

NEW DANCES FOR 1900.

A Quintet of Novelties That Are Indorsed by the Leading Masters.

NEW YORK, Sept. 29.—Usual interest attaches to the meeting of the American Society of Professors of Dancing, which was held here a few days ago, for the reason that several novel new dances were rehearsed and adopted, and some important suggestions were made in regard to changing the present method of round dancing.

Six new dances were introduced—the "Gavotte Pompadour" and the "Cuban Waltz," by Prof. Adolph Newberger, of New York; the "Imperial Three-Step," by Prof. Oskar Dornweg, of Terre Haute, Ind.; the "Verona Minuet," by Prof. M. B. Gilbert, of Boston, Mass.; the "Netherland," by Prof. Geo. Prutting, Jr., of Hartford, Conn.; and the "Rosale," by Prof. Henry Doring, of Troy, New York. Of these all but one were adopted by the society, and a strenuous effort will be made during the current year to popularize them in every part of the country.

The "Gavotte Pompadour" is a stately dance, and somewhat resembles the old-fashioned minuet. One of its main merits is said to lie in the fact that it teaches young ladies to handle their fans and their skirts gracefully. The "Verona Minuet" may be styled an ensemble dance, as it can not be performed to advantage with less than eight couples. It is designed for more advanced pupils, and some of the teachers speak of it as post-graduate dance.

The "Imperial Three-Step" is also designed for older persons, and is really a substitute for the two-step. Prof. Dornweg, its creator, says that it is principally designed for those who have given up dancing, but who yet would be glad to dance on special occasions if they could do so with fitting ease and grace. To such persons this new dance ought to be welcome, since its main features are the lightness and ease with which it can be danced by people who are more or less advanced in years.

The "Netherland" has a waltz movement, and is original as regards the combination of steps. The "Rosale" is danced to mazurka time, and like

the others, is likely to become quite popular. The "Cuban Waltz" has a Spanish movement, and is danced to Spanish music. Being highly original, it received many encomiums from those who saw it rehearsed.

Each dance was carefully explained to the society by the professor who invented it. First the professor illustrated it alone and without music, then with music. He analyzed and dwelt on the significance of every position and movement, the result being that at the close of the four days during which the rehearsals lasted all the members of the society thoroughly understood the new dances and were entirely competent to teach them to pupils.

The subject of great importance which was discussed during the convention was the question of amending the present method of dancing waltz. Many of those present maintained that the manner in which partners are at present held in the waltz, and, in fact, in all round dances, is objectionable, not only because it is awkward, but also because it is in some respects an offense against good taste, and they are urged that immediate steps be taken to correct the abuse. They proposed to amend it by introducing a new method of holding partners, according to which the lady's right hand and the gentleman's left hand will not be joined as formerly, and thus the lady will have more freedom than heretofore in handling her skirt with her right hand.

There was much discussion over this subject, but no definite action was taken. It was plain, however, that the society is unalterably opposed to all ungraceful and indecent dancing, and will do its best to have them eliminated.

The members of the society, probably without a single exception, are in favor of popularizing as far as possible slow and graceful dances, modeled after the style of the old-time gavotte and minuet, and there is little doubt that much of their work during the year will be in this direction.

PHYSICIANS FOR ROYALTY.

Queen Victoria's Doctor Receives a Salary of \$7,500 and Perquisites.

Cornelius Vanderbilt's death without medical attendance is one of the ironies of fate, says the *Mitteleuropäer* in the Washington Post. Here was one of the wealthiest men in America, if not the richest of them all, who was known to be in a most alarming condition of health, and yet when he was stricken with paralysis none of the family physicians or even any other doctor could be found to respond to the summons of the family, and the multi-millionaire expired in his New York palace without any medical man being present. Who knows whether if a physician had been at hand the life of this estimable man might not have been prolonged, while at any rate his sufferings and the grief of his family might have been alleviated. We have all heard of the Parisian chef, Joseph, who was imported by one of the Vanderbilts to cook his dinners, at a salary of \$10,000 a year. Less than that amount would have paid the stipend of a clever and devoted physician, who would have formed part and parcel of the establishment, precisely in the same manner as the private secretary, and as on yonder side of the Atlantic, the private chaplain.

