statement. Now, the election in Oregon is the first opportunity for any state to directly express itself upon the question of annexing the Philippines. The East is almost unanimously favorable to the annexation of Puerto Rico and of Cuba if Cuba will come. Their opposition is to the annexation of the Philippines, and largely because there is a fear of building up the West at the expense of the East. If the West, or a Western state like Oregon, a state to be particularly benefited by the annexation of the Philippines, should pronounce against their retention, it would be a severe blow. The news from Oregon on election night will be anxiously looked for in the Philippine Islands, and it is important that it should be a message of encouragement to the boys defending the Flag there, rather than to those who are shooting them down from lurking places by day and under cover of the night.

INCONSISTENT DR. DALY.

Senator Daly of Lake, now the fusion nominee for Congress, introduced in the last Legislature Senate Bill No. 22, amending Section 2813 of the general laws of Oregon, to read as follows:

Section 2813. On or before the first day of May in each year the several county treasurers of the state shall pay over to the State Treasurer, in GOLD AND SILVER COIN, the amount of state taxes charged to their respective counties.

Sensible Senator; inconsistent candidate. How can a state legislate against special contracts while there is a state law demonetizing all money except gold and silver coin? No wonder Candidate Daly does not go upon the stump.

There are at least two things for which the people of Salem and Marion county should be thankful to Congressman Tongue, and for which they should show their appreciation. We trust that they will not so act that ingratitude may be charged against them, for there is nothing worse than ingratitude. One of these things is the work of Mr. Tongue in behalf of the improvements to the Willamette river. This matter has been much better taken care of during Mr. Tongue's service in Congress than at any previous time. The other matter is the one touching the public building for Salem. The bill for this purpose had been pending for a great many years. It had passed the Senate several times, but it always stuck on the files of the House. By attending to the matter very closely, and fighting against odds, Mr. Tongue succeeded where others failed. If we want a man—Mr. Tongue or any other man—to serve our interests again, we must show an appreciation of what has been done. And we are not nearly through wanting. We will want a great many things yet, at the hands of Congress.

The work of Mr. Tongue in behalf of the Indian training school here is another matter we should appreciate. By virtue of the extraordinary efforts of Congressman Tongue and Senator McBride, this institution, from being a straggling one, with inadequate facilities, is in a fair way to become the greatest and leading institution of the kind in all of the United States, which it is entitled to be, on account of considerations of economy and other advantages. Let us not be ungrateful.

DURBIN'S BROKEN PLEDGES.

Editor Statesman:

The independent voters, who do not acknowledge allegiance to any party, are asking themselves this question: Can we vote for Frank Durbin for sheriff when he has broken his pledges to the people, failed and refused to redeem his promises? Two years ago he ran on a reform platform, and he pledged himself to stand by the pledges therein contained. Has he done so? No; he has not. He promised the people he would favor a bill, reducing the salaries of the officers of this county, and, in particular, the sheriff's salary. He did not keep his promises. He was active in lobbying through the bill which raised his salary. He could not get Senators Looney and Adams to favor his bill, so he was obliged to secure the services of senators outside of Marion county to champion his cause. The above named gentlemen remembered their pledges to the people of Marion county and would not break their promises at the earnest solicitation of Durbin. I was one of Durbin's most ardent supporters at the last election, but on account of his betrayal of the people's interests and his broken pledges, cannot support him this year. EXPECT DEMOCRATIC HELP.

Filipinos Place All Their Hope in Democratic Triumph.

The following is taken from an Eastern exchange. It has appeared in a number of the newspapers of this country:

(Original.)

L'INSURRECTION DES PHILIPPINES.

Paris, 14 avril.
D'une lettre adressée de Manille, 15 février, au journal le Temps, nous extrayons les passages suivants:
"On sait qu'Aguinado, croyant ses ennemis satisfaits de leurs succès durant la saison sèche, octobre, novembre, décembre, fit des ouvertures de paix qui furent non seulement repoussées avec hauteur mais encore avec menace de traiter en rebelles les soldats Tagals qui tombaient entre leurs mains."
"Aguinado, alors dans le nord, fit comme s'il licenciait ses partisans, mais en leur donnant secrètement l'ordre de venir se grouper dans le sud autour de Manille où leur présence se signala bientôt par la mort du général Lawton et quelques combats. Ils y sont toujours."

"Tel est pour l'année qui vient de finir le bilan des Américains aux Philippines. Il n'est pas brillant, si l'on y a une lueur d'importation de la peste et la difficile solution de la question religieuse."

"Quoi qu'il en soit, la lutte entre Philippines et Yankees va recommencer avec la saison des grandes chaleurs et des grandes pluies et les ruines, et les morts violentes ne tarderont pas à faire de ce magnifique archipel un vaste cimetière."

"C'est dans le triomphe des démocrates des Etats Unis la prochaine élection présidentielle que les Philippines mettent aujourd'hui tout leur espoir. Si Bryan est élu président des Etats Unis, la paix sera la conséquence immédiate de son élection."

INSURRECTION IN THE PHILIPPINES.
Paris, April 1st.
From a letter addressed from Manila, February 15th, to the Journal le Temps, we extract the following passages:

"It is known that Aguinado, believing his enemies satisfied with their success during the dry season, October, November and December, made overtures of peace which were not only haughtily repulsed, but also with threats to treat as rebels the Tagal soldiers who might fall into their hands."
"Aguinado in the North pretended to dismiss his partisans, while secretly giving them the order to come and assemble in the South around Manila, where their presence was soon manifested by the death of General Lawton, and some battles. They are still there."

"Such is for the year just ended the showing for the Americans in the Philippines. It is not brilliant if we add the importation of the pest and the difficult solution of the religious questions."

