A SUIT FOR DAMAGES

MRS. MARGARET BIELER, WHO WAS INJURED IN A RUNAWAY.

Brings an Action Against the Telephone Company, Alleging Neglect on Part of Its Employees.

(From Daily Statesman, May 30.)

A big suit for damages, for personal injuries sustained in a runaway on the streets of Salem, was yesterday filed in department No. 1 of the state circuit court for Marion county. The action is entitled Margaret Bieler and Henry Bieler, plaintiffs, vs. the Oregon Telephone & Telegraph Company, a corporation, defendants, and is based on the alleged fact that through neglect of the defendant's employees, the plaintiff's team was frightened into turning away and inflicting serious physical injuries on the plaintiff Margaret Bieler. The complaint states the following cause of action:

"That on the seventeenth day of March, 1909, in said city of Salem, Oregon, and upon one of the public streets and highways of said city and within said city, said plaintiff, Margaret Bieler, was then and there caring for and left in the charge and control of a team of horses, which were at the time hitched and harnessed to a hack in which said plaintiff, Margaret Bieler, was seated.

"That she was going so in the ordinary and usual manner and during business hours of said seventeenth day of March, 1909, about 12:30 p. m. of said day and date.

"That said defendant, by and through its agents, servants and employees, on said day and date, was in a grossly negligent manner, pulling upon a wire over said plaintiff, Margaret Bieler, and said hack and said team, upon and over said public street and highway, with full notice and knowledge that said plaintiff, Margaret Bieler, and said hack and team, were situated under said wire, and that by and through their said gross negligence in pulling upon said wire, as aforesaid, caused the same to break and fall upon said team and thereby frightened them and caused them through fright, to become uncontrollable and to run away hitched to said hack in which said plaintiff was at the time seated in the charge and control thereof, and that by reason of the same, said plaintiff, Margaret Bieler, was thrown in a violent manner from said hack so as to cause her great physical and bodily pain and to render her unconscious and to inflict upon her permanent physical disfigurement to her damage in the sum of \$3500.

"That by reason of the causing of said runaway by said defendant as aforesaid, said plaintiff Margaret Bieler was caused to and did suffer great mental agony and pain and great mental suffering and great terror to her damage in the sum of \$2500.

"That by reason of the causing of said runaway and said wrongful act of said defendant as aforesaid, said plaintiff was compelled to and did procure the services of surgeons and physicians and was compelled to expend and pay therefor, for her immediate care, the sum of \$700 and that said plaintiff is damaged by reason thereof, in said sum of \$3750.

"That by reason of the causing of said runaway as aforesaid by said defendant, said plaintiff was compelled to remain and did remain in a hospital for three weeks and three days at an expense of \$32 to her damage therefor in said sum of \$32.

"That by reason of the injuries sustained by said plaintiff, Margaret Bieler, and by reason of the character of the same, and by reason of the injuries sustained by her being by coming in contact with the ground when thrown from said hack, as aforesaid, she sustained injuries thereof that may cause her to lose her mind and reasoning powers, and cause her to incur expenses of medical and surgical treatment and nursing expenses and may cause her death, all of which are reasonably certain to occur, to her damage in the sum of \$5000.

"That said plaintiff, at the time and prior to the falling of said wire, as aforesaid, was caring for said team and hack in a painstaking and careful manner.

"That by reason of all of which said plaintiff is damaged, in the aggregate sum of \$11,060.50.

"Wherefore, plaintiff demand judgment against said defendant for the sum of \$11,060.50, and the costs and disbursements of this action."

Webster Holmes and Frank Holmes are attorneys for the plaintiffs in this case.

Other suits filed were: T. T. Geer, Governor, et al., plaintiffs, vs. Werner Beynand, et al., defendants; judgment is asked for \$1000 and interest at 8 percent from May 24, 1896, being due on a note, under date of August 4, 1893, secured by a mortgage on lots 6, 7, 8 and 9, Fairview addition to Salem. Attorney's fees of \$150 are demanded. M. W. Hunt and R. J. Fleming are attorneys for the plaintiffs.

Nancy Clark, plaintiff, vs. Thomas G. Givins, et al., defendants. The action is brought to set aside a bond for a deed, made on June 1, 1895, to 80 acres of land in T. 7 S. 3 W. The property was sold to defendants at \$3000 on deferred payments, and default having been made, the setting aside of the bond is asked for. Gabrielle Clark is attorney for the plaintiff.

DEMOCRATS AND HOER

IT'S ABOUT TIME FOR THE FORMER TO DROP THE LATTER.

Throw Him Down With All the Force Possible—His Record in the Legislature of 1895.

Salem, May 29, 1909.

