LEGISLATURE WILL MEET

The Fight for United States Senator Has Narrowed Down to Two Men

Two Prominent Candidates for the Place—The Contest, It Is Predicted, Will Be a Brief One—A Marion County Member Discusses the Situation.

As the session of the Legislative Assembly draws near, the probable action of that body, on the various duties devolving upon it are being discussed freely throughout the state. The most important matter coming up for action at this time, and the one that is causing the most discussion, is the election of a United States Senator, to succeed to the seat now held in that body by Senator George W. McBride, whose term expires March 4, 1901.

For this important position only Republicans are being groomed, that party's overwhelming majority making it impossible for any one of a different political faith having any chance for promotion. Among the Republicans there are, of course, several prominent candidates, gentlemen whose standing in the party and in the state entitles them to the highest respect, and their claims for preferment to consideration. Among those gentlemen may be named ex-United States Senator H. W. Corbett, of Portland; Senator George W. McBride, the present incumbent; State Senator C. W. Fulton, of Astoria; and Judge Lowell, of Pendleton, and others, while ex-Senator John H. Mitchell and ex-Congressman Ringer Hermandt are also favorably mentioned for the place.

While all these gentlemen have supporters, it seems at this time that the fight has narrowed down to the first two named, and the friends of the two honorable gentlemen are very industrious in pushing the interests of their respective candidates.

Mr. Corbett is an avowed candidate for the place, and his friends claim for him that he has sufficient strength to capture the caucus nomination of the Republicans. They claim to be ready to go into caucus, there to choose the standard bearer, whom they will support, regardless of who may be selected. Many members of the Legislature, from all parts of the state, have rallied to the Corbett standard, and will support him to the end of the contest.

Senator McBride will also be in the fight. He attended the session of Congress before Christmas, but will return to Oregon in about ten days, when he will open headquarters in this city, and personally conduct his campaign for re-election, and his supporters allege that he will succeed himself without any trouble.

The question of an early election of Senator will depend entirely on the matter of a caucus. There is no question, but a prompt organization of the Legislature will be effected on Monday or Tuesday, January 14th or 15th. If this is done, the balloting for Senator will begin in separate houses on Tuesday, January 22d, and on the following day, in joint convention, the balloting will be either continued or concluded. That the fight may be a long and bitter one is possible, though many of those who claim to have caused the situation thoroughly, assert it will be settled in short order.

In order to show the interest taken in the Senatorial contest locally, and the position some of the Marion county

FOR THE HOUSEKEEPER.

Fish Timbales—Rub together two level tablespoonfuls of butter and same of flour to a smooth paste; add one cup of hot milk and stir and cook until it comes to boiling point. Season with half a teaspoonful of salt, a dash of cayenne, half a teaspoonful of onion juice and a teaspoonful of finely minced parsley. Add a cup of cold cooked fish, minced fine; heat thoroughly; add yolks of three eggs slightly beaten and take from the fire. When cool fold in the whites of the eggs beaten to a stiff froth. Fill little timbale molds two-thirds and bake in the oven for fifteen or twenty minutes.

Oyster Sauce—Make a white sauce, but using the heated strained oyster liquor instead of milk, adding a cup of oysters, parboiled in their own liquor, the muscle removed, and cut into small pieces. Season with salt, white pepper and a tablespoonful of Worcestershire sauce.

Chestnut Stuffing—Roast one quart of Italian or French chestnuts until thoroughly well done. Remove the shells and skins and mash smooth, adding a tablespoonful of melted butter or rich cream, a teaspoonful of salt and three dashes of white pepper. Mix well together and stuff the turkey. You will require more for a large turkey. If preferred, the chestnuts may be used in the gravy and turkey stuffed with sausage or served as a natural.

Frozen Rice Pudding—Wash well half a cup of rice and put it in a double boiler with one pint of cold water, cook half an hour; then drain and add a pint of milk and cook until tender. When a quart of good, sweet cream and stand in a place to drain. When rice is tender mix it through a sieve and return to the boiler. Beat together until light one and a half cups of sugar and yolks of six eggs and add to the rice. Stir and cook for a few minutes until it begins to thicken. Remove from the fire and when slightly cool add a tablespoonful of vanilla, and turn out to cool. When perfectly cold turn into a freezer and freeze same as ice cream. Serve with a compote of oranges, peaches or apricots. This makes a large quantity.

ANOTHER REVOLUTION.