Private physicians are a recognized institution in the old world, and their employment is by no means restricted to royalty. Not merely every monarch, but nearly every prince of the blood, or even great noble, has his body physician, who resides with him and forms part of the household. An instance in point is that of Dr. Chrystianer, who for the last ten years of the life of the late Prince Bismarck never left his side. The money expended in his salary was well spent in every sense of the word, for it served to alleviate the sufferings of the veteran statesman, while the constant medical care and attention which he received undoubtedly prolonged his life.

The resident physician of Queen Victoria, by the by, Sir James Reid, is just about to marry one of her majesty's maids of honor, namely, the Hon. Susan Baring, sister of Lord Revelstoke, and of Cecil Baring, who makes his home in New York, and who is in business in Wall street. The disparity in age between Miss Baring and Sir James is considerable, for he is at least thirty years the senior of his bride. However he is still remarkably young looking, and so full of tact, geniality, and good temper that he is a universal favorite at court. Since the death of Sir William Jenner, Sir James may be said to have been the medical charge of his sovereign, and the responsibility is an exceedingly heavy one, for, in the first place, the queen is an extremely stout and infirm old lady of some seventy years, and, secondly, she is extremely difficult to manage. Sir James, however, like most of his fellow-Scotchmen at court, is possessed of much sturdy independence, and on occasion, when the queen resented his remonstrances, deliberately left her and did not return until pressure was brought to bear upon him to go back. This little squabble between the queen and her physician took place about three years ago at Balmoral, at a moment when her majesty gave way to a number of extravagancies, which became a source of great concern to all those around her. NEW GUNS FOR THE NAVY.

Can Throw a Projectile for Nearly Fifteen Miles.

High-powered and Six-Inch—New Battleship Maine and Her Sisters, Ohio and Missouri, Each Will Carry 16 of Them.

The firing capabilities of the new high-powered six-inch guns designed for future ships of the United States navy and for coast defense batteries have just been determined by calculations made by Major James M. Ingalls, First United States Artillery, says the Washington correspondent of the New York Evening Post. Major Ingalls finds that one of the new six-inch guns can throw a projectile a distance of 14,765 feet. The greatest range ever obtained hitherto by a piece of ordnance was 12,121 miles. This latter range was recorded for a 9.5-inch Krupp gun, which was fired on a Meppen range in Germany in 1892. Previous to the German long-distance shot the record was held by a 9.2-inch English gun, which was fired at Shoeburyness on the occasion of the jubilee celebration in 1888. Major Ingalls' calculations for the new type six-inch gun are based on a muzzle velocity for the projectile of 3000 foot-seconds, and a weight of shell of 105 pounds. The gun he lays on an angle of elevation of 45 degrees. The maximum ordinate, or the culmination point attained by the shell in its flight, is 30,549 feet. In other words, the shell attains a height above the muzzle of the gun of 3,549 feet. The total time consumed by the shell in its flight is 52.5 seconds.

Major Ingalls has long been identified with the artillery school for officers at Fort Monroe. He is the officer who previous to the firing of the famous Shoeburyness shot in England, made the closest calculation as to where the shell would fall. While many foreign officers placed the fall of the projectile at points varying from 1500 to 3000 yards in rear of where the shell actually fell Major (then captain) Ingalls' calculation was only 150 yards short. The wonderful part of it all is that in working back with the actual atmospheric data, which prevailed at Shoeburyness at the moment of firing, Major Ingalls was able to place the shot, by calculation, practically in the very hole it made.

