THE ROBERTS WILL

THE LATE PIONEER MISSIONARY WOMAN'S ESTATE DISPOSED OF

Will Be Distributed Among the Several Heirs of Deceased—Other Probate Orders Made at Yesterday's Sitting of the Court.

(From Sunday's Statesman.)
The will of Hannah W. Roberts, deceased, was yesterday filed and admitted to probate disposing of her personal and real property, the value of which is placed at \$2500, among her several heirs as follows:

Georgiana Beal, granddaughter, Tacoma, Wash.; Edward Roberts, grandson, Elberton, Wash.; Sarah Roberts Price, granddaughter, Elberton, Wash.; Harry Roberts, grandson, Elberton, Wash.; Charles Roberts, grandson, Elberton, Wash.; Eugene Roberts, grandson, Oregon City, Oregon; Charles Roberts, grandson, Oregon City, Oregon; To her son, William Huntsley Roberts, whose whereabouts is not known, the sum of \$10 is bequeathed, and in case he is not living, the said sum is to be divided equally among the other heirs; George H. H. Miller, according to the provision of the will, was appointed as executor of said document, to serve without bonds.

William A. Lovelace, guardian of the persons and estates of Charles B. Henry L. and Elizabeth P. Lovelace, minors, yesterday filed his report upon said estate and petitioned the Marion county probate court for an order authorizing him to retain all moneys belonging to Charles B. Lovelace, one of the minors, until he shall become of age, and for authority to invest the remainder of said fund in the purchase of cattle and stock. The court ordered that the money be retained according to the prayer of the petitioner but would not grant authority to invest the funds.

Alfred M. Eason, administrator of the estate of L. D. Smith, deceased, filed his report of the sale of personal property belonging to the estate, pursuant to an order from the court, realizing therefrom the total sum of \$773.75, and the sale was approved and confirmed by the court.

Sarah Ann Pettyjohn, administratrix of the estate of Lewis Pettyjohn, deceased, having filed her final account upon said estate and it having come on for hearing, it was ordered by the court that the same be approved, and the administratrix be discharged from her trust and her bondsmen exonerated from all further liability upon her filing the proper vouchers, showing the distribution of the sum of \$618.35 to the rightful heirs of the estate.

Bernard A. Nathman filed his report and final account on the estate of John and Mary E. Viessmann, deceased, of which he is the administrator, showing that he had paid out all sums of money due and delivered up all properties of the estate to the parties entitled thereto, he was discharged from his trust.

THE CONGRESS OF FARMERS

Opening Session Held at the Capitol Last Evening

ADDRESS OF WELCOME BY H. B. THIELSEN, AND RESPONSE BY RICHARD SCOTT.

Great Progress Made by Oregon Farmers Since the Congress Was Organized Two Years Ago—Duties of Dairy Commissioner.

The third annual meeting of the Oregon Farmers' Congress convened in the Senate chamber at the Capitol last evening, at 8 o'clock, Hon. Richard Scott, president of the Oregon Dairymen's Association, presiding. He introduced Mr. Henry B. Thielson, president of the Greater Salem Commercial Club, who made the

Address of Welcome. Mr. Thielson said that, as president of the Club, it was his pleasing duty to extend a cordial welcome to the Oregon Dairymen's Association and its members, and remarked that bidding the farmers welcome was somewhat like throwing bouquets at himself. He said that these meetings were good, both for the producers and consumers; that the railroads had formerly pursued a mistaken policy, but they have changed and since Mr. Markham came here the Southern Pacific Company has pursued a liberal policy and his successor, Mr. Miller, is carrying out the same policy. These meetings where farmers come together to see what is best for themselves, are good things and will help to raise the quality of products and create a better demand. We have a climate without a peer, soil without an equal, and there is not another country in the world that can produce butter as cheaply and of so good a quality as Oregon. Since the first session of the congress here two years ago, he said, he had noted progress in marketing products. He again extended a cordial welcome and extended the freedom of the city.

In response Mr. Richard Scott of Milwaukee Ore., said that as president of the Oregon Dairymen's Association, he appreciated the cordial words of welcome. This is the first time the Oregon Dairymen's Association has met in Salem. All branches of agriculture are represented here, as well as the Grange. The time has come when we have to raise everything of superior quality. The speaker said, when he came to Oregon butter was selling at 60 cents per pound and milk at 10 cents per quart. Bran was then 25 cents per sack if the purchaser furnished the sack. In Portland it was sold and shipped at \$7 per ton. He said, there is always room at the top and the man who puts up a first class article will always have a good market; he said he did not think the members of the Live Stock Association understood what the Grout bill means, and spoke of the opposition of Mr. Springer, president of that association, to the bill. He referred to the present Oregon law and the work done by Senator N. H. Looney in getting it through the Senate early in the session, and also referred to the work of State Dairy and Food Commissioner J. W. Bailey in enforcing it. He spoke of some manufacturers who put two wrappers on oleo, the outside one labeled "oleo," while the inner one was marked "butter." When the brick is taken out of the case the "oleo" wrapper slips off and the oleo passes for butter. He spoke of his efforts to secure a condensed milk factory at Portland, and expressed the hope this association would go on record in favor of the Grout bill and full weight butter.

