## SELLING THE HOPS STATE FAIR PURSE

### CONTRACTS FILED AT THE COURT HOUSE YESTERDAY

At Eleven Cents and Better Per Pound.  
—Twelve Cents Has Been Offered on Contracts in Some Instances.

(From Wednesday's Statesman.)

Five hops contracts were filed for record in the county recorder's department, yesterday, representing 40,000 pounds, or 225 bales of Marion county hops, of the 1902 crop. Of these five, three were for the consideration of 11 cents, one for 11 1/4 and one for 11 1/2 cents. Although a number of contracts have been made this season the growers are at present very reluctant and are inclined to take their chances in the market and it is understood, through information from reliable authority that 12 cents is being offered quite freely on contract at the present writing. The contracts follow:

**IN PROBATE.**—The Marion county probate court yesterday rendered its order sustaining the motion of D. F. Lane, administrator of the estate of E. M. Frederick, deceased, for judgment on pleadings which order virtually dismisses the petition of John Reiger for the revocation of the letters of administration issued to D. F. Lane by the Marion county probate court upon the grounds that E. M. Frederick was a resident of Multnomah county at the time of his decease and that the Marion county probate court had no jurisdiction over the estate. The matter has been contested in the courts for several months and it is quite probable that the petitioner, John Reiger, will appeal to the circuit court. C. U. Gantenbein and F. A. Turner are the attorneys for John Reiger and W. H. Holmes, Webster and Frank Holmes are the attorneys for the administrator, D. F. Lane.

## POLITICS IN THIS COUNTY

### Situation Has Changed But Little in a Week

### THE CONTEST WARMER SINCE THE CENTRAL COMMITTEE HAS BEEN CALLED TO MEET.

Hon C. W. Fulton Will Attempt to Secure the Nomination for United States Senator at the State Convention—He is an Avowed Candidate for This Position.

(From Wednesday's Statesman.)

The political situation in Marion county remains about the same, there being apparently very little change in the past week. In every precinct in the county, the leaders are counting noses, and making forecasts as to the result of the primaries, as to which aspirant for a state position will be successful, and in some cases the position statement is made that this or that candidate will carry such and such a precinct with but little trouble. That some of these statements are probably justified cannot be questioned, but a large proportion of them are idle speculation and guesswork.

As stated before in these columns, there are four candidates for state offices in this county, and each will doubtless undertake to secure the Marion county delegation to the State Convention—Gov. T. T. Geer, who wants a re-nomination and election; Frank T. Wrightman, a candidate for Attorney General; and Wm. J. Clarke, of Gervais, and P. J. Beckett, of Salem, each of whom desires to be the candidate of the Republican party for State Printer. This, however, does not necessarily mean that each candidate expects to carry the solid delegation to Portland to the exclusion of every other aspirant. Many of the delegates will doubtless favor two of these candidates, and will have a first and a second choice; that is, should their first choice for a state office fail to secure the nomination, the second, from the same county may be more fortunate.

The main contest in this county, at the present time seems to be between Governor Geer and Mr. Wrightman, and the supporters of the two men are hard at work lining up their people, for the contest. The calling of the county central committee for next Saturday, when the delegates to the State Convention will be fixed, has already had a tendency to spur the workers on, and renewed activity was visible in their ranks yesterday, as now they have a definite date to work to.

