

### WOMEN WILL ACT.

Propose to Investigate Conditions in New Island Possessions.

**MINNEAPOLIS, Minn., Nov. 15.**—The National Council of Women today decided to investigate the conditions of the social and domestic life in the new island possessions of the United States, and, if its commissioners deem it wise and so recommend, to establish permanent commissions in the islands.

## OPERATORS OF COTTON MILLS

### Urge the State Department to Secure the Open Door

### IN CHINESE EMPIRE FOR TRADE

### Boxers Troubles Have Cut Off Half the Markets of Southern Makers of Cotton Goods.

**WASHINGTON, Nov. 15.**—Secretary Hay has received a petition from nearly all the leading cotton manufacturers of the South, to take such action as may lie within his power to prevent interference, by any European power, which might close foreign markets to cotton manufacturers of the United States and injure other American interests. The petitioners declare that the "open door" policy is necessary to secure the retention of the important trade in cotton drills and shirtings with China, most of which are manufactured in the Southern states.

The petitioners represent fully \$15,000,000 in capital, and declare they have lost half their trade since the Boxer uprising, and are running on half time.

### A FRIEND IN NEED.

**London, Nov. 15.**—Rev. Evan Morgan, the last foreigner to leave Siam Fu, has arrived here. His life and the lives of the other missionaries in Siam Si province, were saved by Governor Tuan, a kinsman of the notorious Prince Tuan. Governor Tuan, when he received the decree from Peking to kill all the foreigners, warned Morgan and his colleagues and gave them an escort.

### SEPARATE TREATIES.

**New York, Nov. 15.**—The conclusion seems to have been reached in Peking to conclude peace with China without undertaking at present the complete revision of the treaties of commerce, says a dispatch from Washington to the Journal of Commerce. A general articles will be inserted in the treaty of peace subscribed by the powers providing that China shall consent to the revision of the treaties of commerce, but shall deal with each power separately.

Whether the result of these negotiations will be as satisfactory as a general treaty guaranteeing to the citizens and subjects of all the powers complete freedom of traffic in the interior of China, remains to be seen. It appears to be thought at the State Department and among some of the Ministers at Peking that difficulties and delay would arise in seeking to deal with desired changes in detail at present. It may be possible for the leading powers to secure concessions regarding interior trade which will drive the entering wedge for like concessions to all. Most of the powers are entitled to the privileges of "the most favored nation," and will be able to ask for themselves whatever is granted to any of the other powers.

The fact that the Chinese Imperial Government consents to the revision of the treaties as a general proposition is considered at Washington an important point for securing what the civilized powers desire. The process of obtaining further concessions may be slow, but it is hoped that pressure upon the Chinese Government will

secure them as fast as they can be availed of. Many of the concessions heretofore granted by China to capitalists and syndicates have been little more than waste paper because the syndicates have not proceeded to carry out their plans.

When a syndicate or group of capitalists is able to demonstrate readiness to proceed with actual improvements in China it is believed at the State Department that little difficulty will be experienced in getting the consent of the Chinese Government.

### ANXIOUS TO FIGHT.

### Jeffries Signs Articles for Two More Battles in the Ring.

**NEW YORK, Nov. 15.**—Jim Jeffries today signed articles of agreement for a fight with Gus Ruhlin and Tom Sharkey. According to the stipulation the bout with Ruhlin is to take place first. The terms of Jeffries and the signed agreement were forwarded to Ruhlin at Mahony City, Pa., and Billy Madden notified his agent in this city that \$2500 had been deposited, on behalf of Ruhlin to cover the champion's money. The Jeffries-Ruhlin agreement calls for a 25-round contest before the club offering best inducements, on or about June 1st. In the signed agreement, which Jeffries today sent to Tom Sharkey for his signature, the fight is to be on the same terms as the Jeffries-Ruhlin contest. The date for the match is set for on or before July 1st. Jeffries reserves the right to meet both Fitzsimmons and Ruhlin before the match with him, providing a match with Fitzsimmons comes off on or before June 1st.

### J. Pierpont Morgan's Daughter Married in New York City.

**NEW YORK, Nov. 15.**—Miss Louise Pierpont Morgan, daughter of J. Pierpont Morgan, was married this afternoon, in St. George's church, to Herbert Livingston Satterlee, a lawyer of this city. The invitations for the ceremony numbered 2500, much beyond the seating capacity of the church.

The bride received from her father a superb tiara and a collar of diamonds and a brooch of Marquise diamonds, set in treface design, and, it is said, Mr Morgan has set aside for her bonds of great value.

### TROUBLE IN STANFORD.

### ILL FEELING FOLLOWS RESIGNATION OF A PROFESSOR.

### President Jordan Issues a Statement Regarding an Occurrence in the Big University.

**STANFORD UNIVERSITY, Cal., Nov. 15.**—President Jordan today said:

"In regard to the resignation of Dr. Ross, it is right that I should make a further statement. There is not the slightest evidence that he is a snafu to the freedom of speech. Nor is there any reason to believe that his withdrawal has been due to any pressure of capital or any other sinister influence. I know that Mrs. Stanford's determination was reached only after a long and earnest consideration, and that its motive was the welfare of the university, and that alone. To quote her own words:

"My decision has not been the result of any hasty conclusion, but of disappointment, reflection and prayer."

