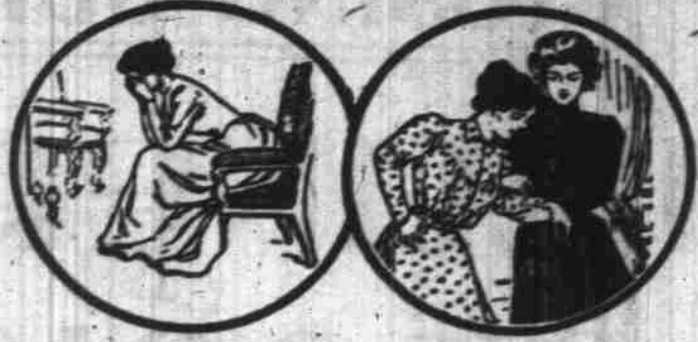

Session of the February Term of the Court

WITH A LARGE AMOUNT OF ROUTINE BUSINESS ALREADY TRANSACTED.

Several Road Matters and a Large Number of Bills Disposed of—The Court Will Drain an Ugly Pool in North Salem.

In the Marion county commissioners' court, which continued in regular session yesterday, upon the petition of Wm. P. Mulkey, et al., L. P. Bennett was appointed constable for Mehama district.

R. Patty, upon petition for county aid, was allowed the sum of \$6 per month and A. S. Epley was appointed as disbursing agent.

The petition of H. B. Hayre, et al., for the improvement of the Union Hill road was referred to County Roadmaster W. J. Culver with instructions to investigate and report to the court at his earliest convenience, as was also the petition of S. R. Scott, et al., for improvement of a hill on the South Prairie road.

Upon petition of H. C. Epley, et al., for the draining of a pool in North Salem, the roadmaster was instructed to investigate the matter and was authorized to expend the sum of \$10 for work to remedy the same.

The monthly report of D. D. Keeler, county stock inspector, upon the condition of stock generally in the county was accepted and placed on file.

TWO CASES ARGUED

SUPREME COURT HEARS COUNSEL IN TAX DEED LITIGATION.

Appealed from Judge Boise's Decision in the Marion County Circuit Court—Another Contest Up from Douglas County.

(From Wednesday's Statesman.) In the Supreme Court, yesterday, two appeal cases were argued. They are: J. F. T. B. Brentano, respondent, vs. C. F. Brentano, appellant; argued and submitted by B. F. Bonham and J. A. Jeffrey for respondent, and W. M. Kaiser, for appellant. A brief statement of the case follows:

The respondent in the suit sought to have a tax deed declared void, and that it be removed as a cloud upon his title. The lands described in the deed were sold by the sheriff of Marion county for taxes, to J. K. Marlay, who in turn transferred his certificate to the appellant herein. Later the sheriff made a tax deed to the appellant, but neglected to place thereon his private seal, and was compelled a short time thereafter to make a confirmatory deed. On March 27, 1920, the court set aside the deed, and defendant appealed.

Chas. M. Close, respondent, vs. W. S. Riddle et al., appellant; argued and submitted by W. M. Smith for respondent, and J. C. Fullerton for appellant. Following is a statement of the case:

This was a suit to foreclose a mortgage upon certain lands in Douglas county. The mortgage was given by George W. Riddle, Helen G. Riddle and William H. Riddle (since deceased), to secure a certain bond or promissory note of George W. and Helen G. Riddle for the sum of \$11,000, payable on the first day of May, 1893, and ten certain interest coupon notes, payable semi-annually. The principal note bore interest at 6 per cent, with a provision for 8 per cent after maturity. The complaint, after setting out the principal note and the mortgage sought to be foreclosed, alleged: "That no part of said debt secured by said bond or promissory note and coupons has been paid, save and except ten interest coupons and the sum of \$1500 paid on account of the principal thereof, and the interest thereon to the first day of June, 1897."

The appellant, who is a subsequent purchaser of a portion of the mortgaged premises, filed an answer to the complaint in which he admitted the making of the coupon notes and the mortgage given to secure the same, and then "denies that there is now due and owing upon said mortgage debt the sum of \$9,500 with interest thereon from June 1, 1897, at 8 per cent per annum; but alleges that there is now due and unpaid upon the mortgage debt the sum of \$7,800, and no more."

On the seventh day of August, 1900, a decree was given and entered in respondent's favor for \$11,270.76, and for the foreclosure of the mortgage upon the real property therein described. This appeal was taken from a portion of the decree only, and is based upon alleged error of the court in finding the amount due upon the debt secured by respondent's mortgage.

PECULIAR AND PERTINENT

One thousand five hundred and thirteen novels were published in England last year.

The Hazelwood Company entered nineteen of their Western bred and reared White Rocks at the late Chicago exhibit, and they carried off the laurels. They won eleven regular and several special premiums, among the regulars being first cock and cockerel and first and second pens. Their first cock scored 96 1/2, which is one-fourth of a point above any official score ever placed on a White Rock cock previous.

They now hold the championship for the highest scoring cock bird in the United States. Their pen had the phenomenal score of 196 1/2. How is this for the intensified hen and her brother? Frank Fenwick, of Portland, carried off some of the highest honors at the Pan-American on his poultry exhibit. The Northwest is coming to the front. Our breeders have a right to stand up and crow with the best of them anywhere in the wide world. The only trouble is that there are not enough of them. But they are coming.

Of course Salem will be loyal to Old Willamette. It is a family matter. Any other course would be as bad as a father disowning his son or a son casting off his father. It would never do, and it must not be thought of for a moment. Every Salem man, woman, boy and girl, rich or poor, good bad or indifferent, must be ready to help, according to his or her ability, in the work of extension which is being set on foot.

THE MASTER FISH WARDEN

Meets With the State Commission and Files Report

STATEMENT OF THE YEAR'S OPERATIONS SHOWS EXCELLENT RESULTS IN THIS STATE.

The Yield of the Oregon Streams Has Been Enormous—Many Millions of Pounds of Salmon Produced During the Past Twelve Months.

(From Wednesday's Statesman.) Igo, H. G. Van Dusen, Master Fish Warden, came to Salem yesterday, and during the afternoon the Board of Fish Commissioners held their regular monthly session, at which time the annual report of the Master Fish Warden was submitted. The afternoon was spent in routine work. Mr. Van Dusen's report shows many interesting details regarding the fisheries of Oregon, especially the salmon fisheries. He shows the excellent work done at the various hatcheries, and gives interesting details regarding the catch of fish during the year, 1921, as shown in the summaries of statistics printed below.

The general summary of the salmon product of the Columbia river and the coast streams for the year 1921 shows in number of pounds the following:

Table showing salmon product: Chinooks 14,079,656; Blueback 267,558; Steelheads 1,869,932; Silversides 4,274,983; Chums 641,593.

Total 21,123,735. The salmon product of the coast streams for the year 1921, in pounds, is:

Table showing coast streams salmon product: Chinooks 689,338; Steelheads 76,999; Silversides 2,990,462; Chums 614,819.

Total 4,371,618. The entire product of each species of fish (other than salmon) caught in the Columbia river and other Oregon waters, during the year 1921, is:

FINAL ACCOUNTS FILED IN PROBATE COURT

Mrs. W. C. Smith Has Distributed the Estate of Her Late Husband Among the Heirs—Dates for Hearing Reports.

Mrs. M. C. Smith, administrator of the estate of Wm. M.