The time of 52.5 seconds, which Major Ingalls says will be consumed by the flight of a six-inch shell, exceeds by 12.3 seconds the time occupied by the German record shot in 1892. The German shot, in ranging a distance of 12,121 miles, obtained a maximum height of 21,456 feet. The enormous muzzle velocity of 3000 foot-seconds, which Major Ingalls uses as a basis for his calculations, is an actuality which has been afforded by the new smokeless powder of the United States. About the best velocities obtained abroad from six-inch guns, at present, are less than 2000 foot-seconds.

The new battleship Maine, and her sisters, Ohio and Missouri, will each carry 16 six-inch guns. The six-inch guns used by the American fleet at Manila, and which did such excellent service there, require for each gun a crew of 15 men. It is deemed good work if one of the old-type six-inch guns can maintain aimed fire at the rate of one and a half shots per minute.

Generally speaking, the rate of aimed fire is one shot per minute. For the new six-inch guns a rate of aimed shots per minute is secured, it is declared, by a gun's crew numbering only four men.

The new six-inch guns will be 50 calibers long, or 25 feet. The majority of the new English six-inch naval guns have a length of 23 feet three inches. The English six-inch weapons employ shells weighing 100 pounds. When using a charge of 25 pounds of cordite, the English six-inch gun yields a muzzle velocity of 1540 feet, with a resultant muzzle energy of 5340 foot-tons. "owing to the enormous velocities afforded by the new smokeless powder of the United States, the necessity of keeping down the weight of navy shells in order to insure flatter trajectories no longer exists, and already steps are being made looking to an increase in the weight of projectiles for the number of naval calibers. From what can be learned, the new weights will approximate closely to those now employed in the army. The navy eight-inch gun uses a 200 pound shell, the army eight-inch gun a 300 pound shell. The navy 12-inch gun employs a 550 pound projectile, as compared with 105 pounds for the army 12-inch. The advantages afforded by the larger shell are greater carrying capacity for contained explosive and an increased energy of impact on comparatively low chamber pressures.

HE REFERS TO THE DEMOCRATIC PARTY.

Editor Statesman: In a recent issue of the Springfield (Massachusetts) Republican, appears an article in laudation of Massachusetts copperhead, Filippino and other types of opposition to American progress, which is so characteristically copperhead, demagogic and thoroughly contemptible and un-American as to require some consideration. In the first place, Massachusetts is an American degenerate among the states; it is culture gone to seed. It is wholly lacking in the pristine vigor of true Americanism. It has copied English cockneyism until it has

ceased to be representative in any degree whatever of the patriotic sentiment of this great nation. The text of the manifesto in question, is based upon the proposition that there should be no government of the people without the consent of the governed." The facility and absurdity of this oft-repeated declaration has been so many times shown, that it would seem that common sense, common honesty, and a due regard for candor, with rational men, would suggest its abandonment.

It is indeed a very captivating declaration with the Samaritan type of humanity, but wholly unfitted for the practical world.

The stale and over-worked argument of a parallel as to conditions between that of our revolutionary forefathers and the Filippino is too self-evidently dishonest and impudently to be entertained as every student of the history of the United States, if honest and intelligent, will readily recognize. Every form of society if equitable, and its purpose is to secure justice, requires just laws for its conduct. It is only the outlaw who objects to laws, and their enforcement. Law is a necessity from the lowest to the highest form of society. Every form of criminal law is enacted and enforced in opposition to, and in spite of, the criminal class. No criminal ever cheerfully consented to being governed. No Indian tribe was ever brought under the sway and control of enlightened law with its consent. The inhabitants of Texas, Louisiana, California, and Alaska, were not consulted as to whether they were willing to submit to the United States or not.

The Southern states recently in rebellion were brought back under the United States laws without their "consent." If this last transaction were so wickedly wrong as Senator Hoar, Tom Reed and this class of statesmen pretend to believe, then those worthless ought to be politically damned for favoring the subjection of the states formerly in rebellion. And one fact stands out pre-eminently that if they were right then in the subjection of the states in rebellion, they are certainly wrong now. And whichever horn of the dilemma they choose to take, they stand convicted of defective judgment, and therefore incompetent to direct the patriotic and intelligent people of this country.

