

# TROOPS AGAIN ADVANCING

## Gen. Otis Sends a Budget of Important News to the War Department.

## Gen. Schwan's Column Encountered Heavy Opposition at Old Cavite, but Drove the Enemy Back.

**MANILA, Oct. 9.**—General Schwan's column, consisting of the Thirtieth infantry, a battalion of the Fourteenth infantry, two troops of cavalry, Capt. Riley's battery of the Fifth artillery and Lowe's scouts, continue to advance today, towards San Francisco de Malabon, meeting with little resistance and suffering no casualties. The enemy fell back steadily. This evening the column is resting between Santa Cruz and San Francisco de Malabon. Provisions are being conveyed to Rosario, between Novleta and Santa Cruz.

### LIVELY SCENES.

**Manila, Oct. 9.**—The American camp tonight is within sight of San Francisco de Malabon, the stronghold of the insurgents in the province of Cavite, where the Filipinos are said to number 5,000. During the march from Novleta to Rosario only a few shots were fired. This large camp town was filled with white flags. The Americans captured 300 or 500 men, many of the Filipinos changing their clothing for white costumes. The bay of Rosario was filled with hundreds of boats, and people had spent an exciting night.

An expedition, composed of the gunboats Calina and Manila, with an armed flat boat and steam pump, left Cavite for the river Pasig or Batis, which empties into Manila bay on the north side, with a view of raising the Spanish gunboat Ayat, purposely sunk by the Spaniards, which is reported to be in good condition. The gunboat Helena with a body of marines from the Balintore, preceded the expedition to make soundings at the mouth of the river.

### AN OFFICER KILLED.

**Washington, Oct. 9.**—General Otis has made the following report to the war department of yesterday's fighting:

General Schwan, with a column of 1726 men of the Thirtieth infantry, a battalion of the Fourteenth infantry, with cavalry and artillery, left Baco yesterday and proceeded to Novleta. It encountered heavy opposition at Old Cavite and beyond, but drove the enemy, capturing two guns and inflicting great damage. His casualties are: Captain Suffolk, of the Thirtieth infantry, killed; Captain McGrath, of the Fourth cavalry, seriously wounded, and ten enlisted men wounded. The column entered Rosario this morning, meeting slight opposition. The naval vessels and marines at Cavite made a demonstration on Novleta yesterday, while Schwan advanced at the same time. The troops at Imus attacked the insurgents at San Nicolas, two miles east of the city and drove them from their position. Four men were slightly wounded. The enemy left six bodies on the field.

## A BOLD ROBBER.

**RELIEVES PAYMASTER OF GOLD IN SAN FRANCISCO.**

**The Deed Committed in Daylight—The Eastern Oregon Highwaymen Are Bound Over.**

**SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 7.**—One of the boldest robberies which has ever occurred in this city, was accomplished in broad daylight, this afternoon, at the corner of Market and Brook streets, when \$500 in gold was taken from the United States paymaster's wagon. The robber had the appearance of being a working man. Detectives are scouring the city for the robber. It is thought there will be no possibility of his escape. The money belonged to Capt. John Easonson, superintendent of the government transport dock.

### BOUND OVER.

**Pendleton, Oct. 7.**—Commissioner Halley, upon the evidence being presented by the government against Barkley and Farrens, held them to the federal grand jury at Portland, in the sum of \$10,000, for the alleged crime of robbing the Ontario-Burns stage mails, on September 23d. During the hearing statements were made by witnesses for the government, which tended to connect Van C. Alexander with the robbery. Alexander, as one of the witnesses, swore to having given up \$170 to the officers. He lives at Huntington, Baker county. That a third man, besides Barkley and Farrens, was implicated, was conclusively proven in the testimony.

## PREPARE FOR WAR

**PARLIAMENT CALLED AND RESERVES MOBILIZED.**

**Queen Victoria Consents to These Measures—Cruelty of the Boers to British Refugees.**

**LONDON, Oct. 7.**—Dispatches say that Pretoria presents a most deserted

appearance. The government has ordered all saloons closed throughout the republic.

