"There have been added to the library in this time, 79 volumes. Most of these have been selected by the teachers of Lincoln school out of the many good books published on natural history and historical subjects. OUR MEXICAN POPULATION. Few Immigrants From the Southern

Republic to the United States.

By the last census taken in 1895 the opulation of Mexico was 12,578,000. By the last census of Canada taken in 1896 its population was 5.125.000. There are thus more than twice as many inhabitants in Mexico as in Canada, and the facilities of travel between Mexico and the United States and Canada and the United States are equally good; but by the last census there were 1,000,000 Canadians in the United States and only

77,000 Mexicans-a disparity so great is to require some explanation. It has generally been supposed that a majority of the Canadians in the Unit-

ed States are residents of either the he Canadian-born population of the United States is pretty evenly distrib-uted, and by the last Federal census there were 181,000 Canadians in Michigan, 26,000 in California, 40,000 in the state of Imnois, 17,000 in Iowa, and m

state of Illinois. 17,000 in Iowa, and more curious still perhaps 3,000 in Texas . Two-hirtds of all the Mexicans in the United States are to be found within the state of Texas, and the other one-third in the other fortyfour staes and territories of the coun try. By the last census the whole number of Mexicans resident in New York was returned as 3,30, of Missouri 130, of Elinois 143, and of Colorado
