At Ymoude, in Holland, the three sets of lock-gates at the mouth of the Norzée canal are opened and closed by electricity, power being generated at a single station for the three. The great difficulties due to the heavy masses to be moved and the necessary slowness of the motion, as well as the presence of moisture everywhere, have been well overcome and the system moves very smoothly. About 45 horse-power is required at each gate, this opening it full, against a difference of level of 4 inches of water in 90 seconds. The by-pass gates for filling and emptying the lock compartments are also controlled by electric motors.

GIRL BALKED THE DIGGERS.

Bloomburg, Pa., June 30.—The village of Benton, this county, is telephone crazy. All the business of the town has been suspended, everything having given way to a controversy between Doctor Patterson of that place and the Columbia Montour Telephone Company.
The company had prepared a hole prior to planting a telephone pole in front of Doctor Patterson's residence, but before they had a chance to place the pole the doctor's daughter jumped into the hole, and nothing could induce her to get out. The company dug another hole and placed one of the men in it, the doctor in the meantime standing over and threatening him.

Saturday evening the doctor came to Bloomburg and succeeded in obtaining an injunction from the court restraining the company from planting the pole. During his absence the company had a gang at work, and upon his return the work had been completed. The enraged physician cut down the pole that night, and now the matter will go to court.

side the Constitution, and whose people can never become citizens. We are in favor of extending the Republic's influence among the nations, but believe that this influence should be extended, not by force and violence, but through the persuasive power of an high and honorable example.

"The importance of other questions now pending before the American people is in nowise diminished, and the Democratic party takes no backward step from its position on them, but the burning issue of imperialism, growing out of the Spanish war, involves the very existence of the Republic and the destruction of our free institutions. We regard it as the paramount issue of the campaign."

Militarism is opposed and a small standing army and a well disciplined state militia are deemed amply sufficient in time of peace. On trusts the platform says:

"We pledge the Democratic party to unceasing warfare in nation, state and city against private monopoly in every form. The existing laws against trusts must be enforced, and more stringent ones must be enacted, providing for the publicity as to the affairs of corporations engaged in interstate commerce, and requiring all corporations to show, before doing business outside of the state of their origin, that they have no vested interest in stock, and that they have not attempted and are not attempting to monopolize any business or production of any articles of merchandise, and the whole Constitutional power of Congress over interstate commerce and mails, and all modes of interstate communications, shall be exercised by enactment of comprehensive laws upon the subject of trusts. The tariff laws should be amended by putting the products of the trusts upon the free list, to prevent monopoly under the plea of protection. The corporations should be protected in all their rights, and their legitimate interests should be respected, but any attempt by corporations to interfere with public affairs of the people, or to control the government, which created them, should be forbidden under such penalties as will make such attempts impossible."

Following is the plank, endorsing the Chicago platform and declaring for silver at the ratio of 16 to 1:

"We reaffirm and endorse the principles of National Democratic platform, adopted at Chicago in 1896, and we re-iterate the demand of that platform for an American financial platform, adopted by the American people for themselves, which shall restore and maintain the bimetallic price level, and as part of such system, the immediate restoration of the free and unlimited coinage of silver and gold at the present legal ratio of 16 to 1, without waiting for the aid or consent of any other nation."

The Dingley tariff bill and the currency bill, enacted at the last session of congress, are denounced. The election of United States Senators by direct vote of the people is favored, and government by injunction is opposed. Continuing the platform says:

"We favor the immediate construction, ownership and control of the Nicaraguan canal by the United States. We condemn the Hay-Pauncefote treaty as a surrender of American rights and interests, and not to be tolerated by the American people."

"We favor the continuance and strict enforcement of the Chinese exclusion law and its application to the same classes of all Asiatic races."

"We earnestly protest against the Republican departure from our traditions, which has involved us in the so-called world politics, including the diplomacy of Europe, and in the intrigue and land grabbing of Asia, and we condemn the ill-considered Republican alliance with England, which means discrimination against other friendly nations, and which has already stifled the nation's voice, while liberty is being strangled in Africa. We extend our sympathies to the heroic Burghers in their unequal struggle to maintain their liberty and independence."

"We denounce the shipping subsidy bill, and favor the reduction and speedy repeal of the war taxes."

BONDS APPROVED

INITIAL MEETING OF REORGANIZED COMMISSIONERS' COURT.

Bond of County Treasurer Raised to \$40,000—Circuit Judge Boise Makes Some Orders.

The reorganized commissioners' court of Marion county held its initial business session yesterday, the meeting being the regular sitting for the month of July. The commissioners' court is now constituted as follows:

Judge, John H. Scott, of Salem; Commissioners: Wm. Milley, Aurora; I. C. Needham, Sidney.

For the ensuing two years the court fixed the bond of County Treasurer A. L. Downing at \$40,000. The bond heretofore furnished by that officer was only \$30,000.

