

THE HEARING OF YOUTSEY

Sensational Scene in the Court Room in Kentucky.

GOEBEL MURDER CASE ON TRIAL

The Defendant Became Hysterical and Declared the Dead Man Was Alive—May Be Demented.

GEORGETOWN, Ky., Oct. 9.—One of the most remarkable scenes ever enacted in a Kentucky court, occurred tonight in the Youtsey trial, the defendant himself being the chief participant. The court room was crowded, and excitement was intense, when Arthur Goebel was put on the stand, and Judge Ben Williams, who for the first time appeared for the prosecution, did the questioning. Arthur Goebel said: "I talked with Youtsey the day he was arrested, late in the afternoon, in the jail in Frankfort in reference to the murder of my brother."

Just at this moment Youtsey arose behind his attorneys, and in a loud voice said: "It is untrue—it is a lie—I never spoke a word to that man in my life, nor he to me."

Colonel Crawford told him to be quiet and sit down, and others took hold of him.

"I will not sit down. I never said a word to that man—it is untrue." He was shouting by this time, and every one was on the tip of expectation. Youtsey's wife sprang to his side, and while endeavoring to make him sit down, could be heard saying:

"Now you have killed my husband I suppose you are satisfied."

Then Youtsey hysterically shouted again:

"I am innocent—there is no blood on my hands; these men are swearing my life away."

Two or three deputies went over and grabbed him. He struggled wildly and said:

"Let me alone; I will not sit down."

After Youtsey was forced into his seat, he shouted again:

"Goebel is not dead—all the demons in hell could not kill him."

Youtsey settled back in his chair, closed his eyes and seemed in a state of collapse. Judge Cantrell then postponed the case until tomorrow.

Deputies carried Youtsey to the jail, as he was unable to walk. Various reasons are assigned for this unseemly outbreak, the first being that his long confinement and the strain of the trial have caused him to become hysterical and lose control of himself. Another is that he is really demented, as was shown by his remark that Goebel was not dead. His condition is deemed critical.

A RARE SIGHT.

Many Vessels Crossing the Columbia Bar—Whales Look On.

Astoria, Oct. 9.—Those fortunate enough to be at the mouth of the river Sunday witnessed two rare sights. During the afternoon five merchantmen came into the harbor in a procession, only the first vessel being in tow, though she too, used her canvas. The arrivals were the German four-masted ship Nautia, the German four-masted ship Altair, the French bark Amiral Combet, the French four-masted bark Europa, and the British four-masted ship County of Edinburgh. About the same time the German ship Eva, the transport Braemar and the Italian ship Elba put to sea.

During this marine parade 16 whales added to the picturesque scene by sporting in the water just inside the Heads, and, as their backs showed above the water, myriads of seagulls perched upon them.

The Europe, one of Sunday's arrivals is the finest ship which has been in the harbor for years. She is commanded by Captain Muller, who is only 26 years of age, but is an excellent French and English scholar. The Europe's cabin surpasses the drawing room of the ordinary residence, and throughout the ship is magnificently fitted up. She is three years old and is now in Astoria harbor for the first time.

A YOUTHFUL MURDERER.

ARTHUR KELLEY WILL COME TO THE REFORM SCHOOL.

Killed His Father—His Mother's Testimony Saved Him from Going to State's Prison.

PENDLETON, Or., Oct. 9.—Arthur Kelley, aged eleven, the self-confessed murderer of his father, was today sentenced to the State Reform School at Salem by Circuit Judge Ellis. The grand jury returned a true bill, but recommended that the boy be sent to the Reform School instead of the penitentiary. The wife's testimony supports the claim of the boy that the father habitually kicked, cuffed and knocked down the members of the family, the mother and ten children.

A CHANGE MADE.

Disappearing Gun Carriages Will Be Made No More.

Washington, Oct. 9.—The board of ordnance and fortifications has recom-

mended to the Secretary of War that no more disappearing gun carriages be made. The consensus of opinion has been that the disappearing carriage was good for low sites, but the majority seemed to think that it was not best for high sites. The action of the board, if sustained by the Secretary of War, will be of far-reaching importance in the future of coast defenses.

OPENS TODAY.

Spokane, Wash., Oct. 9.—The north half of the Colville Indian reservation will be opened to settlement at noon tomorrow. Hundreds of homeseekers are already on the land and many are waiting close to the borders. Some declare their intention of holding valuable claims with Winchester. If necessary, a great rush is expected at the Spokane and Waterville land offices tomorrow, but little trouble is expected, owing to the great area of the tract thrown open, which is about equal in size to the state of Delaware.

THE GUILTY CHINESE.

LI HUNG CHANG INFORMED OF THE SENTENCES IMPOSED.

Upon Prince Tuan and Other Officials Guilty of the Peking Troubles—Several Heads Fall.

