FOR THE SCHOOLS

APPORTIONMENT MADE BY THE COUNTY SUPERINTENDENT

Of Funds for the Marion County District
Schools—A Large Sum Thus Distributed.

(From Daily Statesman, Oct. 4.)
County Superintendent E. T. Moores of Marion county, yesterday made the regular quarterly apportionment of school funds among the various districts of the county. A portion of the amount distributed is derived from the state irrefutable school fund, which is apportioned to the counties of the state on the first day of August each year. The remainder comes from the 5-mill county levy for school purposes. Below is given the number of the district, and the respective amounts of state and county funds apportioned, the per capita being \$1.50 state funds, and 59 cents county.
