A tiny ripple of laughter that went round the audience showed that confidence had partly been restored. When the band began to play "Wait Till the Clouds Roll By," the laughter deepened into a roar of merriment that only ended when the lights were turned on again. He is noted for the gestures he makes and the postures he assumes when directing his band. afflicted with the Manila pox in a light form. The green flag was displayed as a warning, though this disease is not as infectious as was supposed.

IN COSPER ESTATE

EXECUTOR TILMON FORD FILED HIS REPORT YESTERDAY

Showing Claims Allowed and Personal Property Sold—Administrator for the Estate of the Late Mrs. Harriett Patterson Appointed.

Tilmon Ford, administrator of the estate of Wm. Cosper, deceased, filed his report yesterday showing number of verified claims which had been presented, allowed and paid, amounting in all to \$382.90; also his report of sales of personal property belonging to the Cosper estate amounting to \$1648.52. Both reports were approved by the probate judge.

John Patterson, Sr., yesterday petitioned the Marion county probate court for letters of administration upon the estate of his deceased wife, Mrs. Harriett Patterson, who died in this city on January 11, 1922, leaving real and personal property, the value of which is estimated at \$2500, and the court ordered that letters of administration be issued to the petitioner in the sum of \$5000, and R. H. Mason, D. L. Green and Richard Carey were appointed appraisors of the estate.

E. A. Fishburn, administrator of the estate of Joseph Fishburn, deceased, petitioned the probate court for an order empowering him to accept the sum of \$120 in satisfaction of judgment for \$232.29, rendered in favor of the plaintiff in the suit entitled, Joseph Fishburn, plaintiff, vs. A. G. Roberts, et al, defendants, and the court issued an order accordingly and further licensed the petitioner to satisfy the judgment on the Polk county records.

TRANSFERS—HOW THEY DO IT IN SALT LAKE CITY.

Women in Salt Lake City have some advantage over men when they come to patronize the street cars. In that haven of Mormonism they have a system of street railway transfers which is hard to beat. The passenger who receives a transfer from a Salt Lake conductor is compelled to use it himself or throw it away.

Every ticket has printed on it, besides the usual hours and the names of intersecting lines, a row of seven small heads. Five of them are male heads, two are female. Of the male heads the first is a beardless face, the second bears a mustache, the third "mutton chop" whiskers, the fourth a chin beard, and the fifth is fully bearded. Beneath the row are two plus signs, with a forty between them. The conductor is required to identify each passenger by punching one of the faces and one of the signs for age. The first plus being used for young men, the forty for men of middle age, and the final plus for elderly men.

Of the heads representing women one wears a hat and represents young women in general, and the other a bonnet, for matrons. With really rare delicacy, the question of age is not mentioned in regard to female passengers.

SOURA—HOW HE GOT HIS NAME.

When Sousa, now famous the world over as king of march music, landed in the "home of the free," he carried with him a valise on which was marked in plain letters, "John Phillippos, U. S. A." Time passed, and this son of sunny Italy commenced to grow musical and also to become Americanized. It was then, so the story goes, that he expressed the desire for a name more nearly like those of the people of which he was one by choice. Phillippos sounded out of place doing service for a man who had imbibed beliefs and customs and whose destiny was closely linked with the "Stars and Stripes" forever. A member of the band to which he belonged finally made a suggestion. It turned out to be a happy one, and was adopted by the master of the baton. The suggestion was this: To the name Phillippos add the U. S. A. Divide the one name into two words, and there was the smooth-sounding and easily-pronounced name of John Philip Sousa.