The bond of Dr. D. F. Lane, as county coroner, in the sum of \$30,000 with M. Dorian, E. M. Croisan and J. H. Lunn, as sureties, was approved.

County Clerk W. W. Hall presented his bond in the sum of \$10,000 with Ben Brown, S. T. Hobart, E. T. Hall and E. P. Walker as sureties and the same was approved.

Sheriff F. W. Durbin filed his bonds aggregating \$40,000, with the court and they were also approved. Mr. Durbin furnishes bonds in the sum of \$10,000 as sheriff and \$30,000 bonds as tax collector. His sureties are: G. R. Gray, J. J. Dalrymple, W. H. Byrd, A. T. Gilbert, and O. E. Krause.

The court also accepted the bond of County Recorder J. H. Roland in the sum of \$30,000, furnished by the Fidelity and Guaranty Company.

FRIENDS' ELECTION.

Officers Chosen at the Yearly Meeting—The Uniform Discipline.

Newberg, Or., July 3.—The meeting this morning is much smaller than it has been, as many have gone home. At the opening of the business meeting epistles from Baltimore, New York and California Yearly Meetings were read. Much fellowship is kept up by the means of these epistles. All of our Yearly Meetings seem to be impressed with the growing spirit of war and the influence of the saloon.

The remainder of the session was given to the consideration of a uniform discipline for all the Yearly Meetings of America. After much discussion the matter was referred to the Representative Meeting for their consideration and modification and to bring it before the Yearly Meeting again next year.

The afternoon session was begun by reading the epistles from Kansas and North Carolina Yearly Meetings. The main theme of the afternoon was the pastoral and church extension work. David Hadley, who has been twelve years superintendent of the Evangelistic work of Western Yearly Meeting, (Indiana) gave a very practical talk to both the congregations and the pastors—the relation they should sustain to each other. This talk was followed by talks from John Henry Douglas, Levi D. Barr and others.

The following officers were elected for the coming year: Chas. Baldwin, superintendent; Anson Cox, superintendent of Salem Quarter; Levi D. Barr, superintendent of Newberg Quarter.

July 4.—On this great national holiday, the closing session of our Yearly Meeting occurred. The crowd was somewhat smaller but the deep spiritual feeling was not abated. In the morning session the epistles from Ohio, Indiana, Iowa and Canada Yearly Meetings were read. The reading of these called forth remarks from a number of persons.

Reports from the Church Extension Board and Oversight were read. The afternoon was given to the reports of various committees and unfinished business.

In the evening a farewell and testimonial meeting was held, over eighty testimonies being given. Thus closed one of the best Yearly Meetings ever held at Newberg.

LI HUNG CHANG.

Where He Stands in China's Present Crisis.

The position Li Hung Chang has taken toward the Chinese Reform party would be interesting information for those who remember General Grant's declaration that Li Hung Chang was not only the greatest Chinaman alive, but the greatest statesman alive, and for those who have seen the little memorial tree and bronze tablet placed by the astute Celestial at Grant's tomb at Riverside, New York. In the light of a recent open letter by a reformer it seems that Li Hung Chang has by no means been consistent in his attitude toward this movement. Leung Chi-so, one of the leading reformers, for whose head the empress dowager has offered a reward of \$25,000, states that Li Hung Chang was assisting him in the work of reform only a year and a half ago, and sent a message promising him support. Leung Chi-so says that after he had escaped from Peking to Yokohama a message from Li Hung Chang was brought to him by Marquis Ito. This message reads:

"Look upon your exile as an opportunity to study the customs of the West, in preparation for the glorious career of service to your country that awaits you when China calls back the sons she is now sending to ignominious exile."

"Since this time Li Hung Chang has become allied with the empress dowager in her opposition to the reformers, and it was he who, by order of the empress, offered the reward for Leung Chi-so's head."

rious disbursing officers, which shows that to date the cost of the Spanish and Philippine wars has been \$388,000,000. This covers the national defense fund, the expenses of the Paris peace commission, and the \$20,000,000 paid to Spain for the Philippines. A tremendous financial resources of the nation from the fact that the war revenue act alone has been the means of raising \$222,000,000 within the past two fiscal years. The meaning of this is that the United States is almost capable of conducting a great war and paying the bills as the war progresses. Indeed, if side issues had not arisen out of the Spanish war—if the United States could have abandoned its war footing with the signing of the Paris treaty—the income from the war revenue act would have come close to balancing the entire cost of the war. Or, if we could return to a peace footing today, the revenues derived from that act would pay out the war debt in about 16 months, and we should have our increased navy and coast defenses as an asset.

It is also an impressive fact that after two years of warfare, and the expenditure of nearly \$400,000,000 the treasury is embarrassed with a surplus that is accumulating at the rate of about \$5,000,000 per month. The following statement shows the receipts and expenditures of the government for the months during the current fiscal year:
