## Discussed at the Recent Farmers' Congress in Salem

CHANGE FROM PIONEER DAYS WILL BRING GREAT WEALTH TO FARMERS OF THIS STATE.

The Running of Large Herds on the Natural Feeding Grounds Is a Thing of the Past, and Beef Will Be Produced by the Smaller Agriculturist to the Great Advantage of the Country.

(From Wednesday's Statesman.) At the recent session of the Farmers' Congress in this city, C. J. Millis, live stock agent of the O. R. & N. Company, delivered an interesting address on "Live Stock on the Oregon Ranges," and in response to numerous requests, the Statesman herewith prints the address in full:

The magnitude of the live stock industry is known only to those who observe the statistical reports of the progress of this branch of agriculture. The live stock of the United States represents approximately four billion dollars, thus surpassing the products of all the property sold, or about onethe fields, forest and mines. We can third. truthfully say this industry is important to our National prosperity, and it is with pardonable pride that we point to the development of it within the past fifty years. While our stock industry represent such a vast sum, there is, however, a gradual shrinkage in number of cattle as compared with the increase of our population, thus showing that the present values for this class of stock are more than likely to be maintained or even advanced.

"Cattle growing in this state up to within a few years has been conducted through the Lee Mission cemetery. He in the easiest possible manner. Our ranges were replete with nutritious grasses, hence immense numbers of cattle grazed and became fat without any effort on the part of the stockgrower. This condition of pioneer days is past, and today the farmer, in order to achieve success in this particular branch of husbandry must adopt more up-to-date methods.

"With the immense area of land capable of producing large quantities of alfalfa, clover and other valuable forage crops, this state should become a great beef producing center. Beef growing in the future will be largely confined to the small farms. Nothing will give greater stability, or contribute more to the substantial progress of for the nurket a few head of live stock. Is Again at Work, and Has Relieved a Former Salem Man of a Handsome Sum-Prof. W. C. Alderson is the Victim.

Portland's lone highwayman is again at work, and his latest victim is Prof. W. C. Alderson, who formerly wesided in this city, where he has many friends, The Oregonian of yesterday, in telling of the robbery, gives the following ac-

"After a month's absence the lone highwayman of the Slavin road is back at the old stand, seeking to relieve lonely pedestrians of their cash and valuables. Despite the fact that he has held up a score of persons, more or less, oftener in broad daylight than after nightfall, this dashing Dick Turpin has managed to elude the vigilance of the city and county sleuths, and he is still among the unidentified.

"Prof. W. C. Alderson, principal of the South Portland school, was the victim Sunday night, and he was relieved of nearly \$40 in cash, \$25 of which was in gold and the remainder in silver. crosses the tracks of the Southern Pacifie. Frofessor Alderson believes that he was a marked man. He received his salary Friday night, but did not sleep at home. Mrs. Alderson was positive that she locked the front door securely before retiring. but in the morning it was found unlocked and ajar. # CASE HEARD

Supreme Court's Time Taken Up W.th the Argument

OF AN APPEAL FROM CLATSOP COUNTY YESTERDAY - ALIEN MADE A PURCHASE

From the State Land Board, Representing Himself to Be a Citizen of the United States, and When Fraud Was Discovered, an Effort Was Made to Set Aside the Deed.

(From Wednesday's Statesman.) In the Supreme Court yesterday the case of the State of Oregon, respondent, vs. J. P. Carlson, appellant, un appeal from Clatsop county, was argued and submitted, by D. R. N. Blackburn, G. C. Fulton and Harrison Allen, for respondent, and J. H. Smith for appellant. The case is an interesting one, as shown by the following brief statement of the case:

The state of Oregon, as plaintiff, instituted this action in the court below against the appellant to vacate and ancul a patent issued by it to appellant, September 30, 1895, to certain tide flats in the Columbia river not adjacent to the shore, under the provisions of the act of Eebruary 21, 1891. This act was construed by the Supreme Court, Spencer vs. Carlson, 59-Pacific, 708, and it is there held, that only such persons as are citizens of the United States, and also citizens of the state of Oregon, are entitled to purchase lands in said act described. That an alien who has only declared his intention to become a citizen is not a qual-

ified purchaser. It is an admitted fact that the appellant at the time the patent was issued to him, was not a citizen of the United States, but was an afien who had simply declared his intention to become such. Nevertheless, the appellant, about the first of September, 1895, made application to the Board of Commissioners to purchase the land in controversy, and filed with his application an affidavit taken before a notary pub-The scene of the hold-up was within lic, that he was a citizen of the Unittwenty feet of where the Savin road ed States, and a citizen of the state of Oregon.
