

PAID BY THE STATE.

Two Counties Have Derived No Benefit from the Law, and a Number Secure Very Little.

The scalp bonty tax, provided by the last legislature, will be a heavy burden on the taxpayers of Oregon, especially those in the Willamette valley counties, who will derive very little benefit from the operation of the law. Scalps of coyotes, wildcats and other animals included in the provisions of the law, come principally from the counties paying little of the tax, and some of these counties draw large sums of the money from the state treasury for the scalp of these animals, while many of the valley counties secure very little from the state in this way, and two-Linn and Washington-have thus far secured

nothing. During the quarter ending March 31st, 8658 claims for bounties were audited in the office of the secretary of state, aggregating \$17,316. Since the law was enacted, 25.504 bounty claims have been paid by the state, aggregating \$51,008. 