The legislative ticket seems also to be likely to become the subject of a battle in this county. The Simon and Mitchell people are opposed to each other, and the lines are sharply drawn. The supporters of the Mitchell people are really not agreed on any one candidate for the United States Senate, but are battling for the defeat of "the Joe." Just as some time ago they were clamoring for the defeat of H. W. Corbett, for no other reason, only that his election means the partial loss of Federal patronage for the Mitchell wing, and they are after the leaves and fishes—too often the dominating principle in politics. Senator Simon, though not yet on the ground to look after his own campaign, seems to have developed considerable strength, and his workers are thoroughly organized. The little general himself is said to be on his way home from Washington, to take charge of his campaign, and he will doubtless work hard to secure re-election. The opposition does not seem to be united on any one man for this position, but there is one avowed candidate in their ranks for Senator Simon's seat, and that is State Senator C. W. Fulton. "Charley" Fulton, as he is known throughout the state, is a candidate for the place, has announced himself so, and is determined to make the best fight possible. He is a vigorous young man of ability, courage and strength of purpose, and will doubtless make a formidable rival if his faction of the party does not split up too much and does not put too many candidates in the field. Mr. Fulton has announced it to be his purpose to go before the State Convention and ask for the nomination for United States Senator. He is the only candidate who has thus far expressed his intention of taking advantage of this law.

The law under which Senator Fulton hopes to secure the nomination and the endorsement of the people, was passed at the last session of the Legislature, and is as follows:

"Sec. 1.—At all general elections next preceding the election of a Senator in Congress by the Legislature of Oregon there shall be placed upon the official ballot by each of the county clerks and clerks of the county court, the names of all candidates for the office of Senator in Congress that have been nominated in any of the methods now, or which may hereafter be, provided by law for the nomination of state officers of the state of Oregon, the votes for which candidates shall be counted and certified to, by the election judges in the same manner as the votes for other candidates; and records of the vote for such candidates shall be made out and sworn to by the board of canvassers of each county of the state and returned to the Secretary of State, who shall transmit duplicate copies of such returns to the Legislative Assembly at its next ensuing session, one of which shall be addressed to the Senate and the other to the House of Representatives of the state of Oregon, one copy of which shall be delivered by him to the President of the Senate and the other to the Speaker of the House of Representatives after the organization of such bodies, which officers shall open and lay the same before the separate houses when assembled to elect a Senator in Congress as now required by law of Congress; and it shall be the

duty of each house to count the votes and announce the candidate for Senator having the highest number, and thereupon the house shall proceed to the election of a Senator as required by the act of Congress and the Constitution of this state."

### MRS. W. W. STEPHENS PASSED TO HER REST.

Her Demise Followed an Operation—Leaves a Large Family of Grown-up Children—Husband Passed Away Last November.

Mrs. Mary Jane Stephens, aged about 50 years, died at the Florence Sanatorium at 1:45 o'clock yesterday afternoon, after a serious surgical operation had been performed. Mrs. Stephens, whose maiden name was Myers, was a native of California and was married to W. W. Stephens who preceded her to the grave on Friday, November 15, 1901, at Santa Cruz, California, on April 17, 1872, and came with him to this city directly afterward and has resided in and near Salem continuously since.

A number of children blessed the marriage, six of whom survive her, and mourn her demise very deeply, as follows: Mrs. Mary L. Ryan, Mrs. M. S. McIntyre, William W. Stephens Jr., of Tacoma, Washington; James S. Stephens, Anna P. Stephens and Lizzie E. Stephens, all of whom reside near this city. The funeral arrangements have not as yet been made, but will be announced in tomorrow's edition of the Statesman.

### Passing of a Pioneer.

Titus Smith, who came to Oregon in the fall of 1848, died at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Amanda Bones, of Sheridan, Yamhill county, Tuesday morning, February 25, 1902, aged 78 years next April. The remains will be brought to Salem today and burial will take place at the McCorkle cemetery at West Howell Prairie. His wife preceded him to the grave some twenty-six years ago. The children left to mourn are four sons and seven daughters. They are: Mrs. Nora Murray, of Howell Prairie; T. E. Smith, of La Grande, Oregon; W. F. R. Smith, of Salem; Mrs. Amanda E. Bones, of Sheridan; Mrs. J. E. Boydston, of Portland; Mrs. Lula Remington, of Dallas; Mrs. Ira Smith, of Boise, Idaho, and Iva, Frank and Arminia Smith of Roseburg.

