A FATAL ACCIDENT

W. A. RUMMEL KILLED AT HIS FEED MILL.

Bursting of an Emery Wheel in His Repair Shop Crushed His Skull—Died Last Night.

W. A. Rummel, who has for the past eight years conducted a feed and elder mill in South Salem, was the victim of a distressing accident at a few minutes past 12 o'clock, noon, yesterday, from the effects of which he died at 8:55 o'clock last evening at the Salem Hospital.

Mr. Rummel was at work in a small room in the feed mill at his home in South Salem, and was employed in gumming a circular saw by means of an emery wheel, when the wheel burst, being shattered into a thousand pieces, a portion of it striking the unfortunate man in the forehead, and cracking open his skull. He dropped to the floor in an unconscious state and never regained consciousness.

Mrs. Rummel, who was in the adjoining room, heard the sound made by the bursting of the wheel, and hastened to her husband's side whom she found lying on the floor the blood flowing from a horrible gash in the forehead. Her shouts for help brought in Henry Helmske, who at once telephoned for Drs. W. H. Byrd and J. N. Smith. Neighbors quickly gathered, and kindly hands soon ministered to the injured man, until, a few minutes later, the physicians arrived. It was soon seen that the man was fatally injured, but the doctors decided an effort would be made to operate on the wound. Accordingly the bleeding form of Mr. Rummel was placed on the asylum car, and conveyed to the Salem Hospital located at the Lone Oak Orphanage.

Here an operation was performed; the brain of the injured man, which was laid bare by the bursting wheel, was cleaned, a hand full of small pieces of the wheel, some as large as a man's finger and an inch in length, and a piece of Mr. Rummel's hat, were taken out, having been driven through the skull by the force of the explosion.

BOUNDED TO DEATH.
A Man Who Refused to Strike Persecuted to the End.

New York, Aug. 30.—The body of James Rankin, a machinist, was found yesterday on the rocks off Fort Wadsworth by two sentries. It had been left there by the outgoing tide. When the coast and waistcoat had been removed, two fatalities were found tied with picture wire to the waistband. A single turn had been taken with the wire around the neck, and there were several turns about the body which kept the iron in position. There was a cut over the left eye. It was at first believed that the man had committed suicide, and that to make certain he would drown had fastened the weights about his body.

Late last night Walter Bateman identified the body as that of James Rankin, a machinist and steamfitter. From what Bateman told Coroner Stever the latter is of the opinion that it may not have been a case of suicide but of murder.
