A FARMER'S AWFUL DEED

Attempted Murder and Suicide.

WIFE AND HER GUEST

Narrowly Escape Death at the Hands of Enraged Husband and Host Near Garfield.

GARFIELD, Wash., July 1.—A horrible tragedy occurred this morning five miles west of this place. A young man named Roby Gragg cut the throats of his wife and a lady guest, and then took a big dose of strychnine and slashed his own throat. At this time all three are alive, but in a critical condition.

Gragg is about 33 years old and lives on the farm of John Bishop. Yesterday, he says, he caught his wife and a neighbor named Fitzgerald in a compromising position, to which act he believed his wife's guest, the lady from Spokane, was an accomplice. Gragg was greatly wrought up by the discovery. He spent a sleepless night with a neighbor, to whom he told his troubles. He said he intended to go to Garfield in the morning, to arrange for a division of his property and a separation from his wife.

About 4 o'clock he set out, stating he would go by way of his home, and change his clothes. On arriving there he asked his wife for his gun; she told him that she had hid it. He then drew out his pocket knife and attacked her. He slashed her throat and face and stabbed her in the abdomen. To escape further injury she feigned death. She may recover.

He then made for the other woman and butchered her up in a frightful manner. Besides repeated thrusts in the neck and throat, he tore her left cheek wide open from ear to mouth, and gave her several stabs in the body. Then, after trying the knife on his own throat, he ran up stairs for his razor, and both women, streaming with blood and in their night clothes, fled to the neighbors. Gragg used the razor on his own throat, almost severing the windpipe. He then took a big dose of poison, which he threw up. The Spokane lady's name is Mrs. Maule Carroll.

THE GOLD LANDS.

MORE KLONDIKERS COME OUT WITH THEIR WEALTH.

Satchels Filled With the Yellow Metal Brought from Dawson—Another Heavy Fire Loss.

SKAGWAY, June 28, via Victoria, July 3.—The revenue cutter McCulloch, with Senator Fairbanks and the members of the joint high commission and party on board, arrived yesterday. Another batch of Klondikers, laden with about \$250,000 in gold dust, arrived last night. The most conspicuous packages were those of Y. W. Haywood, of Vancouver, who had 130 pounds in an old satchel bound with ropes. This dust was taken from Haywood's claim of Hunker Creek. Another package of 127 pounds was tied up in a blanket, and was carried by J. F. Canyon, of Baker City, Oregon.

FIRE IN DAWSON.

Seattle, July 3.—The news of another fire at Dawson, in which sixty miners' cabins were burned with their contents, was brought here today by the steamer Humboldt. The total loss is estimated at \$10,000. The Humboldt had about 150 passengers from the Klondike metropolis.

The Humboldt's passengers had a small amount of gold dust, probably \$50,000 worth. They report that the steamer Dirigo, a few hours behind them, has \$200,000 or \$300,000 on board.

LETTER OF RESIGNATION.

General Summers Will Have It On His Arrival.

(My Associated Press.) Portland, July 3.—R. J. Hendricks, editor of the Salem Statesman, today tendered to the president his resignation as appraiser of merchandise at Portland.

Mr. Hendricks handed to Mrs. O. Summers his letter of resignation, which she will deliver to her husband, General O. Summers, as soon as he returns from the Philippines. General Summers held the office of appraiser when the war broke out, but resigned to lead the Oregon regiment in the Spanish-American war.

Mr. Hendricks was appointed to the vacancy, but he now happens to relinquish the office to General Summers at the latter's discretion. General Summers is given authority by Mr. Hendricks to forward the resignation to President McKinley whenever he desires.

CRITICIZING THE WAR.

An Address to the Public Issued at Buffalo.

Buffalo, July 3.—In a socialist conference today, an address, read by Prof. Herron, criticizing the Philippine policy and the alleged tendency to autocracy, was adopted, but the vote was subsequently reconsidered after a number of addresses, denouncing such action. Pandeemonium ensued as motion after motion followed, and speaker after speaker was heard or suppressed. Finally the address to the public was taken up serially. From time to time some delegate would arise in a spirit of desperation, trying to protest against the language of the address. The first paragraph denounced "the war of conquest and extermination." The word "extermination" was stricken out. The words "lawless and irresponsible," were stricken from the paragraph referring to the military control in Idaho. The address as adopted refers to "the two great evils of militarism and plutocracy, which now menace the existence of the republic."

MOBS IN SPAIN.

Barcelona, July 3.—Quiet was not restored here until midnight. Mobs paraded the streets and made demonstrations before the Episcopal palace and residence, about the electric cars and in the cafes, shouting, "Down With the Jesuits." Two monks were insulted, and an attempt to protect them led to a serious encounter.

MERRIAM TALKS.

HE IS NOT THE ENEMY OF LABOR UNIONS.

Commander of Troops in the Idaho Strike District Explains His Position in Denver.

DENVER, July 3.—Gen. H. C. Merriam, who was in command of the troops at Wardner, Idaho, when martial law was declared there by the state authorities after the Couer d'Alene miners' riots, took occasion today, in an interview, to assert that he is not the enemy of labor or of unions, as has been represented by J. E. Sovereign, Samuel Gompers, president of the American Federation of Labor, and other leaders.

"It was my wish and my hope," declared the general, "that every union miner in the Couer d'Alene country could declare his innocence and obtain the governor's employment permit, and the higher the wages the better I should have been pleased."

OUT BREAK IN NEGROS.

California Volunteers Attacked by Natives—One Man Killed.

Manila, July 3.—6:05 p. m.—Reports have been received here of an outbreak in the island Negroes, incident upon the departure of the California regiment for home. Some hostile natives, seeing a company of soldiers at one of the small posts preparing to depart, thought the Americans were evacuating the island, and a party of 250 rebels, mostly bolo men, attacked the troops and killed one man and wounded another belonging to company E. The Filipinos were easily driven off.

The transport Sherman will bring the California troops to Manila before starting for home. The transport Grant will soon embark with the Colorado regiment.

ONLY ONE GENERAL.

Washington, July 3.—The proposed organization of nine volunteer regiments will place a number of important military commissions at the disposal of the president. Although there will be three new brigades, Adjutant General Corbin says, it is not likely that more than one additional brigadier general will be needed, the other two being provided for by the officers of that grade now in the army, whose terms of enlistment are about to expire. General Grant, who is now in the Philippines, is in this category, and he will probably be one of the new brigadier generals. Another officer now in the Philippines is also available for re-appointment to the provisional army. Probably the most important point in connection with the proposed volunteer organization is the president's declared intention to appoint none but officers of the regular army. Nearly fifty regular army officers had regimental commands during the recent war in the volunteer establishments, and nine colonels will be assigned to the new regiments to be selected from among that number.

TRANSPORTS SAIL.

San Francisco, July 3.—The supply transport Wyfield sailed this evening for the Philippines, loaded with stores for the American troops. Today 150 horses of the Fourth cavalry were placed on board, and the regimental mascot, a goat, was also a passenger. The Comanegra is also taking on supplies, and will leave in a few days with a number of horses of the Fourth cavalry. The next transport to sail with troops will be the City of Para, which was chartered last week. Re-
