

OPPOSED TO RECIPROCITY

Secretary Root Does Not Desire It
for the Present

BETWEEN THE UNITED STATES
AND THE PHILIPPINES, AS IT
WOULD INTERFERE

With the Open Door in the Orient—
Another Cabinet Officer Explains
Why Other Countries Should Have
Equal Trade Rights with America
in the Philippine Islands—The
Chinese Trade Is Desired.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 11.—There is authority for the statement that Secretary Root is strongly opposed to commercial reciprocity between the United States and Philippines, on the general ground that any such arrangement would be destructive of the "open door" policy of this Government in the East. It is argued that the United States only secured an open door in China after patient and assiduous diplomatic negotiations with the other foreign Governments concerned, and to now deny to the other Governments the same trade facilities with the Philippines, enjoyed by the United States, would result in closing the markets in China to the United States.

A Cabinet officer today said that the only way the United States could be treated the same as Russia, France, Germany and Great Britain in the possession of these Governments, would be by granting the countries named equal privileges and facilities with the United States for trade with the Philippines.

The above statements represent the position of Secretary Root on the general question of trade relations with the Philippines, and the conclusion is that President Roosevelt holds similar views.

Lunched with Roosevelt.

Washington, Jan. 11.—Admiral Taylor, who is to succeed Admiral Crowninshield as Chief of the Bureau of Navigation, and Captain Clark, who commanded the battleship Oregon during the Spanish war, had a long conference with President Roosevelt today, and afterwards lunched with him. Subsequently, the two naval officers, who it was learned, had been sent for by the President, declined to make public the subject of consultation which it was believed had a bearing upon the Schley case.

New Coaling Station.

Washington, Jan. 11.—Three hundred thousand dollars is the estimated cost of the proposed coaling station, to be erected at the Puget Sound Navy Yard, plans for which have been completed. The Bureau of Yards and Docks has in its possession the sum of \$125,000 toward the construction of the coaling station.

It is the purpose of the Bureau to have two coaling sheds and a wharf 650 feet in length, and to have coal handling machinery of the highest grade. The capacity of this appliance will be sixty tons per hour.

EMPEROR WILLIAM'S YACHT

Will Be Christened by President Roosevelt's Daughter—What Will the Anti-Imperialists Say?

NEW YORK, Jan. 11.—The sheet plating of the steel schooner-yacht in course of construction at Shooter Island, N. Y., for the Emperor of Germany, is being pushed rapidly.

During the coming week Wallace Downey, president of the Townsend & Downey Shipbuilding Company, will visit Washington to arrange for a date for the launching, to meet the convenience of Miss Roosevelt, who will christen the new yacht.

ALL WATER ROUTE

Canals of Europe Now in the Hands of
American Capitalists.

LONDON, Jan. 11.—One of the most important of the American commercial enterprises in Europe has just culminated here. It consists in securing all water routes for American cargoes for grain and other commodities, from the inland ports in the United States to the inland ports in Europe, and embracing the purchase by American capital of several British and other canals. Frank W. Hawley, vice president of

the Erie Canal Traction Company, has been on this side several months, quietly securing concessions for the European Canals by electricity. The Erie concession today secured control of about 5000 miles of canal in England and on the continent. As a result cargoes will shortly be shipped on the same bill of lading from Duluth, Minn., to Brussels, Bruges, Ghent and Cologne, and later to many points in the United Kingdom, France, Germany and Italy.

THE SETTLERS' RATES.

Will Apply to All Points in Oregon,
Says General Agent Miller, of
the Southern Pacific.

PORTLAND, Or., Jan. 11.—General Passenger Agent Miller, of the Southern Pacific, announced today that hereafter the settlers' rates from eastern points will apply to all points in Oregon reached by the Southern Pacific. Heretofore these rates have applied to Portland only.

QUESTION OF RELIGION.

BERLIN, Jan. 11.—The appointment of the Catholic professor, Dr. Spahn, to the chair of history, in the University of Strassburg, was severely criticized in the Reichstag today by Dr. Sattler, National Liberal, who characterized it as a step in the direction of further dividing the Germans in matters of religion.

BRITISH WAR VESSELS

ARE SEARCHING FOR A STEAMER
BEARING THEIR FLAG

And Operating in the Interest of the
Venezuelan Insurgents—She Will
Be Seized if Caught by the Eng-
lish Ships.

WILLEMSTAD, Jan. 11.—It is reported here that British war vessels have received instructions to seize the Venezuelan revolutionary steamer Libertador (formerly the Ban Right) if they meet her flying the British flag and bearing her original name. The Libertador is said to have succeeded in landing arms and ammunition along the coast of Venezuela.

It is reported that numbers of guerrilla bands were moving in the Venezuelan states of Falcon and Lara, going towards designated points of concentration.

