

## TO RECEIVE PRINCE HENRY

All Arrangements Have Been Made  
in New York

TO HONOR THE BROTHER OF EM-  
PEROR WILLIAM ON HIS AR-  
RIVAL ON AMERICAN SOIL.

The President's Delegates Will Board  
the Ocean Liner Bearing the Royal  
Guest and Formally Welcome Him  
to the United States—The Police  
Take Steps to Protect the German  
Prince at the Pier.

NEW YORK, Feb. 21.—All prepara-  
tions have been made for the reception  
and entertainment of Prince Henry, of  
Prussia, who is expected to arrive to-  
morrow. The Imperial yacht, Hohenzol-  
lern, lies at her pier at the foot of  
West 34th street, awaiting the Prince's  
arrival. The Marconi apparatus on the  
Hohenzollern has been tested. To-  
night the operator on board will begin  
to send messages in the effort to locate  
the Prince's ship. Admiral Evans,  
General Corbin, and Assistant Sec-  
retary of State Hill, the President's dele-  
gates, will board the Kronprinz Wil-  
helm, probably at the Quarantine Sta-  
tion, and will greet Prince Henry in  
the name of the United States Govern-  
ment. All arrangements have been  
completed for the dinner to be given  
by the American press in honor of  
Prince Henry, on Tuesday night, next.

The special opera performance to be  
given for the Prince, it is believed, will  
be the most brilliant performance in  
the history of the Metropolitan Opera  
House. On Sunday Prince Henry will  
visit the tomb of General Grant.

The pier at the foot of West Thirty-  
fourth street, where the Prince will  
land, has been made a special sub-  
marine precinct, with two captains,  
eight sergeants, ten roundsmen, fifty  
mounted policemen, and 100 patrolmen.

A Postal Telegraph Office, with direct  
wire connection with the German cable,  
has been established on the dock.

### JEALOUS ENGLISHMEN.

London, Feb. 21.—The weekly re-  
views make the impending arrival of  
Prince Henry at New York the occasion  
of another chapter on the Spanish-  
American war controversy. The Spec-  
tator disclaims any intention of at-  
tempting to mar the reception to be  
tendered Prince Henry, but declares  
that both Englishmen and Americans  
"see through Germany's game," and  
refuse to be misled by "attempts to  
undermine their mutual friendship and  
understanding."

The Outlook treats the matter lightly.  
It says that Emperor William now, as  
in China, "uses Prince Henry as a bait  
for the German hook." Neither Prince  
Henry nor his astute brother, the Em-  
peror, will ever succeed in wrecking  
the substantial grounds upon which  
the Anglo-American co-operation now  
rests.

### IN FIFTEEN ROUNDS.

SALT LAKE CITY, Utah, Feb. 21.—  
Jack Clifford, the California lightweight  
boxer, defeated Roy Condie of Salt Lake City  
for the count of ten in the fif-  
teenth round of a scheduled twenty-  
round contest tonight. The fight up to  
its sudden termination was very fast.

### TONIGHT'S BATTLE.

LOUISVILLE, Ky., Feb. 21.—Arrangements  
for the fight between Terry Mc-  
Govern and Dave Sullivan, tomorrow  
night, in this city, have been completed  
and reports from the fighters indicate  
that they are in prime condition for the  
contest.

### A THROUGH TRAIN.

CHICAGO, Feb. 21.—The Rock Island  
Railroad will, beginning March 1st, op-  
erate a through train service between  
Chicago and El Paso, Texas, connect-  
ing at El Paso with the Southern Pa-  
cific and the Mexican Central Roads.

### STROKE OF PARALYSIS.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 21.—Justice  
Gray, of the Supreme Court of the  
United States, who is suffering from a  
stroke of paralysis, is better tonight,  
but he is very seriously indisposed.

### HORSES FOR AFRICA.

DILLON, Mont., Feb. 21.—Three car-  
loads of saddle horses have been pur-  
chased in this county by British agents  
for use of the English army in South  
Africa.

### A DREDGER BURNED.

SEATTLE, Wash., Feb. 21.—Fire par-  
tially destroyed the Puget Sound  
Bridge & Dredging Company's big  
dredger, San Diego, anchored in Elliott  
Bay, this afternoon.

### BISHOP LATANE DEAD.

BALTIMORE, Md., Feb. 21.—Bishop  
A. Latane, of the Reformed Episcopal  
church, died tonight.

### SNOW AND RAIN

Made a Most Disagreeable Combina-  
tion in Weather in New York—  
The Worst in Years.

NEW YORK, Feb. 21.—Snow, fol-  
lowed by rain and sleet, today created  
in this city and vicinity the most dis-  
agreeable weather conditions known in  
many years. During the early hours  
of the day a heavy, wet snow fell.  
Shortly after noon the snow turned  
into a steady drizzle of rain, that con-

tinued with intermittent periods of  
sleet far into the night. Much snow  
left from the recent blizzard, was con-  
verted into slush, and tonight the  
streets are inches deep.

Washington, Feb. 21.—A severe  
snowstorm struck Washington today,  
and the National Capital is absolutely  
cut off from telephonic or telegraphic  
communication north of Baltimore, and  
is compelled to depend on uncertain  
wires to Richmond and Atlanta for  
reaching the country at large. Aside  
from some damage to the wires, the  
storm did no injury.

### TROUBLES OF SPAIN.

rioting Still Continues in Some of the  
Cities—Troops Open Fire.

MADRID, Feb. 21.—Official dis-  
patches, received here, assert that  
calm has been restored at Barcelona,  
Sargom and Valencia, but the news-  
paper telegrams report the situation  
still serious. In one case at Barcelona  
the troops escorting a convoy were  
obliged to fire on the rioters; several  
of whom were killed or wounded.

### BATTLE WITH OUTLAWS.

Oklahoma Sheriffs Succeed in Break-  
ing Up a Band of Desperadoes.

GUTHRIE, O. T., Feb. 21.—Another  
desperate fight occurred today, between  
Oklahoma officers and the band of out-  
laws that killed Sheriff Smith and  
Beck, at Anadarko, a month ago. As  
a result one of the outlaws, Walter  
Swofford, is dead, and Deputy Sheriff  
John Fisher, of Oklahoma City, seri-  
ously injured. Two other outlaws,  
Sam Casey and Bill Watson, surren-  
dered.

## MURDER OR SUICIDE?

A WOMAN KILLED IN PRESENCE  
OF HER HUSBAND.

The Slayer of Sheriff Ricker, in Wy-  
oming, Confesses the Deed—Bank  
Wrecker in Detroit Faces a Third  
Charge.

EVERETT, Wash., Feb. 21.—Mrs.  
Clara Malvern was shot to death this  
morning, at her home in Snohomish.  
Whether it is a suicide or a murder, the  
coroner's jury has not yet decided.  
Joe Malvern, a piano player, went home  
intoxicated, and began a quarrel with  
his wife, during which the shot was  
fired. Malvern claims the wife shot  
herself.

### He Confessed.

Casper, Wyo., Feb. 21.—Chas. Wood-  
ward, the murderer of Sheriff Ricker,  
who was captured near Billings, Mont.,  
confessed on the witness stand today,  
and told of the crime in all its details.

### A Third Charge.

Detroit, Mich., Feb. 21.—The third  
waiver was issued today for Frank C.  
Andrews, vice president of the City  
Savings Bank, on a complaint charging  
him, together with another officer of  
the bank, for whom a warrant was also  
issued, with making a false report on  
the bank's condition to the State Bank-  
ing Commissioner. Andrews was ar-  
raigned in the police court and held for  
examination in an additional \$5000 bail.  
Bail was not furnished.

## TREATY WITH GREAT BRITAIN

Final Ratifications Made by Hay  
and Paunceforte

ENGLISH DIPLOMAT REGARDS IT  
AS ONE OF THE MOST IMPOR-  
TANT AGREEMENTS

Ever Made Between His Country and  
the United States—Sharp Debate  
in the United States Senate on the  
Philippine Tariff Bill—Cuban Reci-  
procity Problem in Committee—  
The Indian Bill.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 21.—The final  
ratifications of the Hay-Paunceforte  
treaty, giving England's assent to the  
construction of a canal across Central  
America by the United States, were ex-  
changed at the State Department this  
afternoon. Lord Paunceforte regards  
the treaty as the most important con-  
vention ever drawn between the United  
States and Great Britain, and one that  
will do much to prevent friction in the  
future between the two peoples.

### THE PHILIPPINE TARIFF.

Washington, Feb. 21.—For more than  
six hours today the Senate had the  
Philippine tariff bill under discussion.  
Bate (Tenn.) delivered a carefully pre-  
pared speech in opposition to the pend-  
ing measure. He was followed by  
Spooner, in a brilliant defense of the  
Republican attitude toward the Philip-  
pine Islands. He became involved fre-  
quently in heated colloquies with mem-  
bers of the minority. He concluded  
with an appeal to Congress to stand by  
the policies of McKinley and Roosevelt.