"However it may be the struggle between the Filipinos and the Yankees will begin again with the return of the great heat and rain, and ruin and violent death will not fail to make a vast cemetery of this magnificent archipelago."

"It is in the triumph of the Democrats of the United States in the approaching Presidential elections where the Filipinos place all their hopes today. If Bryan is elected President of the United States peace will be the immediate consequence of his election."

Paris, April 6, 1900.

To the Editor:
"I send you a little translation I have made from an article which has appeared in not less than twenty (20) French newspapers. I send you also the original in French. I think the two ought to be published together. The French writer says that the Filipinos are making a cemetery of the magnificent archipelago. He tells how they killed Lawton and other Americans. He says the war is not yet over, and then adds that the only hope the Filipinos have is in the election of Bryan. That is all they are holding out for."

"IF THEY DID NOT EXPECT HELP FROM BRYAN AND HIS DEMOCRATS THE KILLING OF AMERICAN CITIZENS AND THE EXPENSE OF THE WAR WOULD END AT ONCE."

"The clipping I send you was written for the principal newspaper of Paris, 'Le Temps,' evidently written by a Frenchman who sympathizes with the men who are killing our soldiers. It is in the same tone as the articles that slandered our soldiers during the war in Cuba. The United States has not an enemy anywhere in the wide world who does not look for help and encouragement to the Democratic party. The United States have not a commercial rival that does not sympathize with the Democracy."

"Every human being who wishes to see our soldiers defeated is opposed to McKinley and in favor of Aguinado and Bryan. It is singular indeed what sympathy the Democratic party inspires among the enemies of our country. No such sentiment exists in regard to other countries. The enemies of France, Germany, England, Russia, or Italy are hostile to the entire people of those countries. But the enemies of the United States, of our brave soldiers and generals, who offer their lives for their country, look upon 'Democratic leaders as their allies.'"

"The only hope the Filipino insurgents have is Bryan. The only hope the American soldiers have is McKinley. It is the rebel flag, Aguinado and Bryan on one side; and the brave United States soldiers and McKinley, Stars and Stripes on the other. The line is very distinctly drawn. American voters will choose between these two. This is only a sample of what appears frequently in the European press."

If there is any limit to the handkerchief craze it is not yet in sight. Each day brings forth some unaccustomed use for this article.

Within the week I have seen kerchiefs of one sort or another made into waists, and, of course, neckties, belts, work bags, dust caps, parasols and table covers.

Perhaps the most revolutionary employment of a big gay handkerchief was as a wrapping for a bundle. It was in a Broadway cable car that I beheld this pleasing sight. A tailor-made girl of a fastidious type had a package jauntily under one arm, the tips of the fingers on the other hand keeping it from falling. The bundle was nondescript—one of those long, narrow objects which may be a bottle of sherry for a sick friend, some table claret or a pair of stays—or, in this particular period, a parcel of Lenten sewing. The girl was of the type which has sent things home as a general thing. It is a fair opinion that she would not have judged that ambiguous article a block if it had been bound with brown paper. The kerchief covering was one of the modish articles in bold Eastern hues which are enlivening the shops and embroidering current matinees.

If she had taken off her dark coat a waist of the same handkerchief stuff might have appeared. Perhaps the tailor-made woman bought four of these attractive articles—the necessary three for her waist and the fourth for an impromptu handbag.

At all events, with one gay silk square in sight, she attracted much admiring attention and no doubt inspired with the intention to do likewise some of the women who saw her original method.

And yet it was not so curious. Does not the typical self-made man come to town in his youth with his earthly belongings in a red bandanna? And the usual immigrant steps ashore with his wardrobe and furniture in a handkerchief knotted tightly in one grimy fist. In that unique volume, "Fashions in Paris, 1797-1897," I have read lately that the Paris woman of a hundred years ago did her marketing with the help of a big, bright kerchief, bringing home her vegetables in it.

So the simple fashion is nothing new—merely a survival after brown paper of what is prettiest and, therefore, perhaps, fittest.

The handkerchief parasol is a curious novelty. Done from silks resembling cashmere shawls, those large squares, twenty-eight or thirty inches, are mounted on square frames especially made for this purpose. The handles are of long, of natural wood, polished, and there is no other decoration than a knot of silk muslin at the top.

It is not bold to predict that the handkerchief smyrnashade will prove exceedingly popular for general use with morning gowns. But the same women who carry the bandanna parasols will wear handkerchief waists. What an opportunity for the exercise of taste in selecting colors which are harmonious!

For those of soberer mind, who may not care for parasols which come into competition with the rainbow, there are silver grays in modest checks and lines. Plain, solid colorings are rather discouraged in this summer's parasols, shapes are moderate in size and, except for the square novelties, much like those of last season.

Hemstitching plays its part in parasols, as in all manner of women's garments. One of the daintiest protections against afternoon sun is from white taffeta, with a hemstitched band of blue, pink or violet, as you like, two and a half inches wide, outlining the edge.

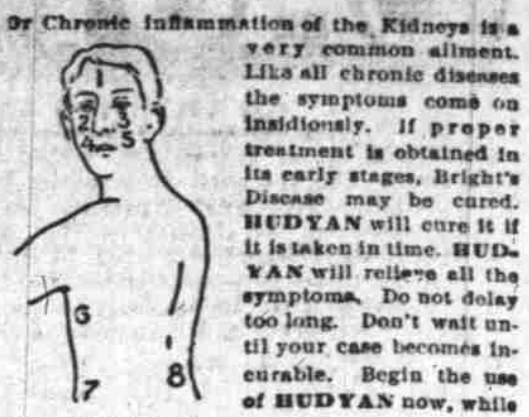