Her majesty, in a private consultation at Balmoral, this morning, assented to the calling of parliament, the mobilization of the reserves and the continuance in the army of all soldiers now serving, who in ordinary circumstances would be entitled to discharge or transfer to the reserves.

The Evening News publishes the following dispatch from Cape Town: "Reports of barbaric excesses, committed by Boers on refugees, have caused a thrill of horror here. In one instance seventy women and children were packed in cattle trucks so tightly, that they were unable to sit, and were thus kept sidetracked for thirty-eight hours without food or water. When they attempted to leave the trucks they were driven back with blows. Every trainload of refugees brings harrowing accounts of barbarities of the Boers of the Orange Free State. A train arrived today that had been nearly sixty hours en route. The sufferings of the women were dreadful. Several births occurred on the way, one in an open cattle truck, containing twenty men."

## Laurier Cheered

**CHICAGO DAY BANQUET AND ITS GREAT GATHERING.**

President McKinley and the Premier of Canada Among the Speakers—Great Enthusiasm.

**CHICAGO, Oct. 9.**—Chicago's great auditorium never held greater gathering than tonight, when the Chicago Day banquet was held within its walls under the auspices of the Fall Festival committee. President McKinley, who was the guest of the evening, spoke at some length on the greatness of our republic. Sir Wilfred Laurier, the premier of Canada, was one of the speakers. Toastmaster M. E. Stone, who introduced Sir Wilfred, said: "We do not greet him as a stranger, but as one of our own."

The band played "God Save the Queen," the audience rising and join-

ing in the chorus. The greeting which was accorded the premier as he arose to speak was hearty in the extreme. Cheers after cheer rang through the hall and men rose to their feet and waved their napkins frantically. The warmth of his welcome for an instant embarrassed Sir Wilfred.

He closed his eyes and pressed his hands over his face, and a thousand little stars seemed to flash before his sight. To be sure it was merely the pulsations of his own blood which produced this sensation; and yet, little by little, those tiny lights ceased to revolve and looked for all the world like the pale stars which he had just been watching in the firmament. At length, aroused by voices in the street, he looked out.

Between the houses opposite there extended a wall. On the ground in front was a bright fire, and by that fire stood Christ surrounded by a few disciples and friends. Just behind him his shadow was clearly defined upon the wall.

John, the disciple whom he loved, mechanically picked up a blackened coal, and with it outlined the shadow until it had delineated the entire figure of the Master upon the wall. Then he dropped the coal and entered into conversation with the rest.

Next morning, when Haas Alienus again stood at the open window and saw the people pass, there were many who stopped and looked with curiosity at the drawing on the wall.

"That represents a shoemaker, his back is bowed," said the shoemaker. "You talk nonsense," returned the fruiterer; "that stooping posture proves that he is a fruit vendor. They forgot to draw the basket on his back, but that half-open mouth shows clearly that he was crying, 'Fomegranates, come and buy, come and buy.'"

A high official of the Sanhedrim, who passed, and who, of course, did not mix his voice with the gabble of the tradespeople, thought to himself, "It is perfectly plain that that represents a learned man and a thinker. One might almost take it to be a portrait of me. Positively it is me. Not bad either. Probably some of the tradespeople drew it. Of course, they all know me more or less."

Meanwhile, one of the spectators had silently approached the cartoon drawing. He had a simple demeanor, and a kind patient face. Nothing great was known of him, no Chronicle has preserved his name, for he led a retired life, away from the noise of the world. With hands creased over the knob of his walking stick he contemplated the drawing.

"What a noble forehead," he thought. What lofty humanity that bent figure suggests. Oh, if only one could be like that. But why wish for the impossible? As he stood there, silent and humble, the likeness to the drawing was so striking that everybody fell back, pointing to him in whispers.

Startled and ashamed, he slipped away, unable to understand why they should stare at him.

In his conscious humility he had resembled the Christ shadow.
