A PICTURE OF BRYAN

A CORRESPONDENT PAINTS HIM AS HE APPEARS TO MANY.

The Inconsistency of His Appeals to Patriotism and His References to the Immortal Lincoln.

Salem, Oregon, October 20, 1900. Editor Statesman:

In the face of the imperialistic boggy Bryan's "paramount issue," and all the bombast and fustian attending the attempted promulgation of so called imperialism, it is nevertheless, a paramount fact, that there is not an intelligent, educated citizen of the United States, who has the least shadow of fear of kingly rule in this country.

What stupendous rubbish and hypocrisy, then, is all this assumed alarm? No man ever in American politics has heretofore so grievously insulted American manhood as to go blatantly howling over the country, that the average American citizen is such a cowardly scoundrel and all around imbecile as to tolerate such government for an hour were it attempted.

Mr. Bryan has such an estimate of American voters, he is too ignorant to be entitled to respect. If he knows better, it would be drawing it mildly to conclude that he is a ranting hypocrite wholly unworthy to trust.

True Americans believe that we have the best government in the world, imperfect, it is true, because it is of human origin.

This course is consistent with his history both personally and ancestral. His father was a copperhead in the 60's. Mr. Bryan gave the strongest endorsement of our war with Spain by getting a commission as Colonel, and leading a regiment to the Gulf States.

The whole Democratic party cursed and abused McKinley for not declaring war with Spain sooner, and have been abusing him and sympathizing with the enemy ever since he complied with their vehement demands.

Bryan used all his personal influence to secure a confirmation of his treaty with Spain, knowing all its provisions, and has been abusing the Administration ever since because the treaty was confirmed, and now wants the American people like a whipped cur to disgrace our national pretensions by hauling down our flag in the Philippines.

His, in keeping with his demagogic instincts, dodges all questions as to Democratic nullification of the 14th and 15th Amendments of the Southern states, (where he expects to get most of his electoral votes), and switches to a merry howl as to one tribe of the Philippine semi-barbarians, and seems to believe that they are more enlightened, and can institute a better form of government than our own.

His agonies over the low wages paid the Pennsylvania miners are incredible, and by inference holds out the idea that if he were President the wages and conditions would be greatly improved, when if honest, he would have to tell them that as President he could not raise their wages one nickel.

He is opposed to government by injunction, which is a sop to burped law-breakers and anarchists, and is simply intended to mean, that for their votes they can riot and break heads to their hearts' content without hindrance from him.

adoption of Lincoln. His ancestry and his party cursed Lincoln day and night as a tyrant deserving of death, and finally worked up Democratic sentiment which resulted in his assassination. They denounced Lincoln as more kinds of a tyrant, usurper, and constitutional destroyer than any other American who ever lived.

Bryan's paternal ancestor with old Adlai Stevenson, are said to have been the most active howlers of the whole kit of rebels. What accursed hypocrisy is this?

The name of Grant and Caesarism were synonymous and the alarm for the integrity of our nation (on the part of Democrats who had just been licked for trying to destroy it), was something which shows the depths to which hypocrisy can reach.

Are we now ready to put our national and governmental interests into the care of this whole aggregation of political hypocrisy and double dealing, sympathy with our enemies, and enmity to our country, subterfuge and falsehood?

We are asked as Americans to place in the highest place of honor this nation can give, this prince of political frauds, and an avowed enemy to law and order—a man who is pledged to degrade our currency, and thereby contaminate the channels of business life.

A man who desires to so far reconstruct the United States Supreme Court as to make it subservient to riot and anarchy.

A man who has no sincere thought except personal political advancement. A man who is always in sympathy with his country's enemies, an all around shuffler and double dealer? The average American is too numerous to be generally corrupted and too intelligent to be generally duped by demagogues, and can not be led to carry zeal for reforms to lengths incompatible with security of property and maintenance of social order.

The professional demagogue who would subvert law and order, and coddle anarchy, prompted by the thought of the advancement of his political ambition, or for any other cause, is a fit inhabitant of those dark and loathsome nooks in our political system, where bigotry nestles with corruption, with never a sincere thought or emotion prompted by true patriotism and love of country.

THE DAIRY BUSINESS

OREGON CREAMERIES' PRODUCT MEETS EASTERN COMPETITION.

This State Consumes an Enormous Amount of Good Butter—More Dairy-men Needed.

(From Daily Statesman, Oct. 24.) The dairy business in Oregon continues to grow and expand, and the local creameries are taxed to their full capacity in taking care of the cream, milk and butter fat received from their patrons.

The Portland Telegram, a few days ago, had the following article on the dairy business in Oregon, which will be of interest to the readers of the Statesman:

"There is no relaxation in the dairy movement, although the price has dropped 2 1/2 cents per pound. New dairies are being started every day and in addition to supplying the local market, considerable butter is being shipped outside the state, especially to Puget Sound cities."

"The drop in price was caused by an Eastern carload shipment cutting into the market. Butter has been quoted much higher here than in Chicago, and a dealer took advantage of that fact to order a carload of Eastern butter and placed it in competition against local butter."