To the Democrats of Marion County:

Many of the most earnest Democrats of this county, who have fought its battles here for many years, do not believe that party loyalty requires them to support the whole of what is known as the Citizens' ticket. It is not a Citizens' ticket. Earnest men who were sincere in their efforts to bring about real reforms were forced to the rear by men who have only their own selfish interests to serve. E. Hoier, of the Capital Journal, assumed the charge of this movement and his policy is, of course, as usual, he practices an unselfish interest and a desire to promote real reform. Is it possible that this man can any longer impose himself upon the credulity of the people? His whole interest in the cause of reform consists in "working" it in such a way as to bring money into the coffers of the Capital Journal. His every effort is to keep the Democratic and reform ranks in such a condition of confusion and demoralization as to prevent the establishment in this county of a straight Democratic paper that will fearlessly advocate Democratic principles. It is a burning shame that in this, the second county of the state in wealth and population, there is not a single Democratic paper. How can we ever hope for success or for a united Democratic party so long as we allow men of this stamp to force us to the wall while they pose as the only champions of the people and claim as a legitimate reward that all of the party patronage in case of success shall be so distributed as to fill their pockets and build up their paper? As Democrats we are allowed but one man on the Legislative ticket. The rest are men who never vote a Democratic ticket.

It is fair to say, however, that with the single exception of Hoier, they are honest men and not political grofers. As to Hoier's discussion is unnecessary. He has been expressing in this campaign his "profound contempt" for men who indulge in personalities in a political campaign. This comes from a man whose paper during the past ten years has contained more columns of venomous, scandalous and shameful personal abuse than any other paper ever published in this state. Not even the Portland Mercury in its palmy days would compare with it. No man who endorses his personal displeasure ever escapes. He has not confined himself to this. It has been repeatedly charged that he is personally corrupt. Names, dates and amounts, have been given, and responsible names have been attached to the charges. Business men of Salem, whose integrity cannot be questioned, and whose word no man questions, have openly charged him with offenses that would place any other man without his support entirely outside the pale of decent society. These charges, if true, which have been specifically made from time to time, cannot be denied.

Where does he ever show any unselfish interest in reform? Can any one name a single movement he has engaged in that did not seem likely away along at the end of the line to bring subscribers to the Capital Journal and money to his pocket?

How many lines of space would he devote to any citizen's movement for the purpose of advancing the public interest ahead of his? Does any one name a single movement he has engaged in that did not seem likely away along at the end of the line to bring subscribers to the Capital Journal and money to his pocket?

What was his record in 1895? THE HOUSE AND SENATE JOURNALS OF THAT SESSION SHOW THAT MORE MONEY WENT OUT OF THE STATE TREASURY THAN ANY OTHER MAN IN EITHER HOUSE. He cannot doze the record. Here are some of the bills he voted for:

- Drain Normal school, \$5,000.
- Graded school at Lakeview, \$5,000.
- Ashland Normal school, \$5,000.
- Pilot schooner on Columbia river, \$15,000.
- Publishing state school books, \$50,000.
- Eastern Oregon insane asylum, \$140,000.
- Appropriation to improve the Columbia river, \$300,000.
- General Appropriation Bill, \$1,257,433.99.

Besides various other items of useless expenditure. The total appropriations for which he voted as the House Journal shows, amounted to \$1,845,413.60. Only one other member of the House, Mr. Hope of Multnomah, approached within \$5,000 of that amount. He voted for \$1,840,413.60. The next highest man was Mr. Huffman of Union county, who was \$17,500 behind him. The next highest man was Mr. Davis, who was \$32,000 behind him. ONLY TWELVE MEMBERS IN THE WHOLE LEGISLATURE CAME WITHIN \$10,000 OF HIM AND ONLY FOURTEEN MEMBERS CAME WITHIN \$30,000 OF HIM. THE MOST EXTRAORDINARY MEMBER OF THE SENATE IN THAT SESSION VOTED FOR APPROPRIATIONS AGGREGATING \$367,733.81 LESS THAN HOER VOTED FOR.

This is his record for economy, after making his campaign in 1894, during which he made the same promises he is now making. Then he was abusing Democrats and Populists. Now he is abusing Republicans. How long will it be before he swings back? He now says he will vote for a gold standard and Republican rather than no Senator. Yet his paper supported the last hold-up. How can any man tell what he will do?

Does party loyalty require that we shall support this man? It does not. The Republican convention of 1896 that re-nominated Barkley and Craig greeted the name of Hoier with greans. He left that party because it was done

for him. He came so, as because he had no place, that to go, and now he poses as a dictator. No loyal and self-respecting Democrat is under any obligation to vote for him.
