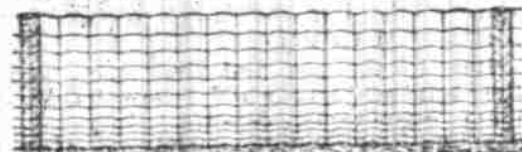

## GOV. GEER IS NAMED

HE IS SUGGESTED FOR MCKINLEY'S RUNNINGMATE.

Would Make an Excellent Candidate for the High Position of Vice President.

(From Daily Statesman, June 2.)

As the date for the session of the National Convention draws near, many of the states are trotting out there favorite sons for running mates for President Wm. McKinley, and a number of gentlemen, standing high in the councils of the Republican party, have already been suggested for the position of Vice President. Oregon, too has an available favorite son, in one of her leading citizens and statesmen, a native son of the state, who has often proven himself to be a loyal Republican, a campaigner of rare ability, and a vote-getter with few equals—Theodore Thurston Geer, of Marion county, the present honored chief executive of the state.

That Governor Geer would make an acceptable candidate to Western Republicans, for second place on the National ticket is not doubted, and his friends would love to see him recognized by the National Convention, and should the party find that, for the success of the ticket, a Western man should be chosen, Governor Geer would easily be the attention of the party leaders, and what more natural than to name Oregon's honored Governor, the "Abraham Lincoln of the Pacific Coast"?

The Astoria Daily News, in an issue of recent date, publishes several very complimentary notices of Gov. T. T. Geer, the "Tall Fir Tree of Marion." They are given below:

"Governor Geer is the 'Tall Fir of Marion.' His level-headed rulings as speaker of the House attracted popular attention. Then his tenacious fight for the collectorship rallied many people to his standard and finally his resolute advocacy of the gold standard and his witty, though able and logical, speeches in its behalf gave him the leadership of his party in the state and made him Governor."

"McKinley and Geer's" stranger things have happened in politics than the "Tall Fir of Marion" becoming a running mate for McKinley. It would be a most fitting combination—the East and far West joining hands to reach out to the Philippines and to Asia to commerce. Ohio and Oregon would be a fitting alliteration. It would recognize the West at a time when its recognition would have a national and also international significance.

"The only thing in the way of lightning striking Geer is the danger of Oregon going so strongly Republican as to make it a policy to take the Vice-President from some doubtful Eastern state. A close vote in Oregon might give Geer National prominence for the place."

"A united party, a great administration, an epoch-making era, and the plain evidences of prosperity and glory for the flag—success in war and in finance—however, will be apt to remove Geer from the list of Vice Presidential possibilities by making Oregon as solidly Republican as Ohio."

## PROGRESSIVE FARMER.

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## HOME-MADE ICE-CREAM.

(Ruth Brown in Farm Journal.)  
A subscriber asks how to make good ice-cream at home, as she can find sale for it and thus help along with the family expenses. As there may be others who could earn something in this way, especially where summer boarders abound, we give directions; avoid any thickening substances like corn-starch or arrowroot; though if the cream is not rich the yolk of one egg may be added. Good pure cream, ripe fruit, or the best canned in winter, good flavoring extracts, will make to perfect a cream that there is sure to be a demand for it.

A good freezer that works with a crank, and double revolving dasher is best. Fruit and fruit flavorings should be added after the cream is frozen.

The best ice-cream is made by first scalding half the cream and dissolving half the sugar in it while hot; raw cream frozen has not so good a flavor and is less smooth and velvety, but swells more than when scalded, thus making a larger amount. When half the cream has been scalded and the sugar dissolved, cool it, then add the remaining cream, and before turning it into the freezing can see that the dasher and can are adjusted. Pour in the mixture, put on the cover, fasten the crank and give a turn to see that all is right. Pound the ice fine in a coarse bag; a four-quart freezer will require ten pounds of ice and two quarts of coarse, or rock salt. Put a layer of ice three inches deep, then one inch of salt, and repeat till the can is full; turn the crank slowly and steadily till it goes pretty hard. If properly packed it will keep about twenty-five minutes to freeze. It is best not to freeze too quickly. When frozen remove the crank, wipe the lid of the can, and take it off carefully, not allowing any salt to fall in the can; remove the dasher and scrape it off; take a large wooden bowl, fill, press down with a spoon, bind the edge of the mold with a piece of letter paper, press the lid over it; dip a strip of muslin in melted butter and cover the joint, then pack it in ice for an hour or two.