Tillman began a characteristic ar-  
raignment of the Administration in the  
Philippines, but had not concluded  
when the Senate adjourned.

### The Indian Bill.

Washington, Feb. 21.—The House to-  
day passed the Indian Appropriation  
bill. No amendments of importance  
were attached to it today. The latter  
part of the session was devoted to a  
consideration of private claims, bills,  
a number of which were passed.

### Cuban Reciprocity.

Washington, Feb. 21.—The Cuban  
reciprocity problem was again before  
the Republican members of the Ways  
and Means Committee today, who were  
in conference for two hours, then ad-  
journed until tomorrow without reach-  
ing an agreement.

After the conference it was stated by  
those in a position to know, that there  
would be an agreement later and the  
belief was expressed that the concession  
to Cuba would be about 30 per cent.  
probably as a rebate.

### A Report Due.

Washington, Feb. 21.—It is estimated  
at the State Department that fifteen  
days have now elapsed since the money  
for Miss Stone's ransom was paid  
over to the agents of the brigands.

At least five days have elapsed be-  
yond the time fixed in the stipulation  
to place her in the hands of her friends.  
There is no explanation of the delay.

### A FATAL ACCIDENT.

Awful Fate of an Employee of a Lant  
County Sawmill.

EUGENE, Or., Feb. 21.—A fatal acci-  
dent occurred this afternoon, in the  
sawmill at Springfield.

J. S. Anders was at work on a log  
way, when a "dog," that had not been  
driven into one of the logs securely,  
flew out and struck the man on the  
temple with such force as to shatter  
his skull. He lived only a few minutes.

### TO THE ANTARCTIC.

British Expedition Supplied With the  
Required Provisions and Ac-  
countments.

VICTORIA, B. C., Feb. 21.—The  
steamer Miowara, which arrived here  
this afternoon, brought a report of the  
steamer Tanglin, which had arrived at  
Sydney after taking provisions to  
Kerguelin Island, for the Government  
expedition which is exploring the Ant-  
arctic in the steamer Gauss. Besides  
provisions she landed eighty-eight dogs,  
dog tenders, and two German scientists,  
who are to join the party on the Gauss,  
and continue the explorations toward  
the South Pole. The buildings erected  
by the British expedition in 1874 were  
found intact.

### KANSAS POPULISTS.

They Will Run Their Own Party Af-  
fairs Without Democratic Help.

TOPEKA, Kans., Feb. 21.—The Popu-  
lists of Kansas, in session here today,  
decided late tonight that there would  
be no affiliation between the Populist  
and Democratic forces in Kansas this  
year. A strong faction led by ex-Con-  
gressman Ridgely, favored an absolute  
surrender to the Democrats, but  
there was enough of the old time Popu-  
lists to defeat this plan.

The meeting was a lively fight  
throughout. No plans for the future  
conduct of the party were made, other  
than that the party would run its own  
affairs without the assistance of the  
Democrats.

### THE SUGAR MARKET.

Further Cuts Made and Prices  
Unsettled.

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 21.—The  
Western Sugar Refinery announced a  
further cut of 15 cents in the one hun-  
dred pounds of sugar today. The mar-

ket is unsettled, and jobbers are unable  
to figure whether the cutting will stop.  
The persistent cutting of prices on the  
part of the Western Refinery, as well  
as its refusal to stand by the pooling  
agreement of the jobbers, is alleged to  
be a part of its campaign against the  
California and Hawaiian Refineries.

### THE MANHATTAN CLUB

Entertains Guests from Thirty-eight  
States at Its Annual Gathering.

NEW YORK, Feb. 22.—The Manhat-  
tan Club was the scene tonight of the  
greatest gathering of Democrats in its  
history. Speakers of National reputa-  
tion from thirty-eight states were pres-  
ent. The speakers were David R. Hill,  
Justice Chas. H. Truax, Mayor Patrick  
A. Collins, of Boston, and Edward M.  
Shepard.

Among the guests were Governor  
Toole, of Montana; Senator W. A. Clark,  
of Montana, and C. E. S. Wood,  
Oregon.

## HOTEL HORROR IN NEW YORK

Fire on Park Avenue Results in  
Loss of Life

EIGHTEEN PEOPLE FIND DEATH  
IN THE FIERCE FLAMES IN A  
LEADING HOSTELRY.