"Another important fact which is being overlooked by dairymen is that Oregon creamery butter must be of the best quality, if they desire to build up an outside butter market. Once the state gets the reputation of producing the finest grade of butter made, the market will be unlimited, and the demand so far ahead of the supply that the best prices will be obtained."

"The present shipment furnishes an object lesson by which local dairymen can profit."

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WILL MEET ROEBER. New York, Oct. 23.—Paul Pons, the French wrestler, who claims the championship of Europe, has arrived in this country. He says he has won victories over Bech Olsen, the Dane, who secured a fall from Ernest Roerber, the American champion, and Youseff, the original "Terrible Turk." Pons has decided to come to America in quest of a match with Ernest Roerber.

THE YACHT RETURNED. New York, Oct. 23.—George Gould, it is reported in South Brooklyn yachting circles, has taken back the steam yacht Atlanta and relieved the Colombian Government. Confirmation is found in the fact that Mr. Bissell, who has for years been the chief engineer of the Atlanta, has again taken charge of her for Mr. Gould, and that the officers and crew of the yacht engaged by the representative of the Colombian Government have been discharged.

IT IS INTENDED THAT THE new regiment of Irish Guards shall have a band. It will be entitled to 42 musicians. The band will be located in Dublin and not in London.

A PECULIAR CASE.—Bernard Shafer, a lad aged 17 years, was brought to Salem yesterday, by his mother, a resident of Portland. The mother called at Governor Geer's office, accompanied by the boy, and asked that the young fellow be sent to the Reform School. The woman gave

the boy rather a bad character, and, as his father was dead and she had no other support, she asserted that she could not keep the son. The Governor directed the mother to County Judge John H. Scott, and the woman and boy repaired to the court house. Judge Scott questioned the woman regarding the boy's behavior, then taking the boy to one side, questioned him also. He soon found that the boy was an unsophisticated young fellow, who had been given little opportunity to make anything out of himself, but was willing to work for a living.

Judge Scott told the woman he would keep the boy for the present, and find him a place on a farm where he would be cared for, and she apparently happy to be rid of her son, left for her home in Portland. Judge Scott took the young man, who is really a pleasant and docile appearing boy, to his home in South Salem. He will keep the lad for a few days, giving him employment at plowing in wood. Later the boy will find a home on the farm of Judge Scott's brother near Falls City. It is likely that humane treatment and decent care he will make a man of the unfortunate young fellow, who, at the hands of his mother, has evidently received poor treatment in the past.

TO THE ASYLUM.—Alexander Prandon was brought to the asylum yesterday, from Linn county by Sheriff G. W. McHargue. The patient is 74 years old, a resident of Plainview, a native of Indiana, and a farmer by occupation. He has been a sufferer for four years. His insanity was caused by an injury.

FROM UMATILLA COUNTY.—Frank Cardwell and James H. Childs were yesterday brought to the penitentiary from Umatilla county, to serve terms of six years each for larceny.

NEW CITIZENS.—County Judge John H. Scott yesterday admitted to full citizenship Edie Carlson and I. A. Carlson, natives of Finland, and former subjects of the Czar of Russia.

IN SUPREME COURT

ONE MULTNOMAH COUNTY CASE ARGUED YESTERDAY.

State of Julius Loewenberg Involved—Two Minor Orders Were Entered.

(From Daily Statesman, Oct. 24.) In the department of records, at the Marion county court house yesterday, a homestead patent was filed for record, by which the United States Government transfers to John W. Gearhart, of Clackamas county, under date of September 5, 1890, 160 acres of land, being the southeast quarter of section 32, T. 7 S. R. 3 E. In addition there were filed three mortgage satisfactions of \$3500, \$3300, and \$700 respectively; one real estate mortgage for \$2500, and one assignment of a mortgage for \$1000. The two deeds filed had an aggregate consideration of \$1895. They are: J. A. McClain and wife to W. F. Schuller, 50 acres in T. 9 S. R. 4 W. d. \$1000 F. W. Durbin, sheriff, to Williamerry, 15 acres in T. 7 S. R. 3 W. 895 Total \$1895

CABINET CHANGES. New York, Oct. 23.—A dispatch to the Journal and Advertiser from London says: There are reports of many Cabinet changes impending. Lord Curzon is coming from India, probably to take Mr. Balfour's place. Balfour is becoming Foreign Secretary. Lord Cromer may succeed Curzon. Chamberlain will remain in the Colonial Office. Curzon's return means that he will be put in training for the position of Premier.

MRS. BRICE ILL. New York, Oct. 23.—Mrs. Calvin B. Brice, the widow of Senator Brice, of Ohio, is ill in her home in Fifth avenue. Her condition, according to the Herald, is such as to cause grave fears as to her recovery. Mrs. Brice passed the latter part of the summer in the Adirondacks. At the first cold weather she was brought here in a special car. One of her sisters has since been constantly with her. Her physician said that in his professional position he was unable to discuss her condition in any way.

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THE RAILROAD PASS. St. Louis, Mo., Oct. 23.—The railroad lines west and southwest of the Mississippi river, comprising about 130,000 miles of track, took action here today on the pass agreement for the coming year. The old agreement was reaffirmed, and an additional clause adopted, providing a penalty of \$100 for the violation of the agreement. Each line is to put up a deposit of \$500.
