

NO NEW DEVELOPMENTS.

The Smallpox Scare Is Subsiding—One Case in the Waldo Hills.

There are no new developments in the two smallpox cases in Salem, the one at the Musser home on the foot of Court street, and the other at the post house.

The man at the post house is getting along very comfortably, and no fears at all are entertained concerning him by City Physician E. A. Pierce. Only the baby at the Musser home is now afflicted, and its condition is growing steadily better.

There is a case of smallpox about one mile from Shaw station, as was mentioned in the Statesman some time ago. Odis Bates, a farmer, on the Craig place, is the victim. Dr. J. W. Ransom, of Turner, was called to attend Mr. Bates several days ago. Being alarmed concerning his condition, he called into consultation Dr. Pierce, and they concluded it was smallpox. It had then been running some twelve days. Dr. Pierce at that time vaccinated all the other members of the family, and left strict instructions as to quarantine regulations. The reporter learns that these have been carried out, and that there is consequently no danger of the spread of the disease beyond the members of the family. None of these have so far taken it. Miss Minnie Irwin had been engaged to teach the Shaw school, but its opening was postponed until all danger should be past.

THE HORST HOP YARDS.

New Wiring System Has Been Adopted for Five Hundred Acres.

The work of trellis-wiring the hop yards belonging to Horst Bros. in this vicinity, is now in progress, eight men being thus employed. Forty acres on the Beak place and 260 of the Dove farm are being improved in this manner. Other yards comprising the Oregon possessions of the Horsts will be so wired, and when completed they will have 500 acres of this crop. The trellis-wiring system is the proper one to use in raising hops successfully, and for many years several of the hop-growers have adopted it. The men now arranging the Horst yards are from Sacramento, viz.: J. McGregory, Joe Ritcher, James Weir, John Hetzler, E. Leidenberg, William Frey, W. Williams, and L. Conrad. They arrived in Salem on Friday last.

FROM "MC."

Salem, Or., Oct. 14, 1899.—Editor Statesman: It is possible that Brown, Wrightman & Myers and Geo. G. Bingham, who in this morning's issue denied a local statement to the effect that I was offered a compromise in the case against the Canadian Pacific, do not know that the corporation did offer to compromise. Once in Portland, on Tuesday, October 2d, I was offered \$300 and the same amount was offered the morning of the trial. These offers came, one from Mr. Coyle, the other from Mr. Calder, through a third party.

I was not responsible for the local which appeared in your paper, to which the attorney's of the corporation so seriously object.

I want to assure the attorneys on the other side that the case is not settled. So far as the non-suit is concerned it has not worried me a little bit and at the risk of surprising the gentlemen on the other side I will say that I would not accept \$300 and compromise the case today. I am not the only newspaper man who has been defrauded by this foreign corporation and now that I am into the fight I purpose seeing it to a finish. I think business men have a right to know whether a man who is held out to the public as agent of a corporation for removed from its head office, can contract with the corporation and then avoid payment on the ground that the agent exceeded his authority.

This case is going to the supreme court and we shall learn what that court thinks about the non-suit. If it affirms the ruling of the lower court, I will be convinced that I have studied law with ill success; if it overrules that non-suit, the case will be remanded back for new trial.

I hope that the case will not again be intruded upon public notice, for the public certainly has but little interest in it.

COMING HOME.—R. W. Holman yesterday received a letter from Claude C. BOUND OVER.—In the Justice court for the Salem district, yesterday, the preliminary examination of A. A. Osborn, on a charge of stealing two hounds from Ralph Gibson, south of this city, was conducted. The evidence for the prosecution was convincing, though the defendant, when placed on the stand, told a very plausible story to the effect that he had purchased the dogs, from a stranger, on September 23d, having paid \$2.50 for each. His story was corroborated by a woman with whom he boarded at a boarding house, and with whom he had left his purse. At the conclusion of the testimony and the argument by counsel, Justice Johnson bound the defendant over to the circuit court in the sum of \$150. Tilmon Ford and C. L. McNary appeared for the state, and Col. N. B. Knight and R. J. Fleming for the defendant.

IRISH STATUTES RECEIVED IN THE STATE LIBRARY.

Valuable Works of Law Included in a Large Shipment Unpacked Yesterday.

(From Daily, Oct. 14th.)

The state library is in receipt of a collection of rare books, consisting of old statutes of England and Ireland, and now has complete sets of the works on law of these two countries. Among the shipment received yesterday was a set of twenty volumes of Irish statutes at large, covering all the legislation from A. D. 1210, to A. D. 1890. The books were printed in 1804 and, although showing age and extensive use, are in a very good state of preservation. The print is large, and of the style of the last century, and the paper used of the best linen. Many quaint expressions are found in these statutes, the language used being that of the long ago.

BOOKMAKING IN AMERICA.

New York Issues More Books Than All the Rest of the Country Combined.

On an average 14,000,000 books are printed in Germany every year and 6,000,000 of these it is computed, are exported to other countries. Leipzig has been for many years the recognized book city of Germany. No other European city, not a capital, occupies a position equally prominent, notwithstanding the fact that the total consumption of paper in Germany for bookmaking is materially less than in Great Britain at present. In the United States and Canada there is no recognized book city, though recently Toronto has asserted its right to be accepted as the Leipzig of Canada. Nearly \$2,000,000 is said to be invested in that city and its neighborhood in papermaking, printing and book-binding trades. Large as these figures may be for Canada they do not seem to be of very much account when brought into comparison with statistics of some American cities, especially New York, Philadelphia and Chicago. Chicago has low \$25,000,000 invested in book and paper publishing, and in some lines may be said to have almost a monopoly particularly in printing railroad time tables, and railroad maps and in some branches of commercial printing. Philadelphia has a large retail book trade, especially in cheap editions of the standard works which are sent to the South and West. Two other American cities having a large business in bookmaking, though in different branches of the trade, are Boston and St. Louis. The books published in Boston are for the most part either expensive standard works or those having permanent value for reference, whereas the books published in St. Louis include a considerable number in the German language. Washington as the capital city is the seat of the government printing house, the publications of which are both extensive and continuous, and more than 3,000 persons, a majority of them in the government service, are employed in bookmaking and bookbinding in that city despite the fact that in proportion to its population no city of the country has a smaller number of newspapers, and usually the number of papers issued in a city is a guide to the volume of book-making done in it.

New York exceeds all other American cities (Canadian included) in the volume of its bookmaking and bookbinding trade, and the publishers of this city now issue more books yearly than are published in all the rest of the country combined. There are forty leading publishing concerns, and others of less importance. In another particular, also, New York can securely assert its right to be the Leipzig of America, for it is the city into which are imported and from which are exported the greatest number of books.—Sun.
