******** Washington, D. C. May 5.-The last report of the commission of Internal Revenue makes it took very much as though Americans were becoming a nation of beer drinkers. In forty years the population has increased 125 per cent and the beer consumption 1,800 per cent. The average consumption 32 00 joday is something over half a barrel 16 85 a year for every man, woman and child in the country. The increase in the manufacture of whiskey has not been so rapid. In fact, more whiskey was produced in the United States in 1864 than in 1899, the total in the former 70 year being 85.395.393 gallons, and in 35 00 85.125.532 gallons.

A large part of the increase of manufactured articles is therefore due to the rise in prices of materials from which they are made.

It is proposed to establish another fish cultural station at some point in North Carolina, near the gulf stream and in the center of the zone of migration of a number of farieties of food fishes. The station is by no means a state or local affair, but it is said to be much needed by the country at large. The eatch of shad on the Atlantic coast prior to the introduction of artificial propagation had been yearly decreasing. HOW TO TEST CANNED MEATS. Experts Can Tell Their Condition by Tapping Upon the Lids.

proceedings to be observed within the vast area of Woolwich reserve depoare the doings of a small party of officials, one of whom appears to do nothing all day long but sit at a table and tap on the top of tin canisters with a couple of bits of stick something after the manner of a child beating on the upturned end of his drum, says the ondon News. The tins are passed before him about as fast as he can tap them and absolutely nothing seems to come of the game. To the unenshtened onlooker it is quite unintelligible. The tins contain meat and before they are passed into store it is. of course, important to examine the condition of what is inclosed, and this in fact, is the way it is done. The trained ear of the expert examiner can tell whether the meat is in a wholesome or a putrid condition by the sound emitted when rapped with the stick, just as the examiner of railway carriage wheels is supposed to be able to tell whether the wheel he taps with his hammer is cracked or not. rapidity with which the business "is gone through and the seeming inattention of the performer to all sorts of noises about him render the procedure a very curious one to watch. The test is said to be practically infallible.