The Fire Started in the Armory Ad-  
joining and Spread to the Crowded  
House—Scenes of Horror Around  
the Burned Building—Many of the  
Guests Seriously Injured—The  
Casualty List.

NEW YORK, Feb. 22.—For the third  
time since New Year's day, Park Ave-  
nue of this city has been the scene of  
the loss of human life. The first was  
the collision in the New York Central  
tunnel; the second came in the dynamite  
explosion in the Rapid Transit  
Subway, and the third today, was the

suffering from shock.

Joseph Pearson, 60 years old, hya-  
teria.

Frank B. Reed, proprietor of Park  
Avenue Hotel, burned on face and  
hands.

William Stebbins, 35 years of age,  
burned on face and hands.

Mrs. S. Veach, burned on face, hands  
and body.

Charles L. Woodbury, Portland, Me.,  
partly suffocated.

Major Spahn was in the city attend-  
ing the Theta Delta Phi annual con-  
vention. He was a member of the en-  
gineer branch of the National Guard  
and held a commission as Major.

John S. Hovey was formerly a resi-  
dent of New Orleans. Latterly he was  
a bookkeeper in a confectionery concern  
here.

Frederick R. Reed, manager of the  
hotel said:

"The minute the fire started in the  
hotel I summoned all available men  
and sent them through the halls to give  
warning. I cannot see how any one  
could have failed to be aroused by the  
bells that were rung from the office.  
I got my wife on the fourth floor and  
descended with her to the street in  
safety. Then I went to the roof, and  
when I found that the flames were be-  
coming dangerous, I descended for my  
own safety. The fire unquestionably  
started in the bottom of the elevator  
shaft. I believe the fire was of incendi-  
ary origin, and in no way contingent  
upon the fire in the armory building."

(When the news of the Park Avenue  
Hotel fire reached Salem, there were  
anxious hearts here, for it was known  
by the members of the family, that Mr.  
and Mrs. A. N. Bush, of this city, were  
guests at that hotel, and when re-  
peated messages to New York during  
yesterday elicited no response, the con-  
cern of their friends increased. Last  
night, however, a message was receiv-  
ed by Hon. A. Bush, from his son, re-  
porting that both Mr. and Mrs. Bush  
were well and unscathed. The little  
yellow telegram brought great relief to  
the friends and relatives of the absent  
ones).

### BRITISH SHIPPING.

Depression So Great That Vessels Are  
Being Sold for Junk.

NEW YORK, Feb. 24.—Depression  
in the British shipping trade continues,  
says a London dispatch to the Tribune,  
and freights, which commenced to fall  
more than a year ago, are now so low  
as to be almost, if not quite, unprofit-  
able. Prices for building new steamers  
have fallen considerably, and in  
many instances are fully 20 per cent  
under the highest figures obtained in  
1900. Second hand vessels have depre-  
ciated to an even more marked extent,  
and the supply both of new and second-  
hand steamers is much in excess of the  
demand.

A great number of old liners and  
merchant steamers have been sold to  
British and Continental buyers to be  
broken up, and many thousands of tons  
probably will be disposed of before  
long for the same purpose.

### TO ANNEX US.

A Canadian Wants to Take in Part of  
the United States.

LONDON, Feb. 22.—David Mills, in  
an article in the Empire Review, writ-  
ing while he was Canadian Minister of  
Justice, bitterly assails President  
Roosevelt's and Senator Lodge's inter-  
pretation of Monroism. He declares  
that the United States "are so long  
enamoured of their own political insti-  
tutions and so devoted to self-worship,  
that they think no others are deserving  
of admiration."

Mills maintains that it would be to  
the state of Maine's commercial advan-  
tage to enter the Canadian Federation.

### WAS FOUND GUILTY.

Murderer of a Wyoming Sheriff Con-  
victed by a Jury.

CASPER, Wyo., Feb. 22.—The jury in  
the case of Chas. Woodward, charged  
with the murder of Sheriff C. W. Ricker,  
of Natrona county, January 2d, to-  
day brought in a verdict of guilty of  
murder in the first degree. Sentence  
was deferred until Monday.

The trial occupied but two and a half  
days, the greater part of which time  
was given up to securing a jury.

### OUT OF BUSINESS.

RAT PORTAGE, Ont., Feb. 22.—Jake  
Gaudaur, the famous oarsman, slipped  
on the ice today, fracturing a bone in  
the right shoulder and cutting his face  
badly. The surgeon says Gaudaur will  
never row a boat again.