Where ever laws are enacted there will always be found a wicked and a vicious minority who will be governed by such laws and always without their "consent."

In fact, in every instance without exception, the laws are enforced without the "consent" of those to whom they more especially apply. In fact, if laws were only enforced with the "consent" of the persons for whose coercion they were enacted, then every effort at law-making would be the crystallization of silliness. If the progressive and highly-civilized governments of the world were to adopt the plan of modestly waiting for barbaric and semi-barbaric people to extend to them a polite invitation to come and enact laws for their government, then and there, would progressive civilization cease and human progress would be at an end.

To accept the Bryan, Hoar, Tom Reed, Massachusetts, and Aguinaldo, logic, then, would be to nullify legal enactments the world over, unless the protesting minority were excused from legal control.

If it be said that a minority must submit to the rule of the majority, it must be remembered that only a small minority of these islands is in rebellion. Geo. F. Hoar and Thomas B. Reed, etc., have been many times elected as national law-makers. In each case there has always been a protesting minority. Notwithstanding this fact it is saintly outfit has never been known to refuse office under these circumstances; but have been actively engaged the greater part of their lives in the government of the minority in question and absolutely without its consent.

They were either dishonest then or they are double dealing hypocrites now.

Why do these pithed cantmongers continuously declare that the purpose of the United States is to reduce the Philippines to a state of "slavery" and play the role of the "tyrant" generally with these Filippinos? There is not an intelligent and truthful man in the United States today who believes for a moment that the United States has any such ultimate purpose in view. The history of the United States is totally at variance with such a thought. It set an example before the civilized world of its love of freedom, by striking the chains of slavery from millions of people in our own country. If this country has come to such a degraded condition as to entertain a desire for the re-enslavement of slavery either in this country or any other, then Tom Reed, Geo. F. Hoar, Boutelle, and other imbeciles of that kind, ought to go and hang themselves with the greatest possible dispatch, for they have been actively engaged in the conduct of our government for an ordinary life-time. They have had more to do in bringing our country to its present degraded and besotted condition (as they represent it) than any other three men in this country. By their own showing they are devoid of statesmanship, patriotism, and manly principle, and totally unworthy of confidence. The fact is, that Hoar is superannuated and Reed has a personal grievance, and Atkinson is what Nordeau would call a degenerate. All are non-progressive reactionaries. There is no one of these men, or their allies, who has the hardihood to openly declare for the shameful and cowardly policy of unqualified surrender and abandonment of the Philippine Islands, but they covertly pursue a course of blind malignant criticism which can mean nothing else.

Think for a moment of a class of men who have been honored by Americans as few others have, who have spent their lives in the national capital as law-makers, aiding actively in bringing this country to what it is, and then in time of war trying in every possible way to embarrass their government, giving aid and comfort to its enemies, trying to defeat the efforts of the government in its struggle

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gles to bring the war to an honorable termination.

And then try, if you please, to solve a problem in perverted human nature or rather total depravity. STILL RULES THE WAVES.

The old-time boast that "Britannia rules the waves" was never more justified than it is today. Figures published in *Fellden's* Magazine show that the entire tonnage of the world in ships amounts to a round total of 27,672,528 tons, of which enormous aggregate the United Kingdom and our colonies own rather more than one-half, or, to be precise, the immense and overshadowing proportion of 13,925,548.

Deducting from this latter total 1,661,584 owned by the British colonies throughout the world, the United Kingdom possesses no less than 12,263,964 tons. It is indeed a far cry from this predominating tonnage to the second biggest, which, it is hardly surprising to learn, is that of the United States of America, and which figures out to 2,465,587 tons.

Germany takes third place, with 2,452,334 tons, which thus follows closely upon American heels. All probably but those who follow maritime affairs closely will learn with some surprise that Norway easily occupies the fourth place—London Mail.
