WHY MANY HEELS ARE LOST.

Machine Pegging on Shoes Is Not Conducive to Long Wear.

"Have you noticed," asked the observant man, "how often one sees the portions of shoe heels scattered about at the elevated road stations and other places where a lift might easily be torn off? I wonder what the reason is? In the old days the heels of one's shoes were the part that clung to the uppers most closely. You newspaper fellows are supposed to know everything. Just answer that commudrum." The writer could not, but a shoedcaler could, and did, "The reason," said he, "is because in these days of machine-made shoes the heels are fastened on by machinery, as is every other part of the shoe. iron is used for the nafls instead of steel, as this is handled more easily. When the lifts of the heels have been fastened in place the nails protrude. The shoes are then sent to another machine where they are shaved off instead of being driven home, as in the days when the work was done by hand.
