was confirmed, the motion of the defense, to set aside the referee's report being overruled. The plaintiff, according to the report of the referee, received judgment for \$470.74, and for costs and disbursements, with an order to sell attached property. Judge B. F. Bonham, representing the defendants, gave notice of an appeal to the supreme court, and the case will doubtless go there for final adjudication.

During the early part of the afternoon, the grand jury returned two not true bills, and about 3 o'clock that body again came into court and filed three more not true bills, and Foreman J. C. Siegmund reported that the grand jury had finished its labors. Judge Burnett promptly discharged the grand jury, and excoored the members from further attendance upon the court at this term. The men, whose cases were investigated by the grand jury, and against whom not true bills were brought in, are:

G. S. Andrews, charged with the larceny of prunes, valued at \$200.

James Kirkwood, rape.

John Yates, assault with a dangerous weapon.

Wm. Cody, charged with stealing a bicycle.

H. Peterson, assault with a dangerous weapon.

The last two named men were in jail, and were ordered discharged by Judge Burnett, while the bondsmen of the other three were released.

In department No. 1, of the state circuit court for Marion county, yesterday, a new action was filed in which C. F. Yergen, J. F. Yergen, Elizabeth Lindsay, W. A. Yergen, T. H. Yergen, C. A. Yergen and E. G. Yergen are plaintiffs, and John F. Markley is defendant. The plaintiffs allege that the defendant, on January 16, 1899, tore down and destroyed about eight-five rods of fence on property belonging to the plaintiffs, and also that he cut down sixty-five hop guy posts and tore down the hop wires in a hop yard on the same premises. The plaintiffs allege they are damaged in the sum of \$144.10, and ask for a judgment for

that amount and for their costs and disbursements. W. T. Slater and W. M. Kaiser are the attorneys for the plaintiffs.

A NOTED RACE.

To Be Run at the State Fair Ground Next Saturday Afternoon.

An interesting horse race will come off at the fair grounds at 2 o'clock Saturday afternoon, of this week, between Belle Flynn and Pat Murphy for a purse of \$500. Belle Flynn is from Spokane and has been wintering at Stayton and Pat Murphy is from Scio. These two horses have had several races and are so evenly matched that it is almost a case of war over them between the two towns named, the horses having scored two days and no race. The people around Scio and Stayton are all very much excited and are coming in large crowds to attend this race, also a great many will come from Independence, McMinnville, Silvertown, Albany, Lebanon, and other towns, and no doubt many Salemites will avail themselves of the opportunity to enjoy a really good trial of speed.

THE BICYCLE PATH

CONSTRUCTION WORK BETWEEN THIS CITY AND BROOKS.

Excellent Progress Made—Cost Will Be Within the Appropriation—Wheels Registered

H. T. Bruce, who has charge of the construction of the bicycle path between this city and Brooks, came into the city last evening from the scene of operations. He reports making excellent progress, and expects to finish the section allotted to him, in a few days. He has now reached the Perkins farm, seven miles north of this city, and his progress will hereafter be rapid. The path, which, during the early portion of its construction did not please many of the wheelmen, appears to be meeting with more favor now, since it is dressed down and settled to such an extent as to make it a good roadway for the wheels. This section of the path, it was estimated, would cost \$200, and how liberal this estimate was is shown by the figures submitted by Mr. Bruce last evening, he having expended for the seven miles of completed path, exclusive of the cost of lumber used in the construction of bridges, \$165. The amount set aside for this section of the path will be amply sufficient to pay for constructing and thoroughly putting in shape the new roadway, and to gravel that portion most exposed to water on account of the wet ground, notably that section of it across Lake Lahish.

John Irwin, of Mehamia, who has charge of the construction work of the Mehamia-Stayton section, reported yesterday that he had nearly three miles of the path completed, and was getting along nicely. He is pushing the work as rapidly as possible, and will soon complete his section.

The surveying party, headed by County Surveyor B. B. Herrick, now at work laying out bicycle path No. 5, between this city and Silvertown, completed the work to the Howell Prairie school house last night, and will reach this city this evening or tomorrow noon.

