THE DAY SPENT IN CONSIDERING AND AUDITING BILLS

Funds Appropriated for the Improvement of a County Road near Butteville Several Petitions.

The commissioners' court continued its session at the court house yesterday, spending the major portion of the day in auditing bills. Several petitions were also acted upon, after which the court adjourned to 9 o'clock this morning.

A petition was received from E. A. S. Cone, of Butteville, urging the court to appropriate funds toward aiding in improving the road leading east from Butteville.

The application of S. J. Kerr and others for county aid for L. LaBonté, was considered, and the court ordered that \$3 per month be allowed for that purpose, S. J. Kerr to act as disbursing agent.

The application of A. Lambert for a liquor license permitting him to conduct a saloon in St. Paul precinct, was considered favorably, and the court authorized the issuance of the license.

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SUMMONS.

In the Circuit Court of the State of Oregon for Marion County.—Department No. 2.

Salem Building and Loan Association, a corporation, plaintiff, vs. Ernest H. Lehman and Emelia F. Lehman, his wife, defendants.

To the Above-named Defendants: In the name of the State of Oregon, you are required to appear and answer to a complaint filed against you in the above entitled suit, on or before the last day of the month prescribed in the order for publication of summons, made herein, to-wit: the 22d day of June, 1900, and if you fail to so appear and answer for want thereof the plaintiff will take judgment against the defendants, Ernest H. Lehman and Emelia F. Lehman, his wife, for the sum of seven hundred (700) dollars, gold coin of the United States of America, with interest on said sum in like gold coin at the rate of 8 per cent, per annum from the 3d day of February, 1900, and for the further sum of \$75 attorney's fees, and the costs and disbursements of this suit, and for a decree of the Honorable Court, that plaintiff's mortgage be declared a first lien upon the following described premises, to-wit: Beginning, at a point 72 rods North of the West corner of the land deeded to Elizabeth P.
