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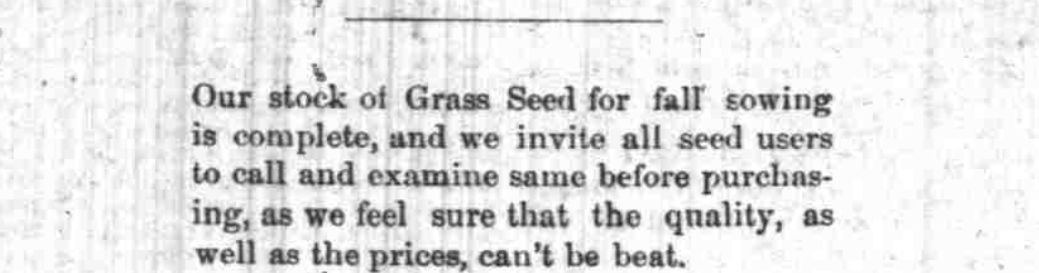
TO CURE A CHILD OF STUTTERING.

AT THE BLIND SCHOOL

REPORT OF TROUBLE AT THAT STATE INSTITUTION.
Efforts to Be Made to Settle the Misunderstanding in an Amicable Way.
(From Daily Statesman, Nov. 25.)
Regarding the Oregon State School for the Blind, the Portland Telegram of last evening, has the following telegram from Salem, under date of yesterday:
"The State School for the Blind is again to become a subject of investigation, and the time of the State Board of Education will be taken up this afternoon hearing some sensational charges against the management. A fight on Superintendent Carter is being made by a Miss Colby, of Independence, and her father was in Salem yesterday with the avowed determination to make things warm for him."
"Miss Colby is a young woman of about 24 or 25 years of age. She was a pupil of the school and was expelled but now claims in a sworn statement that there was no cause for her expulsion and that Superintendent Carter is incompetent to control pupils or to command their respect. She also charges that proper food is not served to the pupils; that there is a constant system of jealous espionage going on in an endeavor by the superintendent to ascertain who of the pupils are 'standing in' with him and who are not, and that those whose fealty is doubted are unfairly treated." "George Huzzar, assessor of Umatilla county, who has a little daughter in the school, has been here a day or two looking into matters and is much dissatisfied, having heard so much since he came here as to shake his confidence, and he will watch the proceedings before the board with anxiety."
"There has been a good deal of trouble at this institution the past few years, wherein teachers, pupils and superintendant are arrayed against each other, but Superintendent Carter has been able so far to make the most satisfactory showing to the board, and they have sustained him. Mr. Colby and his daughter have flooded their eye and will make a strenuous effort to discredit him this time."
Mr. Colby and his daughter were at the Capitol yesterday, to see the State Board of Education, and spent an hour with Gov. T. T. Geer. The other two members of the board, however, Mr. Duntz and Prof. Ackerman out of the city and, therefore, no board meeting was held. It is to be hoped the entire trouble is the result of a misunderstanding, and that it will be amicably adjusted in the near future.

WHY MANY HEELS ARE LOST.
Machine Pegging on Shoes Is Not Conducive to Long Wear.
"Have you noticed," asked the observant man, "how often one sees the portions of shoe heels scattered about at the elevated road stations and other places where a lift might easily be torn off? I wonder what the reason is? In the old days the heels of one's shoes were the part that clung to the uppers most closely. You newspaper fellows are supposed to know everything. Just answer that conundrum." The writer could not, but a shoemaker could, and did. "The reason," said he, "is because in these days of machine-made shoes the heels are fastened on by machinery, as is every other part of the shoe. Soft iron is used for the nails instead of steel, as this is handled more easily. When the lifts of the heels have been fastened in place the nails protrude. The shoes are then sent to another machine where they are shaved off instead of being driven home, as in the days when the work was done by hand. The result is that they are insecurely fastened, and if one catches the heel of his shoe against a stair so that there is the least strain on it it gives way and pulls off. The moral is to have a set of steel nails driven into the heels when you buy a new pair of shoes."—New York Times.

A Boy Pupil of the Tully Union School Bound and Gagged and Carried Into the Woods.
Binghamton, N. Y., Nov. 10.—Arthur Jones, a young man of Truxton, was abducted and hazed by a party of indignant girl pupils from the Tully Union School. Several secret societies exist among the pupils of the institution, and much rivalry has been developed between the boys and girls. It was charged that Jones had possessed himself of certain signs and secrets in formation of one of the girls' societies, and they determined to get even. They succeeded in waylaying, gagging and binding him in the most approved fashion. He was then carried to a patch of woods, and after an initiation that was more interesting than agreeable was left to free himself and return home as best he could. It is said that the average college hazing was mild compared with the unique reception arranged by the angered school girls.

THE "VERDICT" SUSPENDS.
Said to Have Cost O. H. P. Belmont About \$30,000 in Two Years.
The Verdict, O. H. P. Belmont's illustrated political weekly, is to cease publication with the current issue. Under the guidance of Alfred Henry Lewis Mr. Belmont has published his free silver, anti-Supreme Court periodical for just about two years. According to Mr. Lewis the circulation got to be as high as 8,000 to 10,000. In spite of that the average deficit did not go below \$250 a week. Mr. Belmont's loss is estimated to be about \$30,000.—N. Y. Sun.
