DENIES THE STORY

MR. CHURCH, OF LA GRANDE, NOT CANDIDATE FOR GOVERNOR.

He is an Enthusiastic Supporter of Gov. T. T. Geer, Who, He Says, Should Be Re-elected for Another Term.

(From Thursday's Statesman.)

Hon. J. M. Church, of LaGrande, whose name has several times been mentioned in the Oregonian and other papers for the nomination for Governor, was in Salem yesterday attending the Farmers' Congress. In an interview with a representative of the Statesman, Mr. Church stated positively that he was not a candidate for Governor, but that he was a warm supporter of Gov. T. T. Geer for re-nomination and re-election. Speaking of the matter, he said:

"My name has been spoken of in connection with the Governorship, but for various reasons I am not a candidate and under no circumstances will be. My name has appeared in press, but it was without my knowledge and wholly without my authorization.

"Hon. T. T. Geer has made an excellent Governor and I think the best interests of this state require his continuance in office for another term. He has filled the position with credit to the state and to himself. He has the benefit of advantage that comes from a four years' experience and among other things is to be considered in his favor."

COUNTY COURT AWAITS

REPORT OF ATTORNEYS

Regarding Salem's Road Tax Levy, Before Taking Action—Circuit Court Disposes of Several Cases.

The Marion county commissioners' court convened on the sixth judicial day yesterday morning at 10 o'clock, and continued in session all day. A considerable amount of business was transacted, which consisted chiefly in the auditing and allowing several accounts and a great deal of work was taken up and under consideration which was not finished and will be decided today. About the most important of the business yet to be transacted is the levying of the road tax of one and one-half mills on all property in the county excepting the city of Salem, which must be attended to before the work of extending the assessment roll can be completed. The question regarding the legality of the city authorities' action in levying a one and one-half mills road tax upon the city property irrespective of the county court, and as to the authority of the county court in levying upon the other county property and excepting Salem, having been decided by the committee appointed to adjust the matter, the county court is now awaiting the written findings of said committee before taking any action in the matter.

COUNTY COURT LEVYS TAXES

What Marion County Will Have to Pay This Year

FINAL DAY OF THE LONG SESSION OF THE COMMISSIONERS FOR THE JANUARY TERM.

A Large Amount of Business Transacted—Provision Made for Better Road Work—Road District Boundaries Changed to Conform to Precinct Lines.

The county commissioners' court concluded its business for the January term at 4 p. m. yesterday, after a continuous session of seven days. Some of the most important business which has been under consideration since the first day of the court was decided yesterday and on the whole it was the busiest day of the entire session.

Deputy District Attorney J. H. McNary and Geo. G. Bingham presented their findings in the matter of adjusting a means of levying the one and one-half mills road tax, as provided by the general laws, without conflicting with the action of the Salem city council, in levying upon the city property, which was ordered placed on file.

The total amount of revenue to be raised for the several purposes for the year 1931 is \$165,967, of which amount the sum of \$56,396 is Marion county's portion of the state tax; county tax for all the county purposes, \$54,000; state school tax, \$41,800; indigent soldier tax, \$230, and the road tax \$12,841.

For raising these revenues a tax upon all the property in the county was levied by the court, as follows:

State and county, 1.34 mills; state schools, 5 mills; indigent soldiers, 1 mill, and for the purpose of raising the revenue set aside for road purposes the clerk was instructed to levy a tax of one and one-half mills upon all property in the county excepting the city of Salem, and to extend the same on the assessment roll in such a manner, inasmuch as the mill and a half tax had already been levied upon the city of Salem property by the city council, that the Salem property would not be doubly taxed.

Each road supervisor throughout the county is instructed to collect \$3 in money from every person in his road district liable for road poll tax and to expend said money in the manner as by law provided.

E. Schott, upon application to the court, was granted a license to sell spirituous liquors in Sublimity precinct upon his paying the sum of \$400 into the county treasury.

On account of the boundary lines of several road districts not conforming to the election precinct lines, owing to the change made in the election precinct boundary lines during the November term of the court, the lines of the road districts were ordered changed to conform to those of the election precincts in which they are situated, as follows:

Road district No. 16 shall conform to Howell precinct boundary lines; No. 17 to Brooks precinct; No. 18 to Englewood precinct; No. 21 to East Salem precinct; No. 22 to Macleay precinct; No. 23 to Aumsville precinct; and No. 26 to Turner precinct.

Woodburn precinct, constituting road district No. 8, being too large, was divided so as to create a new district, No. 8 1/2. This was done to conform to a petition presented to the court by J. H. Settlemier, et al., resident of the precinct.

County Road Master W. J. Culver was directed to purchase one rock-crushing machine; four road graders and three wheel scrapers, to be used in the construction and repairing of roads in this county.

This Year's Taxes.

