The estate is appraised at \$4,745.20 consisting of real and personal property in Marion county. Miles Lewis is the administrator of the estate.

In the matter of the estate of Andrew Murphy, deceased, Elisabeth E. Van Weenen yesterday petitioned the probate court for letters of administration, as the executrix of the last will and testament of the deceased, has since died, leaving the estate unadministered, upon. The estate is valued at \$4,600, and Judge Terrell appointed the petitioner, fixing her bond at \$5,100.

HIS INITIAL VISIT

MR. GARRETSON WILL INSPECT POSTOFFICE SITES TOMORROW.

The Government Agent is Infatuated With Oregon and Thinks Salem an Ideal City.

(From Daily June 25th.)

P. S. Garretson, of the government supervising architect's office, who is in the city for the purpose of inspecting the several sites offered for the post-office building, received a large number of callers yesterday.

Mr. Garretson is a very pleasant gentleman to meet, being quite unreserved in his manner and almost entirely void of the formality that usually characterizes men holding such important positions. While he would not express himself in any way respecting any of the several sites offered in this city for the federal building, of the probable choice of the government, Mr. Garretson talked very interestingly of his work.

He has been in the employ of the government for seven years, being connected with the supervising architect's office during that period. His present task is something new to him for heretofore his work has consisted of inside labor and the confinement thereto has kept him in Washington almost constantly. But he was delegated to make this tour of inspection and is combining his official business with pleasure, having ample time in which to perform the task assigned him and he is enjoying the same at his leisure, enjoying a very pleasant and well-earned vacation.

Mr. Garretson is a native of New Jersey and this is his first trip to the coast, having, previous to this time, never been west of the Mississippi. Leaving Washington he inspected sites for public buildings at New Brunswick, New Jersey, and Wilkesbarre, Pennsylvania. The next point visited was Seattle, Washington, where a similar task was performed. Two days were spent in Portland in the transaction of business connected with the new government building being erected in that city, and then he came to this city, which is the last point to be visited at which a public building has been secured.

"I am infatuated with your beautiful country," said Mr. Garretson to a representative of the Statesman when seen at his room at the Willamette yesterday afternoon. "I have found the people of Salem very pleasant, unreserved and hearty in their welcome. You have a rich and grand country that has a great future. I think Salem is a very pretty and attractive city. Yesterday I enjoyed a drive through the city and in Polk county, visiting the hop yards and orchards. The farms in this country are veritable garden spots."

Mr. Garretson will remain in this city until Tuesday morning, when he will go to Roseburg on the morning local. On the following night he will leave Roseburg for San Francisco, where he has some business to attend to concerning the government building that is in course of construction in that city. He will probably remain in the Golden Gate City for about two weeks, seeking rest and recreation, before returning to Washington.

ACTIVITY IN REAL ESTATE TRANSACTIONS.

From the list of January to the 1st of June, 1898, the total value of recorded conveyances of real estate in New York county was \$43,640,000; in the corresponding five months of 1899, terminating June 1st, the stated value of such property sold and conveyed was \$78,765,000, a marked increase. During the first five months of 1899 the value of recorded mortgages upon New York county real estate was \$119,000,000; this year, for the like period, it is \$217,000,000. The new buildings projected and for which detailed plans were filed and approved between the 1st of January and the 1st of June, 1898, was \$30,000,000; for the like period of 1899 it was \$57,600,000. These figures denote a general revival of activity in New York real estate transactions and in building operations. Since the 1st of June there has been an even greater increase compared with a year ago and with previous years, and the existing conditions point to still greater activity in the real estate market in the future.

The condition of the building trades in New York is exceptionally good at present. Except among the iron-workers there are no strikes or lock-outs. Labor troubles are few, wages are steady, business confidence is general, the burden of assessments for improvements has been considerably relaxed, there is no shortage of material for construction, and the established validity of real estate titles in New York and the marked absence of litigation concerning them is a factor of much helpfulness. A recital of these conditions will explain the recent marked activity in real estate transactions and the prospect of further increase.—Sun.
