CASTORIA

ARRESTED AT JEFFERSON.—G. H. Ebbert was arrested at Jefferson yesterday, upon instructions from Chief of Police D. W. Gibson of this city. The authorities here were notified of the arrest, and Chief Gibson went to that place and brought his prisoner back to Salem. Ebbert was taking orders for enlarging photographs, claiming that he represented the Portland Art Company as their agent. He took orders for the work, collecting 25 cents for every 50 cent order taken. The Portland company found out about his work and notified the police here that the man had no authority to act for them, and that he was pocketing the money collected, with no intention of performing the work he agreed to, in the contract he furnished all those giving orders. A great many orders were taken in Salem and the small towns between here and Jefferson. Ebbert will be given an examination today at 1 o'clock, on a charge of obtaining money under false pretenses, which was preferred against him by the manager of the Portland Art Company.
