ROOSEVELT IS COMING WEST

Will Speak in Montana, Idaho and Utah.

CANNOT COME TO THE COAST

His Tour Includes Many States in the Mississippi Valley — Negro Editors in Session.

CHICAGO, Ill., Aug. 27.—Governor Roosevelt's route for his trip through the West was announced today. Starting from Chicago on September 9th, he will speak in Wisconsin, South Dakota, North Dakota, Montana, Idaho, Utah, Wyoming, Colorado, Kansas, Nebraska and Iowa, before reaching this city again. On September 17th he will speak in Helena, Mont.; September 18th, Butte, Mont.; September 19th, Pocatello, Idaho. He will not visit Oregon, Washington and California.

VOTED DOWN.

Indianapolis, Ind., Aug. 27.—The National Afro-American Press Association today opened with over fifty delegates in attendance. A resolution to endorse the administration of President McKinley was voted down after a hot discussion.

THEY WILL FUSE.

Idaho Democrats and Populists to Heal Their Differences.

Boise, Idaho, Aug. 27.—The Democratic and Populist leaders are gathered here for the purpose of arranging a fusion as tentatively agreed on at a recent conference in Chicago. The plan is to have the Populists take down their electors, and they are to be given the Representative in Congress, the State Auditor and the Mine Inspector. There has been much talk the effect that there might be trouble in bringing about an arrangement, but those interested appear to feel confident it will be accomplished. The formal conference is to begin tomorrow.

MAIL FOR NOME.

Contract Let to Carry Letters via Dawson During the Winter.

Washington, Aug. 27.—The Postoffice Department has given the contract to the Canadian Development Company (limited) to carry the letter mail from Skagway to St. Michaels and Nome, from December 1st to March 31st. The route will be via Dawson.

FITZSIMMONS IS OUT.

Has Announced His Permanent Retirement from the Ring.

New York, Aug. 27.—Robert Fitzsimmons today announced his retirement from the pugilistic ring. He made an ineffectual attempt today to get on a match for the heavyweight championship with Jas. J. Jeffries, to take place before the Horton law expires, at midnight next Friday.



THE WOOLEN MILLS

ONE HUNDRED PEOPLE EMPLOYED IN ITS OPERATION.

One of the Manufacturing Concerns That Did Not Close During the Hard Times.

There are 100 people employed by the Salem Woolen Mill Co. at present, and this force keeps the mill in operation day and night. By running nights does not mean that the mill is making a great deal of money or has a great rush of business, for it has been the policy of the management of the mill to run day and night and there have been few nights in the last fifteen years when the mill was not running, of course, excepting Sunday nights and time lost by the destruction of the plant by fire, a few years ago. The mill does not keep a great stock of goods on hand, but contracts in advance; that is, sells goods and then makes them. For instance, the mill is now making goods on a contract made some months ago. The mill is making cloth, flannels and blankets to the value of about \$15,000 per month.

It requires about 300,000 pounds of wool for the use of the mill annually; most of the stock has already been purchased for the coming year. About one-half has been taken from the valley and the remainder comes from Eastern Oregon.

This was one of the manufacturing concerns, it should be remembered, that did not close its doors during the hard times—that struck the nation a few years back. This mill, instead of closing, crowded the limit of its capacity and by this means was able to run without a loss. Salem needs a dozen mills like this, under similar management, and the time is coming when the city will have them, too.

CAUGHT IN THE ACT.

About 1:15 o'clock this (Tuesday) morning, Officer Smith discovered two men at work on an old engine just south of the South Commercial street bridge, apparently detaching fixtures. The officer succeeded in capturing one of the men, but the other escaped. The one arrested was taken to the city hall and locked up, but nothing was found on him to indicate that he had removed anything from the engine. However, just as the officer seized him the fellow threw away some-

thing, which appeared, from the sound it made in striking, to be a piece of metal, probably some part of the engine, which, if found on the prisoner's person, would have been incriminating evidence against him. The fellow refused to give his name. He will have a hearing this morning.

FAREWELL SERMON.

Rev. J. J. Evans, pastor of the First Christian church, preached his final sermon on Sunday evening, to a large audience. Rev. and Mrs. Evans leave on Friday for Red Bluff, California, where Rev. Evans will assume the pastorate of the Christian church. Rev. Powell Mr. Evans' successor, will arrive in this city in a couple of weeks and will assume charge of the local church.

A WORKER.

"Gilbert, Patterson & Brophy will soon have one of the best places in the county. H. Brophy is a worker."—Eola correspondent in Dallas (Polk county) Itemizer. This refers to Henry Brophy, ex-warden at the penitentiary who is now a tiller of the soil in the well-known hop and stock farm alluded to in the foregoing.