In the sheriff's office it was announced yesterday that the shipment of bicycle tags, promised by the manufacturers for last Saturday, has not been received yet, nor is it expected by the sheriff before the first of next week. A number of wheelmen appeared during the day and paid the tax on their wheels, as follows:

A FATAL WRECK.

BRITISH SHIP LOST ON COAST OF AUSTRALIA.

Thirty Lives Sacrificed, While Four Men Made Their Escape from the Boiling Surf.

VANCOUVER, B. C., June 14.—Mail advices from Australia give details of the loss of the British ship Loch Sloy and thirty lives, on Kangaroo island, news of which was briefly covered by a cable from Adelaide South Australia, May 8th. The vessel was driven in the dark on the scrubby, and almost uninhabited shore, which blocks the entrance to St. Vincent's gulf. Only one passenger and three sailors, out of the thirty-four souls aboard, succeeded in saving their lives; the rest were lost in the boiling surf. These four survivors wandered for days seeking vainly for help. They lived upon water and the provisions cast ashore from the wrecked ship. When found they were in a pitiable condition. Their clothing consisted of a few rags and a shirt each. The names of the survivors are: William Mitchell, able seaman; Wm. John Simpson, apprentice; Duncan McMillan, able seaman; David Kilpatrick, a passenger.

Mitchell said that the Loch Sloy drifted so close to the rocks that she could not run out again and struck heavily. An enormous sea was running. Mitchell, who is an old seaman, says he never saw anything equal to the sight, even at Cape Horn. This is the third time he has been wrecked.

WORK OF THE YEAR

WILLAMETTE UNIVERSITY BOARD OF TRUSTEES MEETS.

President Hawley's Annual Report—Several Recommendations Made—Graduating Exercises.

(From Daily June 14th.)

The annual meeting of the board of trustees of Willamette University was convened in the president's office yesterday. At 4 o'clock in the afternoon adjournment was taken until 9 a. m. today.

The following members of the board of trustees were present: W. H. Odell, W. C. Hawley, Rev. John Parsons, Rev. T. B. Ford, Rev. M. C. Wire, Rev. S. A. Starr, C. P. Eishop, T. F. Royal, G. P. Litchfield, Scott Bozorth, Dr. J. Reynolds, C. B. Moores, Mrs. Amelia Miller, Rev. G. W. Grannis and J. L. Carter. Rev. D. A. Watters, L. F. Belknap and C. Alderson were visitors of the board.

General W. H. Odell, president of the board, delivered his annual address. It was an excellent and able paper, reviewing the work of the pioneer institution for the past year. It will appear in a subsequent issue of the Statesman.

The board decided to discontinue its property in Walla Walla and referred the matter to the president and secretary of the board.

The financial report of the dean of the College of Music was read and referred to the executive committee.

Revs. S. A. Starr, M. C. Wire and G. W. Grannis were named as a committee to draft resolutions on the death of F. R. Smith, vice-president of the board.

President W. C. Hawley submitted his annual report of the university for the past year. Speaking of the school the report says: "We have had a pleasant and successful year. Our student body has consisted of earnest and excellent young men and women, with whom it has been a pleasure to work. The various colleges report satisfactory progress. The attendance is as follows:

Revs. S. A. Starr, M. C. Wire and T. B. Ford, committee on honorary degrees, recommended that the degree, Doctor of Divinity, be conferred upon Rev. George F. Bovard, of Los Angeles, California, and Rev. S. S. Sulliger, of Olympia, Washington.

The election of officers of the board of trustees resulted in the re-election of every officer, with a single exception—Dr. J. Reynolds being pamed to succeed F. R. Smith, deceased, as vice-president of the board. The officers of the board, as it is now constituted, are as follows: President, W. H. Odell; vice-president, John Reynolds; secretary, Rev. John Parsons; treasurer, A. N. Bush, trustees, J. D. Lee, Bishop Carston, C. B. Moores and F. A. Moore; conference, Rev. John Parsons, Claud Gatch, Rev. M. C. Wire, L. F. Belknap and Rev. D. A. Watters. As in the past the executive committee will consist of the trustees residing in this city.

He was a typical village schoolmaster.