Dr. Ross said: "It is absolutely certain that freedom of speech is involved, not in my appearance, personally, or character, but solely my non-partisan, scientific utterances have been the root of Mrs. Stanford's distrust of me."

Upon the subject of Professor Ross' dismissal, Dr. Howard today addressed his class in history, and his address forms a sensational statement. The entire hour of the class was given up to the discussion of "free speech."

Dr. Howard arraigned the influence that brought about the dismissal of the professor. Prof. Howard concluded his speech with this sensational utterance:

"I do not bow down to the spirit of Market street; I do not doff my hat to the Six Companies, neither am I afraid of the Standard Oil."

### CENSORSHIP REMOVED.

**MANILA, Nov. 15.**—The censorship was removed today. General MacArthur, however, has issued directions to the cable companies ordering them to furnish him with a copy of all press dispatches.

## WILL HANG THE MURDERER

### Citizens of Limon, Colorado, Will Execute Louise Frost's Assassin.

### At a Mass Meeting They Instructed the Sheriff to Bring the Negro, John Porter, to the County—Croker Surprises Tammany Hall by Fighting Vice.

**DENVER, Colo., Nov. 15.**—A special to the News from Limon, Colo., says: A mass meeting of citizens from all parts of Lincoln county was held here tonight, and resolutions adopted requesting Sheriff Freeman to bring John Porter, the negro murderer of Louise Frost, to the county at once.

It was decided that the negro shall be hanged, but that no torture shall be permitted. It was positively asserted that Porter will be executed when brought to the county, no odds how long the delay.

### NEGROES LYNCHED.

**Jefferson, Tex., Nov. 15.**—Three negroes, who have been arrested for waylaying and attempting to kill Mr. Stallcup, were taken from jail last night, by unknown persons, and hanged to the railroad bridge. The negroes had confessed the crime.

### CROKER FOR REFORM.

**New York, Nov. 15.**—The executive committee of Tammany Hall held a meeting tonight, at which Richard Croker made all the leaders good bye, and took a hand in starting a movement to rid the city of vice. In a 15-minute speech the Tammany leader said he

was going to Europe for his health, not pleasure.

Lewis Nixon then, by a resolution, had a committee of five appointed "to investigate the moral conditions of the city, and to receive and suggest remedies for the correction of abuses." Nixon was made chairman. The other members are George C. Clauson, president of the Park Board; Michael C. Murphy, president of the Health Board; John J. Scannell, fire commissioner, and John W. Keller, charities commissioner. Croker then said:

"I want to reiterate what I said three weeks ago to you, and that is that not one dollar comes into my possession from the landlords of pool rooms and houses of ill fame, and if any one of you gentlemen are collecting for any of these people, you had better get out of the organization. It has no use for you. You are a disgrace to it. The organization can't and won't stand for any such thing."

The meeting broke up in confusion, because of the attitude of Coroner Fitzpatrick, the Tammany leader in the Fourteenth Assembly district, who denied that there were any disreputable houses in his district. He said that if there was any vice there, it was in the tenement houses, and could not be controlled. To this Croker excitedly replied, that the coroner did not know what could be done until some effort could be made.

### FULL PARDON GRANTED

### OTIS SAVAGE RELIEVED FROM SERVING IN PRISON.

### He Was Convicted of Robbing a Treasure Box Six Years Ago, but Did Not Serve His Time.

**Gov. T. T. Geer yesterday granted a full pardon to Otis Savage who was convicted in November, 1894, in Wasco county, of the crime of larceny, and sentenced to four years in the penitentiary. The Governor gives as one of the reasons for exercising executive clemency in his case, the fact that the pardon has been asked by a large portion of the taxpayers and business men of Wasco county; that six years have elapsed since his conviction, during which time he has been out on bonds, while the sentence itself was for only four years; that, the delay was without fault on his part, and the district attorney, who prosecuted the case, says, "no good purpose would now be subserved by his incarceration."**

The young man's health is poor, nearly all his family having died of pulmonary troubles, and he suffers from the same disease, and it was urged that, should he go to the penitentiary, the four years' sentence would really be a life sentence. Eleven of the trial jurors signed the petition for clemency.

The young man is the son of the late Hon. O. S. Savage, an early pioneer, and an one time county judge of Wasco county. His mother died, when he was 11 years old, leaving three children. The other two have since died, leaving him the only living member of the family.

The crime of which the young man was convicted was the breaking open and robbing of the Pacific Express Company's treasure box, at The Dalles, in October, 1894, of \$14,000. Savage and a young man named Kline were arrested for the crime, when Kline confessed, implicating Savage and telling where the treasure was secured. The money was found, and Kline, pleading guilty, was sentenced to the penitentiary for 18 months. Savage stood trial, was convicted on Kline's testimony, and sentenced to four years' imprisonment, but appealed the case to the Supreme Court. No further action was taken by the state.
