## ARID LAND BOARD

HELD A MEETING TO DISCUSS THE APPLICATIONS

Of Several Eastern Oregon Companies Desiring to Secure Contracts-Safeguards Provided by the State Authorities for Future Purchasers and Settlers.

(From Saturday's Statesman.) The State Land Board yesterday held a meeting to discuss the matter of the reclamation of arid lands in Eastern February 11th-William P. Sheridan Oregon, as contemplated by the law and Miss Anna M. Wolf, John Wolf passed at the last session of the Legislature. There are three large companies and a dozen smaller concerns, anxious to take advantage of the provisions of the law regarding the regiamation of desert lands, and they have submitted surveys and estimates, show the lands each desires to reclaim, and the cost at which land may be secured by settlers, after it is reclaimed.

The three companies referred to de sire to appropriate 150,900, 80,000, and 70,000 acres, respectively.

The Board at yesterday's session decided to place the estimates and surveys in the hands of a competent engineer to investigate and report upon the cost of reclaiming the lands.

The Board proposes to throw all possible safeguards around future purchasers and settlers of the lands, so that the settlement of them, when reclaimed, will not be retarded. The Board has also drawn up contracts to be signed up with these companies, providing for the prompt beginning of reclaiming the lands, and the completion of it in a reasonable time, so that the lands thus set aside to some company. will not be held indefinitely for grazing purposes, instead of being sold to settlers as contemplated by the acts of Congress and of the Oregon Legislature, providing for the reclamation of arid lands.

When these contracts are finally perfected between the state and the companies desiring to reclaim the lands in question ,the future setttler will be protected, and the result will doubtless be the settlement of large tracts of Eastern Oregon lands by industrious farmers, who will make the desert bloom like a rose garden.

The State Land Office has, during the month of February just closed, collected \$37,178.64, on account of the several funds in the hands of the board, and this amount was yesterday afternoon transferred to State Treasurer Chas. WHILE WALKING TO HIS BROTH ER'S HOUSE AT A LATE HOUR LAST NIGHT.

Coroner Lane Took Charge of the Re mains, and They Were Identified as the Man Named, Who Was a Farmer Living Seven Miles East of This City.

George M. Bewley, a farmer and woodhauler, residing with his family seven miles east of this city, aged about 50 years, was found dead on High street between Marion and Union streets, last night about 10 o'clock.

Captain M. McGregor and Lieut. E.

Seeley, officers of the Salvation Army, while going to their home from meeting, about 10 o'clock last night found man lying crosswise of the sidewalk, between O. G. Savage's residence and that of Dr. L. A. Port. It was quite dark and the ladies were within a foot or two of the body when they discovered it. This so frightened them that they both screamed and ran back to Mr. Savage's house and told him what they had found. Mr. Savage, taking a DR. WISE OF PORTLAND BEGAN lamp, went out and found the man, to all appearances dead, and at once notified Chief W. W. Johnson of the fire lepartment, and also telephoned for Coroner D. F. Lane, Mr. Johnson went down to where the man was lying and Dr. Lane arrived shortly afterwards. An examination was made and Dr. Lane said that the man had been dead less than an hour.

Several envelopes and receipts were found on his person addressed to Geo. M. Bewley, Rural Free Delivery, Route No. 7. In the upper left hand corner of the envelopes was the name of J. W. Bewley, Salem, Oregon. Nothing more that time. Among the papers was a receipt from Geo. C. Will for \$8.75 on tax notice for \$1.

Mr. Hall frequently hears from the outside precincts to which registration outfits were sent, and in every instance the work is progressing rapidly.

In the most remote districts, where the population is scattered, registration blanks are forwarded so that each voter may fill out one, have it attested to before a notary public or justice of the peace, and returned to the county clerk with three of the voters' signatures attached, two of which are cut off and pasted into the general and precinct registration books, while the blank is pasted into another book especially prepared for that purpose. Mr. Hall is experiencing a great deal of trouble with the blank method, in that in many instances the voter neglects to supply some of the most essential information in which cases the blanks must be returned to be corrected. About 200 of these registration sheets have been received by the county clerk and entered in the books, and more are being sent out every day. Up to last evening 1037 registrations had been made in the county clerk's department, as follows:

When Dr. Wise departed from the ethics laid down by this body of dentists, he was placed in high disfavor among his brothers.

"The resignation was discussed yes terday at the meeting of the committee and it was decided that it had not been received until the rule of the society had been broken, and it was then too late to accept it. A vote to expel was then taken and carried, although how the vote stood could not be learned. In December they amounted to \$1000, and in January, the first month he appeared in the papers, to \$2000. Dr. Wise concludes with the statement that his business has been constantly increasing and that he intends to continue the use of the papers for the pur-
