THE NEW FLOURING MILLS.

A Statement by A. M. Humphrey & Co. Regarding the Company's Plans.

A. M. Humphrey & Co. of this city, yesterday gave out a signed statement regarding the plans of the Farmers Warehouse & Milling Company, the incorporation of which was noted in yesterday's Statesman. The statement is as follows:

"With an experience of ten years in the warehouse and grain business in Salem and the Willamette valley, we think the time has arrived, both for Salem and the surrounding country, to enlarge the A. M. Humphrey & Co. warehouses at Salem and Macleay, and we have incorporated the same for the purposes set forth in the articles of incorporation, under the name of the 'Farmers Warehouse & Milling Co. of Salem, Oregon.' We deem it an absolute necessity to take this step. Our one great object is to put the business on a more permanent footing and to build and operate, in connection with the Salem house, an exchange flour mill for the purpose of exchanging flour for wheat with the farmers who desire to come to Salem with wheat; and, secondly, our opinion is, we need a good strong organization, with head office in Salem, to deal in grain and such other commodities as it is necessary to handle throughout the valley. Our idea is not an experiment, but a legitimate business already in operation in various localities in the valley, extending last year, from Corvallis to Portland and in various places, both on the East and West Side railroads. It is our intention to work earnestly and solely with a view to attaining the objects of the incorporation, until our plans are fully carried out, and it becomes a flourishing business in the Capital City of Oregon. And with this in view we ask the support of the entire community."

SERVANT GIRLS IN GERMANY.

Government is the Regulator of Domestic Affairs.

In Germany the government takes a hand in the servant girl problem, as it does in almost everything else, and it has succeeded in partially solving at least one phase of the difficulty, says the Washington Star. It has reduced the servant girl's "flightiness" to a minimum; she can not change places once a week the year around. For, when she moves, the government, represented by the police, must know all about it, and if there is any difficulty or dispute, disagreeable questions may be asked.

Indeed, the process of employing a servant girl is a good deal of a business transaction, with a decidedly official tinge. The girl comes to your kitchen and you agree with her about the wages, and she says she will stay. Then you must go to the police station and purchase for five pfennigs (about 1 cent) a white card, or bank, which has spaces for all sorts of information about the new "girl." You must write down her full name, where she came from, whether married or single, her trade, whether cook, chambermaid or waitress; her birthday and year, her nationality, her religion, her own home, and if married how many minor children she has, where they are and who their guardian is. The government always looks out well for the children, and sees that they are provided for comfortably, this being the most necessary, as many, per haps most, servants are married women with typically large families. At the same time that this blank goes in the "girl" must also send a blank reporting her change of place. Having done all this you must see that the girl pays her regular fees to the insurance, so that she may not become a public charge in case of her death or disability.

All this ceremony tends to make it difficult for a girl to move about, or for the master to discharge her with small cause. Should it be necessary at any time for the girl to change there must be more business with the police. The household now buys a green blank, or card, on which he reports with the same completeness of description the departure of his servant. And there must be no delay in any of these ceremonies else the police, who have their fingers on every man, woman and child in Germany and know just where each individual should be at any given time, will begin making inquiries, and if you have not reported you are taken before the magistrate and fined.

circulation of servant girls so familiar to every American householder, in which the Germans follow the Maggies and the Kitties follow the German "girls" expect such deference as those in America; they are industrious and quiet; they are willing to work for little or nothing, and to do any sort of disagreeable task, but on the other hand, not so much is expected of them as in America, and their mistresses are perhaps more tolerant. It may be added, however, that the German "girl" has her regular Sunday soldier or policeman as well as the American girl; that is a problem which even the German government can not solve.

CONCERNING CLOSETS.

Triple closets have recently been introduced in the bedrooms in some country houses and those desirable additions are artistically designed to match the rest of the woodwork. Some have three glass doors, with only two doors of glass, and a middle partition with open shelves, in front of which a curtain is drawn. The glass doors are lined with silk to match the prevailing tone of the furnishings of the room and the hanging closets likewise, while the closet reserved for hats and parasols is not alone lined, but has shelves of glass. Concealed behind a secret panel, which opens at the back of the closet upon pressing a button, are shelves for shoes. This end of the closet is left open for ventilation. This style of closet is admirably adapted to apartment houses, where closet room is usually at a premium. In a handsome, large, detached house, located in the most picturesque section country seat, the ingenious mistress planned a closet for her special use which is a model of its kind. It is concealed behind a large, polished wood door which opens to reveal long drawers and vertical compartments wherein are stored her gowns, hats and shoes. The wide drawers, each with its delicately perforated lining, are long enough to hold a dress skirt without creasing, and are broad and deep as well as long. The compartment for the waists is equally commodious, and the hat closet, with its broad shelves, the narrower section for parasols, and the shoe corner, are as complete as it is possible to have such conveniences when ample room is at the command of the designer. The closet has been placed in a small corridor directly connected with the private suite of the mistress of the house.

TO WED A MILLIONAIRE.

THE TRADE IN HOPS.

Valentine Lowel, the New York Dealer, Reports on Conditions in the New York Market.

Valentine Lowel, of New York, in his Products Price Current under date of November 10th, says of the hop market:

Exports to Europe for week, 1,000

Imports from Sept. 1, 882

In the interior markets of this state there has been steady, and on the whole rather free, buying again this week, and while prices for top grades have made no further advance the range of values has narrowed somewhat, medium qualities showing some improvement. Sales have been at 15 @18c in most sections, but 19@20c was paid for very choice growths in what is considered the best locality this year. On the Pacific coast there has also been a free movement of stock at full prices. Coupled with these strong influences have been still firmer cable advices from the English markets, and the interest shown by exporters in our hops has given the situation here a very healthy look. Business with brewers was interrupted somewhat by the National election, but they have been inclined to take on more hops, and have paid full rates for the qualities wanted. Our slightly revised quotations cover the transactions reported in 1900 hops, and a firm feeling prevails. Of the 1899 hops but few remain in first hands, and when sold they bring full former prices. The older growths do not share much in the trade.