A tax of 20 mills is levied upon all property in Marion county, including the 1.5 mills road tax, for the purpose

of raising the amount of revenues necessary to defray the county's expenses for the year 1931. The state tax is 1.2 mills higher than last year's levy, figuring on a basis of the total assessed valuation of Marion county's taxable property for the year 1930, but the total levy for all taxes is 2 mills lower than last year which was 22 mills. The levy for county expenses alone is 4.8 mills lower than last year. Marion county's portion of the state taxes is several thousand dollars higher than that for the year 1930, which goes to show that, while the burden of taxation is being decreased by the administration of county affairs, the heavy expenses of the state are responsible for the extra burden.

The law providing for the collection of road poll tax, enacted by the last Legislature and known as House Bill No. 205, provides that the county court may provide for the payment of all road taxes, in cash. During yesterday's session the court made an order to that effect and, therefore, during the ensuing year all road poll taxes must be paid to the road supervisor in each district, in cash, and not worked out according to the old law, and the road supervisor is directed to expend the money in the construction and repairing of roads under the supervision of the county roadmaster. The road tax of one and one-half mills is also payable in cash and expended by the county roadmaster.

ARE COMING SLOW

REGISTRATION OF VOTERS IN COUNTY CLERK'S OFFICE

Has Scarcely Commenced, Though the Books Were Opened on Last Monday—Voters Are Urged to Call and List Their Names.

County Clerk W. W. Hall opened the registration books on Monday morning last, and quite a number of voters registered on that day. It seems that the interest has fallen off somewhat since then, as the voters are very slow about registering. Quite a number of remote precincts have applied for registration outfits, however, and Mr. Hall has sent several out, so that it is not possible at this time to say just how many have registered in the county. Up to last evening only forty-eight names had been placed upon the books in the clerk's department, of which thirty-three belong to the Salem precincts and the balance is divided up among several precincts throughout the county.

Mr. Hall expressed the hope that more attention would be paid to the matter as he would like to get the work done early this season. Salem No. 2 now stands at the head of the list with twelve registrations; No. 1 second with eight; No. 4 third with six, and No. 3 with only four. The following is the number of registrations by precincts:

Aumsville 1, Aurora 1, Brooks 1, Butteville 1, Elkhorn 1, Englewood 1, Fairfield 1, Salem No. 1, 8; Salem No. 2, 12; Salem No. 3, 4; Salem No. 4, 6; Salem (North) 1, Salem (South) 2, Stillney 1, Silverton 1, Stayton 1, Sublimity 1, Turner 2, and Yew Park 1—48.

AN ITEMIZED ACCOUNT.—A suit was filed several weeks ago in department No. 2 of the Circuit Court, by Otto Hansen against Clara F. Brey, et al., asking for judgment for the sum of \$225.30 with interest thereon at the rate of 6 per cent from October 25, 1931, together with the sum of \$56.40 for attorneys' fees, drawing and verifying lien, etc., yesterday the defendants, Clara F. Brey, et al., by their attorneys Bonham & Martin, filed a motion in the above court asking that the complaint be made more definite by specifying the costs of certain materials furnished and services performed.

A PETITION.—Claud Gatch, receiver of the estate of A. T. Gilbert and Gilbert Bros., in the suit for an accounting entitled, Tilmon Ford, executor, plaintiff, vs. A. T. Gilbert, et al., defendants, yesterday filed a petition in department No. 2 of the Circuit Court for an order authorizing him to pay \$20 tax due upon certain property in this city for which he is receiver.

OVERRULED.—Circuit Judge R. P. Boise, of department No. 2 of the State Circuit Court, yesterday overruled the motion for judgment on pleadings made by Baker, Mettschan and Giltner, in the suit for an accounting entitled, J. A. Baker, plaintiff, vs. Williams & England Banking Co., defendants. He also entered a decree dismissing the complaint in the partition suit entitled, Mary A. Sweet, plaintiff, vs. Allie G. Farnham, et al., defendants.

friends in distant cities when speaking with them. The inventor describes the device as follows: A small, circular mirror, with a hole in the center, into which is screwing a tiny electric light of 1.10 candle power is fixed to a telephone's microphone plate by an india rubber band; a pencil-like instrument connects the current with the apparatus. Two acids are allowed to mix, drop by drop, in a torpedo-like machine about three inches long. This process throws what is termed a phosphorescent flame on the looking-glass connected with the poles and pencil, and a sheet of white or semi-transparent tissue placed before the glass shows the room in which the other person is telephoning, no matter how many miles away a person may be.

DR. WITHYCOMBE CHOSE.—Gov. T. T. Geer yesterday returned from Corvallis, where on Wednesday, he attended a meeting of the Board of Regents of the Oregon Agricultural College. At this meeting President T. M. Gatch resigned as Director of the Oregon Experiment Station, and the Vice Director, Dr. James Withycombe, was elected as Director.