At the conclusion of Mr. Scott's address Miss Mabel Lankton Carter delighted the members of the congress with a recitation.

Hon. J. W. Bailey presented a paper on the "Duties of the Dairy and Food Commissioner." He spoke of the duties imposed upon such officer in other states where some have only to look after the butter and cheese product, and others butter, cheese, vinegar and molasses. In Oregon he is presumed to see that all foods are pure. He then outlined the difficulties met and overcome.

Mrs. Scovell sang a solo and was called up to appear to an encore. Mr. W. H. Chapin of W. R. Glafke & Co., Portland, Ore., presented the subject of marketing of dairy products, and a discussion followed relative to market quotations, as to whether butter should be quoted at the highest price paid for an extra fancy article, or at lower prices, after which the congress adjourned to 10 a. m. today. 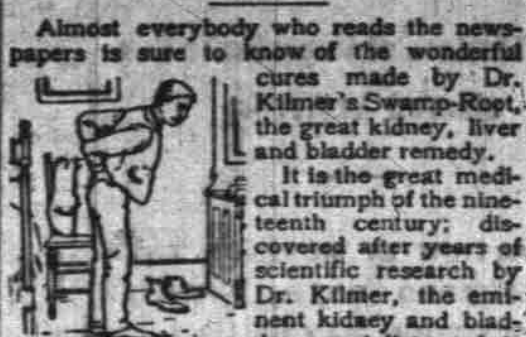

COUNTY COURT PAYS A CLAIM

For Experting the Books of Some of the Officers

TWO HUNDRED DOLLARS ORDERED PAID TO CLARK AND BUCHANAN, THE ACCOUNTANTS.

Both Men Have Gone Away on Business—A Consultation with the Salem Council Regarding the Levying of a Road Tax.

The county commissioners' court continued in regular session yesterday morning at 10 o'clock. Several matters of considerable importance were taken up and disposed of during the day, among the most important of which was a communication which was presented in open court by the expert accountants engaged in checking the county books. It pertains to their work upon the records of the Marion county officials, and an exact copy of the letter follows:

"The delay caused by your county officers—27 days—in the endeavor to prevent us from experting their accounts and records in accordance with our contract and the additional impediment to a rapid and systematic inspection by being compelled to prosecute the work under the most trying and distressing conditions, i. e., to work in the regular public offices with the natural and obvious disturbances of noise, confusion and frequent interruptions, have so retarded and hindered us that we are easily more than forty days behind in the completion of our contract—which was anticipated for this meeting of your court—to the detriment of our other engagements, one of which imposes upon us the necessity of immediate acceptance. In order to save ourselves from as much pecuniary loss as is possible under the circumstances, we are obliged to request from your court permission to substitute in place of our Mr. Clark, for the balance of time necessary to finish the examination, Mr. J. W. Cochran, a resident of Marion county. In substitution for this concession, it is with the full agreement upon our part, that if granted there is to be no change in our contract with your court, either in its obligations or conditions, other than the aforesaid substitution."

The letter was placed on file, and later in the day Mr. Cochran began the work of experting the books. Mr. Buchanan left on the afternoon train for Portland, Mr. Clark having preceded him on Sunday. During the forenoon the court audited the claim of Clark & Buchanan, for \$200, for work done in checking the county books, and ordered payment to be made.

During the morning session the Salem city council met in joint session with the county court for the purpose of arriving at some proper method of levying the taxes for the year 1931 without heaping an excessive burden upon the taxpayers of the city of Salem. According to the new charter the city council is authorized and instructed to levy a special road tax of one and one-half mills upon all the property within its jurisdiction, for the purpose of raising sufficient funds for road improvements in the city. The city council has already enacted an ordinance providing for the levy, and the county clerk has extended it on the assessment roll for 1931. The state law also provides that the county commissioners' court, during its regular session at the beginning of the year, shall levy an extra assessment of one and one-half mills taxes on all property within the county and, as it cannot assess one district and exempt another, the question arose as to whether the city authorities shall be required to withdraw its levy and leave the matter in the hands of the county court, in either case it would be applicable to Salem district alone, or whether the county court would be authorized to levy on all other Marion county property and omit Salem. The matter was finally placed in the hands of a committee which will consult with the District Attorney and the city's attorney,

W. H. Holmes, for the purpose of arriving at some legal and proper course to pursue under the circumstances. The remainder of the day was devoted by the commissioners in selecting a list of judges and clerks for the several precincts throughout the county to serve at the election in June. The list was not completed yesterday, however, and will not be until during the session today.