President Castro's warships, Restaurador, Miranda and General Crespo, which were sent in pursuit of the Libertador, have been unable to overhaul her. They always arrive at some place on the coast just after the Libertador has left it. If the Government succeeds in obtaining possession of the arms and ammunition landed by the Libertador, the insurrection will be crushed, for during the past fortnight the Government of President Castro has become stronger than ever.

CROKER RETIRES

Lewis Nixon Succeeds Him as the
Chief of Tammany Hall.

NEW YORK, Jan. 11.—Richard Croker announced his retirement from the formal leadership of Tammany Hall this afternoon. The announcement was made at the meeting of the executive committee, at which the plan of organization for the year 1902 was agreed upon. Lewis Nixon was chosen Croker's successor as chairman of the finance committee. This position, by long usage, carries with it the leadership of the organization.

In announcing the name of Nixon for the chairmanship of the finance committee, George M. Van Hoesen, president of the general committee, said that the step was taken at the desire of Croker himself.

BOERS MAY SURRENDER.

The End of the South African War Is
Again Predicted.

LONDON, Jan. 10.—The Globe's financial editor said a report which came from well-informed quarters was current in the city today that the Boer chiefs had made overtures to the British Government to the effect that they were prepared to lay down their arms provided they were not expelled. Wednesday next is the Boer feast day, and it was said the surrender of the Boers would probably occur then.

The War Office officials asserted that no proposals to surrender had been received from the Boers.

Amsterdam, Jan. 10.—The Boer delegates in Holland evidently anticipate that some kind of peace overtures will shortly be made, though they are reluctant as to the reasons for this belief. They maintain, however, that the demand for an unconditional surrender must be abandoned. It is privately admitted that the delegates will not reject what they call "any fair offer of terms." If the negotiations are started by a neutral power the delegates will earnestly seek to obtain a modus vivendi, which will reconcile Mr. Kruger's desire for complete independence with the terms offered by Great Britain.

KENTUCKIANS IN THE SENATE

Disagree on the Confirmation of
the President's Appointee

FOR UNITED STATES MARSHAL
IN THEIR STATE—WARM DIS-
CUSSION IN SESSION.

The Hepburn Canal Bill Brought to the
Upper House and Referred to a
Committee—Roosevelt Will Ap-
point Bibee for the Oregon City

WASHINGTON, Jan. 13.—There was a sharp controversy in the Senate executive session this evening, over the confirmation of S. G. Sharp, as marshal for the Eastern District of Kentucky. The Senators from Kentucky—Deboe, Republican, and Blackburn, Democrat—took opposing positions.

Senator Blackburn objected to the confirmation on the ground that Sharp had presided over a mass meeting in Frankfort, in 1899, while the Goebel-Taylor controversy was at its height.

The Oleo Bill.

Washington, Jan. 13.—Hearings on the anti-oleomargarine bills were begun today, by the House Committee on Agriculture. The bills under consideration are similar to the so-called Sroul bill, and place a tax of 10 cents per pound on substances colored to imitate butter.

The Schley Case.

Washington, Jan. 13.—The Mary and delegation in Congress today considered the course to be pursued in the Schley case, and reached the determination that pending the decision of President Roosevelt in the appeal to be made by Schley, it would be inadvisable for the delegation to urge upon Congress any of the resolutions or bills introduced.

Schley Resolutions.

Chicago, Jan. 13.—Resolutions, calling upon Congress to re-open the Schley case and make its own decision as to who was in command at the battle of Santiago, were passed by the Board of Trade at the annual meeting.

Department of Commerce.

Washington, Jan. 13.—In the Senate today, Nelson (Minn.) called up the bill providing for the establishment of a Department of Commerce. He explained the necessity which, he said, existed for the passage of such a measure.

ANOTHER BODY FLOATS ASHORE

Headless Rump Found on Shore
of Whidby Island

MYSTERIOUS MURDERS AT PORT
TOWNSEND HAVE CAUSED
GREAT EXCITEMENT.

The Second of the Kind Found Near
Fort Casey Causes Investigation—
Bold Robbery of a Pool Room in
Kansas City Last Night—An Ari-
zona Miner Blown to Pieces by
Giant Caps.

PORT TOWNSEND, Wash., Jan. 13.—The people of Whidby Island are in a high state of excitement, over the finding of another headless body on the beach near Fort Casey. Last week a body was found with the head and hands cut off, and the clothing removed, and yesterday another body was found there with the head severed. The authorities think that the murders have been committed at some point up the sound, the heads severed to prevent identification, the bodies cast into the water, and the tides have landed them on Whidby Island.

POOL ROOM ROBBED.