PEKIN, Oct. 7.—The response to the German demand has been transmitted to Li Hung Chang. This says that Ying Nien, president of the Censorate; Lam Yi, assistant grand secretary and Chao Shu Chiao, president of the board of punishment, will be decapitated; that Prince Chingwen, Duke Tsai Lan, and Prince Yih, will be sentenced to life imprisonment, and that Prince Tuan will be banished to the Imperial military postroads on the Siberian frontier, as a further punishment for adding the Boxers.

CONGRESS' ADVICE.

Washington, Oct. 9.—It developed today that Minister Conger, in compliance with the suggestion from Secretary Hay, had submitted to the State Department a list of ten or twelve names of Chinese officials, who were prominent in the Boxer movement against the foreigners, and in a great measure responsible for the assaults on the Legations in Peking. These officials, Conger believes, should be included with Prince Tuan, and others in any punishments which are to be inflicted upon those who took a prominent part in the Peking outrages.

THE LIMIT.

Strikers Can Hope for No More Concessions from Employers.

Scranton, Pa., Oct. 9.—Interviews with prominent coal operators here today elicited the uniform declaration, that no further concessions or modifications of the present offer would be made, and that the miners must take it or leave it just as it stands.

WILL BE DISBANDED.

London, Oct. 9.—The British War office has issued orders that the bulk of the militia regiments, called out for service during the South African war, are to be disbanded. This will affect about 50,000 men.

PORTO RICO RIOTS.

Street Fights and Bloodshed the Result of Politics.

New York, Oct. 9.—A dispatch to the Herald from San Juan, Porto Rico, says: Four persons, one of them a woman, was killed in another political street riot in Guayama, which lasted all last night. The rioting started in a cafe when a member of the Federal party shot and severely wounded a Republican. Several of the latter's party friends tried to lynch the Federal, but were prevented by eight Americans.

Federals from Arroyo hastened to reinforce the Federals in Guayama and a bloody street fight followed. The rioting was kept up during the night and three men and a woman were killed, while twenty others, including several policemen also, were wounded. Several of those will die.

Armed hands paraded the streets later, shooting and shooting and terrorizing the town. The whole district is arming and the police force is utterly unable to cope with the rioters. The parties are about equally divided in numbers. Leaders of the Republicans are urging their followers not to engage in rioting, but the Federals are determined to avenge the San Juan affair and further bloodshed is expected.

Animosity between Federals and Republicans is increasing as the time for the election approaches, and all over the island are evidences that trouble may break out at any moment.

PROPERTY IN CROOK

ASSESSMENT ROLL FOR THIS YEAR SHOWS A DECREASE.

A Considerable Falling Off in the Valuation of Taxable Property—The Annual Summary.

The clerk of Crook county yesterday filed the summary of the assessment roll for 1900, in the office of the Secretary of State. The summary shows a gross property valuation of \$1,796,684, a decrease of \$21,946, and the total taxable property is given at \$1,686,322, a decrease since 1899 of \$29,467. MR. CAREY DISSATISFIED.—Mr. Carey thinks he has a right to complain about the news item that appeared in yesterday's Statesman concerning the difficulties he is having with his former tenant, John Allen. He says Mr. Allen occupied his farm near Macleay only one year. According to the lease, says Mr. Carey, the tenant was to deliver over everything and leave the place in as good condition as he found it. But he delivered nothing, and the farm was left in bad shape. The cherry trees were washed down, a Berkshire sow worth \$20 was taken away, besides her increase, chickens were carried off, and also apples, pears and other fruit and potatoes, corn and various vegetables off of ten acres. Mr. Carey says he pays a large tax in Marion county, and that he considers himself entitled to the protection of the law.

AN INCREASED DEMAND.—The unusual activity in building circles that has prevailed in Salem and vicinity for several months past is continuing without abatement this late in the season. In addition to the construction of the new Odd Fellows' temple and theatre and the remodeling of the McCormack block, there is a great deal of general building and improvement work in progress. Manager A. N. Moores, of the Capital Lumbering Company, yesterday said the sales of lumber and building materials for the season of 1900 would surpass by a considerable amount the aggregate of the 1899 sales. This may be taken as a reliable index to the general prosperity of this community, which is certainly good.

DEATH OF MRS. MCKINNEY.—Mrs. R. B. Crothers went to Brownsville Monday, to attend the funeral of her mother, Mrs. Melissa McKinney, who died there Sunday. Mrs. McKinney had been sick for some time, and her death was not unexpected. Her husband was to son of Rev. John McKinney, a pioneer Methodist preacher, and many of their family relatives and friends live in Salem and Marion county. For many years Mr. and Mrs. McKinney lived on a farm in Linn county, but about eight years ago they moved into Brownsville.