NEW YORK, Dec. 25.—A dispatch to the Herald from Caracas, says: Advice have come from Venezuela that General Celestino Peraza has proclaimed a rebellion at Lakecumari. In the interior of the State of Miranda, he has gathered a large force and government troops have been sent against him. Peraza was one of the trusted

Generals of President Andrade. But casting his fortunes with the leaders of the rebellion against the Executive, made the success of the revolution and President Castro possible. He was made Secretary-General in the Castro government for his services. While chief of staff of General Luciano Mendoza in the expedition against the rebellion of General Hernandez, in December, 1899, Peraza killed General Natividad Mendoza, brother of the commander.

POSTAL CLERKS STRIKE.

Employees in the Chicago Office Had a Frustrated Grievance.

CHICAGO, Dec. 25.—A strike among clerks of the registry division of the general Postoffice yesterday menaced for a time the prompt delivery of thousands of Christmas gifts. Extra hours of work was the grievance of a score of operatives who during the holiday rush have been compelled to labor 14 hours a day. The trouble was quickly adjusted by the Postoffice authorities, who suspended the leader of the strikers. The rank and file of the protesting clerks then returned to their labors. Superintendent Marr, of the registry division, said:

"The mails were flooded this year, and there is no other way than to make the clerks work. We are handling 16 per cent. more work this year than in 1899. I have thirty-six men assisting the regular force, and I would add still more but for the fact that there are no experienced hands and we cannot break in green ones. Some of the employees complained to me, but explaining the situation they returned to work and I anticipate no further trouble. The leader of the strikers refused to work any longer, and there was no course left open for us but to suspend him."

ARMENIAN CONVENTION.

Resolutions Adopted and Greetings Sent to President McKinley.

BOSTON, Dec. 25.—At the convention of the representatives of the Armenian Revolution, the following resolution was adopted and telegraphed to President McKinley:

"The committee of the Armenian Revolutionary Federation of this country, in their annual convention assembled in Boston, unanimously congratulated you upon your re-election to the Presidency of the United States, and invite your Excellency's kind attention to the deplorable condition in which our people in Armenia are perishing and will soon be exterminated if a powerful hand does not come to

the rescue of such a nation which has been the champion of civilization for centuries in Asia Minor.

"In the present complicated situation of European diplomacy the United States is the only nation that has been unselfish and neutral in Oriental affairs, and yet a friend for suffering races; the only nation who can terrorize the great assassin and his blood-thirsty families to save the remainder of their victims from imminent bloodshed.

"Our fathers and brothers gave their lives for the sake of our country, and we are all ready to fall in their places, but in such a struggle have we not the right to expect assistance from this great republic, which found its existence upon revolution and which has the inheritance of liberty from Washington and Lincoln?"

"Please accept our sincere wishes and assurances of our highest regard."

AFTER MARRIAGE.

Much has been said of the neglect of husbands; much has been written of the lack of love-like attention on the men's side, but what about the women? asks Woman's Life.

Is it not rather inattention on both sides? The woman spends more time with her friends, perhaps, than is

PEOPLE'S PALACE.

Opened to the Public in St. Petersburg—Princes and Peasants.

ST. PETERSBURG, Dec. 25.—The Palace of Education, President of the Government Temperance Committee, today declared the People's Palace open to the public. After the inauguration ceremonies the Prince and twenty army officers, and high officials, noblemen and ladies, dined side by side with peasants and families of workmen.

FORMING A CABINET.

SYDNEY, N. S. W., Dec. 25.—Edmond Barton has accepted the Earl of Hopland's offer to form the first Cabinet of the Federation.

NO LOBBIES.

The Subsidy Bill Only Fought by Foreign Steamship Companies.

CLEVELAND, O., Dec. 25.—Senator M. A. Hanna was informed today of the statement, to the effect that there was a powerful lobby in favor of the subsidizing of American shipping at the Philadelphia convention and in Washington.

"The only lobby of the kind that I know anything about," was the Senator's answer. "Is the lobby of the foreign steamship companies trying to defend the bill. There was no lobbying at Philadelphia. The subsidy bill is a wise measure, and there is no desire to force it through Congress. We want it to go through on its merits."

FOUND THEIR HORSE.

Another Clue to the Kidnappers of Young Oudaly.

OMAHA, Neb., Dec. 25.—That the bay pony at Pacific Junction, Iowa, found there Friday morning, is the horse of the kidnappers of Eddie Oudaly, is firmly believed by the police and authorities here. It is believed to have been ridden across the ferry at Plattsmouth by one of the kidnappers, who kept in the barn over night and hid the horse behind. The animal will be brought to Omaha.

DAMAGED BY STORM.

PORT TOWNSEND, Wash., Dec. 25.—The German ship Carl, when laden from Tacoma for Europe, and the schooner Reporter, from Gray's Harbor, for Honolulu, have been towed ashore, both damaged by the recent tidal waves.