Kansas City, Mo., Jan. 13.—Two young men entered Chicks' pool room, in the center of the city, at 7 o'clock tonight, and with drawn revolvers commanded the proprietor, cashier and three other employees to lie down on the floor. They secured between \$1500 and \$2500 and escaped.

Torn to Pieces.

Kingman, Ariz., Jan. 13.—J. R. Richardson, a miner, was almost torn to pieces today, by the explosion of a box of giant caps. Although blinded and terribly injured otherwise, Richardson is still alive.

Committee of Safety.

Denver, Colo., Jan. 13.—About one thousand members of the recently organized Committee of Safety tonight began patrolling the residential portion of the city. It is hoped that this will result in the detection of the thugs whose outrages have caused a reign of terror for several months.

A TERRIBLE EXPERIENCE.

Two Fishermen Adrift on a Capsized
Boat for Many Days.

SANTA BARBARA, Cal., Jan. 13.—Adrift on a capsized boat in the Pacific for seventeen days, without food or drink, was the terrible experience of Captain Harry Olsen and Pete Wallace, two fishermen. While cruising south of Santa Cruz Island a heavy sea capsized their craft. Clinging to the capsized boat without food or water, they drifted, suffering tortures. On the 14th day Wallace's strength gave out and, crazed and starving, he slid off the boat and disappeared. For three days longer Olsen held on and was finally rescued.

A REBEL CAPTURED.

Former Cabinet Officer of Venezuela Is
in the Toils.

CARACAS, Jan. 13.—The forces of the Government of Venezuela have captured Senor Lutowski near San Carlos, in the state of Zamora. Lutowski, who was Minister of War in former President Crespo's Cabinet, with Lucien Mendoza, and Antonio Fernandez, rebelled on December 19th, against President Castro.

EXPOSITION CORPORATION.

Has Organized and Is Now Ready for
the Business in Hand.

PORTLAND, Or., Jan. 13.—The incorporators of the Lewis and Clark Exposition organized today, by the adoption of by-laws and the election of a board of directors. The board of directors elected is practically the same as that recommended by the stockholders' meeting last week. The first meeting of the board of directors will be held January 21st.

PENDLETON ROW.

City Officers, Removed by the Council,
Refuse to Vacate

PENDLETON, Or., Jan. 13.—The case of Chief of Police Heathman and City Recorder Beam, who were removed by the city council Saturday, remains unsettled. The newly appointed officers have not yet secured possession of the offices, being restrained by temporary injunctions.

PROPOSED REDUCTIONS.

ST. PAUL, Minn., Jan. 13.—Representatives of many Northwestern roads are conferring today over the rate reduction proposed by the Great Northern and Northern Pacific. The lines represented include the Soo, St. Louis, Northwestern, Milwaukee, Cedar Rapids and Burlington. Much of the day

was taken up with the explanation of the proposed changes, by representatives of the Great Northern.

TOOK HIS OWN LIFE.

A Seattle Man Blew Off His Head Yes-
terday with Dynamite.

SEATTLE, Wash., Jan. 10.—The body of an unknown man was found today, the evidence tending to show that he committed suicide by placing a stick of dynamite in his mouth with a fuse attached. A hole fifteen inches deep marked the place where his head had rested. Not a vestige of the head could be found.

THROWN FROM A HORSE.

A Member of the Dominion Cabinet
Killed in England.

VANCOUVER, B. C., Jan. 11.—Cable was received this evening stating that Hon. R. R. Dobbell, member of the Dominion Cabinet, had been killed this afternoon at Folkestone, England. He was thrown from a horse.

PLEAD FOR AGUINALDO.

BOSTON, Mass., Jan. 13.—The Anti-Imperialist League has sent a petition to Congress, asking that Aguinaldo and Mabini be permitted to come to this country, and be accorded a hearing before Congress.

WILL SPEND MILLIONS

THE UNION PACIFIC TO BUILD
MANY EXTENSIONS

To Its Lines in the West, Especially
Between Salt Lake City and the
Coast—Want the Oriental Trade
and Willing to Pay For It.

OMAHA, Neb., Jan. 11.—The plan of railroad campaigning, to be carried out by the Union Pacific road during 1902, was given out officially today and will result in the expenditure of from \$25,000,000 to \$30,000,000 in improvement and extensions. The efforts this year will be directed almost wholly to that part of the road west of Salt Lake City and Ogden, and the Oregon Short Line. Twenty millions alone will be used in improvements of these lines.

Particular attention will be given to extensions and improvements on the Short Line, which competes with the Hill system.

The prime object is to put the road in position to control the immense trade with the Orient that is expected to be open by the new conditions in the East and in Hawaii. This trade is already beginning to reach formidable proportion, and the Union Pacific is preparing to meet the competition of the Northern lines.
