THE OLD MINTO TRAIL

RESTORED AND REOPENED BY CAPTAIN S. B. ORMSBY.

The Easiest Mountain Pass in the Cascade Range Can Now Be Traversed by the Public.

Captain S. B. Ormsby, superintendent of the Cascade Forest Reserve, and one of the most painstaking and efficient officers in the service of the Forestry Department of the Federal Government, yesterday made the statement that the old Minto trail, crossing the Cascade mountains, has just been re-opened by his forest rangers on the reserve, after this road through the mountains, the easiest pass through the Cascades, has been closed for a number of years.

This will be welcome news to the residents of this portion of the Willamette valley and of that part of Eastern Oregon directly east of Marion and Linn counties, as the opening of this trail gives another line of communication between Western Oregon and Eastern Oregon, where travel can be had at no expense for tolls, and over the easiest grade of any of the half dozen roads and trails connecting the two sections of country.

The Minto pass was discovered by Hon. John Minto over forty years ago, at his instance it was surveyed, and he led the work of opening the trail through the mountains, connecting the Willamette valley with the Eastern Oregon stock ranges. The trail was constantly in use until a few years ago, when the Corvallis & Eastern Railroad Company extended its line up to Detroit, when a portion of the trail was made impassable by reason of the road being constructed upon it. Last year Captain Ormsby decided to reopen the trail, by cutting a connection between the valley and some point on the trail beyond Detroit, and four of the forest rangers, operating in that vicinity, were ordered to do the work. They performed the duty assigned them by cutting through the woods and building a trail, from a point beyond Melama, where it leaves the wagon road, up the Elkhorn, to the North Fork of the Santiam river, over the divide between the North Santiam and Clackamas rivers, past Elk lake and Hot Springs, striking the Minto trail at the Thomas place, six miles east of Detroit. This trail has been completed, and this year Superintendent Ormsby ordered his rangers to clear out the trail from that point across the mountains, and a letter, received by the superintendent yesterday, reports the completion of this part of the work, and the opening of the trail connecting the Willamette valley and the Eastern Oregon ranges.

This, now, is the nearest route of travel from this portion of the Willamette valley to all points in Crook county. The trail can be reached from Salem by going to Melama, thence by the newly opened trail to the Thomas place, six miles beyond Melama, and thence by the Minto trail through the mountains to where the trail strikes the wagon road on the Matolis river, at the Riggs place.

The destruction of the old Minto trail by the construction of the railroad over its western end, caused a practical abandonment of this route of travel through the Cascade mountains, but this favorite trail through the most picturesque portion of the Cascades has now been restored, without the cost of a cent to the public, and travelers can now go up the railroad to Detroit, secure pack animals there, and cross in to the fine grazing lands of Crook county in Eastern Oregon with little trouble and hardship, connecting at the other end of the trail with the excellent wagon roads of that section of the state. This way of going requires a partial trip by rail. Another, and probably the more popular way of going would be to secure pack animals here in the valley, go by way of Melama and the new trail, striking the old Minto trail beyond Detroit. Superintendent Ormsby intended, in providing this trail, to give travelers, who so desire, an opportunity to avoid the railroad, and travel all the way with pack animals.

Superintendent Ormsby deserves great commendation for his efforts in restoring this old and popular road through the mountains so that it can again be used for travel and communication between the valley and Eastern Oregon, and many travelers who will use this trail during the coming years, will remember with gratitude the painstaking Federal official, who restored this old roadway to use and made it possible for travelers to pass over it, thus, in many instances, saving a wide detour, and giving them free access to some of the most picturesque portions of the Cascades on their way to or from Eastern Oregon.

WRECKED IN ALASKA.

A Yukon River Steamer Destroyed—Two Persons Drowned.

"The Upper Yukon steamer Florence S., was yesterday wrecked in Thirty-Mile canyon on the Lewis river. The purser and two women passengers were drowned. The purser's name was Malby.
