**YERKES IS RE-APPOINTED.**

REPUBLICAN CANDIDATE FOR GOVERNOR IN KENTUCKY

Again Fills the Position Vacated by Him Before His Campaign—Collector of Internal Revenue.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 15.—John W. Yerkes, late Republican candidate for Governor of Kentucky, today was appointed Collector of Internal Revenue for the Eighth District.

Yerkes, who resigned the office to which he has been reappointed to make his campaign in Kentucky for the Governorship, said he had abandoned all idea of contesting Governor Beckheim's election.

Leslie Combs, chairman of the State Republican committee of Kentucky, who resigned his position as Pension Agent at Louisville to conduct the state campaign, it is understood, will also be appointed to the office he formerly held.

**REPUBLICANS WIN OUT.**

HAVE THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEBRASKA

Control Both Houses and Have a Majority of Five on Joint Ballot—The Alabama Caucus.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 15.—Assistant Secretary of War Meiklejohn tonight wired the Associated Press as follows: "Omaha, Neb., Nov. 15.—The official count of Omaha and Douglas county has just closed, showing one Republican Senator and seven Representatives elected. This gives us the organization of the House and Senate, and seventy-two votes on joint ballot, a constitutional majority of five."

Montgomery, Ala., Nov. 15.—The joint caucus of the Democrats of both houses of the Alabama Legislature, tonight, unanimously elected J. T. Morgan for United States Senator.
