PEARL MILLER WAS IN ROSEBURG
Was Seen There by a Local Newspaper Man—Said He Was Doing Detective Work.

Pearl Miller, the young liveryman who left Salem mysteriously a few days ago, has not returned neither has he been arrested, if a warrant is, indeed, out for his apprehension. John W. Veatch, a Salem newspaper man, who is now business manager of the Roseburg Review, met Miller in that city last Saturday, and in writing to his mother, Mrs. J. P. Veatch, mentions his meeting Miller, and the latter's peculiar actions; Mr. Veatch says in part:
"I see the papers say that Pearl Miller, a Salem livery man, is missing. I met him here Saturday, about 1:30 p. m. on Jackson street; he told me he was looking for a young fellow (I can't call his name but I know him). He said the young fellow forged a check by signing the Cooper boys' name to it, for \$23, and he was doing some detective work; he said the young man was cooking for the Cooper boys in a logging camp near Independence and drew the money and left. I told Miller that the young man had not been in Roseburg, as I am on the street, and if he had been here, the chances were I would have seen him. To others Miller told different stories, saying he had been working in Eugene and in many livery barns from British Columbia to Roseburg.

A NEW DEPARTMENT.
DIVISION OF INSULAR AFFAIRS IS INAUGURATED.

Will Have Charge of Civil Matters in Cuba and the Philippines—Volunteers to Return.
WASHINGTON, Dec. 27.—In accordance with an order, issued by the War Department today, the division of "Customs and Insular Affairs" of the office of the Secretary of War hereafter will be known as the "Division of Insular Affairs" and will have charge of matters pertaining to the civil affairs connected with the government of Cuba and the Philippines Islands, as distinguished from matters of a purely military character.

TO SHIP TROOPS.
Washington, Dec. 27.—The Secretary of War today purchased the large freight steamer Samoa, at Hong Kong, for use in the transportation to San Francisco of the volunteer army in the Philippines.

PHILIPPINE TARIFF.
Manila, Dec. 27.—The Philippine Commission has completed the tariff bill, and mailed it to Washington for approval. The decision of the Commission will be made public Monday.

A VICTIOUS WOMAN.

WICHITA, Kans., Dec. 27.—Mrs. Carrie Nation, president of the Barber county W. C. T. U., entered the Carey Hotel bar room, and with a stone smashed a \$300 painting of Cleopatra at her bath, and a mirror valued at \$100. She is under arrest but no charge has yet been made. She appealed to Governor Stanley, who is in the city, and he refused to act in any way. She broke mirrors at Kiowa, Kansas, in two saloons some months ago. She declares there is no law under which she can be prosecuted.

HAVE NOT PAID.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Dec. 27.—It is the general belief that the Crampus contract for the construction of a cruiser for Turkey was signed without the first payment being made. This view is supported by the fact that the Porte has formally promised to pay nothing to Americans before paying the Krupp, and the Germans have not yet received anything.