### TWO NEW COMPANIES READY FOR BUSINESS.

Oil Lands to Be Developed by a Strong Corporation—A Lumber and Shingle Mill to Begin Operations at Detroit.

In the Department of State, at the Capitol, yesterday, two new companies filed articles and received authority to begin business. They are:

The Portland Consolidated Oil Company will develop oil lands and do general mining, with headquarters in Portland. The company has a capital of \$1,000,000, and the shares are valued at \$1 each. B. Chappelle Brown, M. E. Thompson and N. W. Rountree are the incorporators of record.

The Cascade Cedar Shingle, Lumber & Piling Company will manufacture and deal in lumber, shingles, logs, etc., with headquarters in Detroit, and a capital of \$50,000. H. Jacobs, L. Jacobs, L. W. Smith and K. Smith are the incorporators.

## NOTE AND COMMENT

### MICHIGAN SUGAR.

Portland Telegram.—Michigan is the greatest beet-sugar producing state in the Union. It now has thirteen sugar mills, and four others are in course of construction. During the season of 1901-2 these thirteen mills consumed the beets raised on 66,400 acres of ground, for which product the growers received \$3,107,520. The mills paid \$4.50 per ton for beets containing 12 per cent of sugar, and \$3.1-3 cents per ton additional for each one per cent of sugar over 12. This gave the beet-growers about 2 1/2 cents a pound for their sugar. The average cost of making standard granulated sugar at the best mills in the country last year was 3 1/2 cents a pound. This, then, gives the cost of extracting and refining the sugar at three-fourths of a cent a pound. The average selling price of granulated sugar last year was over 5 cents a pound, so it would seem that the beet-sugar growers and manufacturers both did fairly well, and have no occasion to become excitedly alarmed over the proposed concession to Cuban sugar. Cuban raw sugar sold last year in New York at an average price of 4.847 cents, of which 1.63 cents was taken by the tariff, and .767 for freight and commissions, leaving the Cuban planter but 1.5 cents a pound net, which is below the cost of production, even with the cheapest labor that can be procured in Cuba. The beet-sugar farmers are not to be blamed for asking for a tariff on foreign sugar, since tariff benefits are being passed around; yet with good sugar-beet land, and fairly contiguous to a good market, the beet-growers are scarcely justified, perhaps, in making so loud a complaint as is being voiced by Mr. Oxnard, their spokesman.

### Not a Corner.

Roseburg Review.—Oregon hasn't a corner on the smallpox complaint. All over the world an epidemic of the dreaded disease, more serious than has occurred for two or three years, is raging. Against the overwhelming course of the disease vaccination is making small headway. Chicago, Boston, London, Philadelphia, New York are all more or less afflicted, according to reliable reports.

### DOWN KLAMATH RIVER.

Desperate Chances Taken by Burglars Who Escaped From Jail.

GRANTS PASS, Feb. 27.—Report is received here from Klamath, Northern California, that W. W. Reed and Thomas Featherstone, the two prisoners who broke out of the Jacksonville jail last week, succeeded in reaching Klamath river by an arduous trip through the timbered and rough mountains, and have sailed down the stream in a small boat. They were seen passing Hamburg Bar a few days ago.

This is a very desperate undertaking on the part of the fugitives, and if they succeed in getting safely down the river to the sea, it will be the first time that such a feat has ever been accomplished. The river is one continuous rapid, with frequent eddies, whirlpools and protruding rocks, so that it is an impossibility to make the passage without the boat being swamped. It is possible that the escapes will succeed in getting far enough down the river to be beyond telephone communication, and then make a landing.

### LOGGERS IN DESPAIR.

Warm Weather Causes Heavy Losses in Minnesota Timber.

DULUTH, Minn., Feb. 27.—A week of warm, unseasonable weather has seriously affected the logging business on account of the disappearance of the snow and ice in the woods. Millions of feet of logs are ready to haul, but must be abandoned until next season. It is expected the loss to the logging and lumber industry will be \$10,000,000, and many smaller loggers will be bankrupted.