These are the general directions for making all kinds, and the following proportions will also answer for all: For vanilla cream, use one quart of cream, half a pound of sugar, one vanilla bean, or two tablespoonfuls of extract. Put the sugar, half the cream, and the bean split in half on to boil. Stir constantly for ten minutes, then take from fire, scrape out the seeds; inside of bean, mix with the cream, and freeze as above.

For a fruit cream, make thus: One quart of cream, one pound of sugar, a quart and a half of strawberries. Put half the sugar and half the cream to boil, then cool. Add the other sugar to the berries, and mash. Put the remainder of the cream to what was boiled and freeze. When frozen purely stiff, add the berries and beat thoroughly.

## RUMOR IS PREMATURE

NATIONAL GUARD ENCAMPMENT WILL BE HELD IN SALEM.

Reported Yesterday, Locally, That the Guardsmen Would Camp at Albany—Accommodations at Salem.

(From Daily Statesman, June 2.)

There was a rumor current on Salem's streets yesterday to the effect that the annual encampment of the Oregon National Guard would not be held at Albany; that it had been changed to Albany. An investigation of the rumor proved that it had no foundation. Neither Major R. H. Leabo nor Captain Walter Lyon, of Company C, had received any official notification of the change.

The origin of the rumor is easily accounted for. The State Fair Board recently contracted with I. C. Mosher for the cultivation of the tillable land at the Fair Grounds, where the encampment is to be held. The enclosure within the race course, which affords the only adequate parade grounds at the Fair Grounds, has been seeded to clover and will not be harvested when the encampment is to be held—July 7th to 15th. This condition was responsible for the circulation of the report. It is no other arrangement can be made, the general committee that is arranging for the entertainment of the state military might make satisfactory arrangements with Mr. Mosher whereby they may pay him the value of the crop that he would necessarily be obliged to sacrifice, or in some other way adjust the matter. At any rate, the encampment must and will surely be held in Salem, which is quite the proper place for holding it. Being the capital of the state and quite centrally located, Salem certainly has every claim to the encampment.

While the report alluded to is unquestionably without foundation, still now, that the actual conditions at the Fair Grounds are known, it will be well for the committee on arrangements to take the matter in hand and give it an immediate and definite consideration.

The State Military Board will hold a meeting in this city on Wednesday next, when the matter will be finally determined, and arrangements concluded. By that time the committee of the Salem Chamber of Commerce will be able to report just what the Capital City will do toward entertaining the militia.

In a general article on the coming encampment, the Portland Telegram on Thursday had the following:

"The main topic of interest now in National Guard circles is the annual encampment, which takes place at Salem July 7-15. The present Guard will be able to make a fine showing in the open field. It includes every branch of the service—artillery, cavalry, infantry and naval reserve men."

"The tactics, therefore, will be especially interesting and of a range wide enough to tax the skill and experience of the officers. Colonel Everett and his new staff officers will be able to get thoroughly acquainted with each other and with their men. While every one of the officers is well qualified by former service in the regular army, in the open field counts more than several months in the armory."

"For one thing, field movements can be conducted upon a scale impossible at other times. Both the officers and the men are given the benefit of regimental drills, and only those who have been service know the difference between handling an army and a company or battalion."

"From the time the men leave home until they break camp they are under regular army discipline. The looseness that sometimes characterizes company drills, gives place to rigid army rules. Guard mount is maintained and no militiaman can leave or enter the lines without a special permit, or else the countersign. Those who violate the rules are punished by being made to do work, such as cleaning around the officers' tents and helping at mess."

"From taps to reveille it is one round of drill and work for the citizen-soldiers. There are plenty of opportunities for snatching pleasures, however, and the 'old uns' know how to make the most of their chances."

"There are enough volunteers in the ranks of the Guard to make the work of the officers comparatively easy. There are enough of those to follow orders and keep good formation which will necessarily swing the raw recruits into line and prove valuable guides for the latter's training."

"The adjutant general and his corps of helpers are already busy preparing for the encampment. And while it is not intended to 'stunt' the Guard in any manner, the adjutant general expressly enjoins all commanding officers to keep down the items of expense as much as possible. It is not intended to spend a cent that is not absolutely necessary. There have been times when it was said of the Guard that it seemed to see how much of the state's money could be 'blown in at an encampment,' but there will be no room for such criticisms about the coming encampment if the adjutant general's orders are carried out. If the Oregon Guard has ever guilty of such a thing it must have been a long time ago, for it is several years since it was allowed enough money for an encampment."

The old house at Marksburg, La., where Ruth McEnery Stuart, the authoress, was born, has been purchased by a Marksburg lawyer, and will be torn down. Friends of Mrs. Stuart in St. Louis offered him double the price he paid for it, but he refused to sell.
