PACIFIC HOMESTEAD

PRIZE CONTEST, SALEM, OR.

HAS REMOVED.—The Western nation, the old Salem landmark, F. Le Branch, proprietor, has been removed from its old location on the corner of State and Commercial streets to the old Costello place on North Liberty street, or Broadway. The brick building on the corner of State and Commercial streets is the property of H. Hirschberg, the banker of Independence, and is destined to undergo a complete change in the near future. The H. Wiprut & Co. cigar store will occupy the entire front part of the building, as far back as the store now extends, while the rear of the structure is to be remodelled and modernized, and no doubt occupied by some business firm the identity of which is not known, but negotiations are now pending for the lease. A rumor has been circulated that Mr. Hirschberg contemplated starting a bank in this building, but the report could not be confirmed and is evidently untrue, as it is known that he is negotiating to lease the vacant room as soon as it is remodelled.

RIOTING OF STRIKERS

NORFOLK, VIRGINIA, THE SCENE OF A FIERCE CONFLICT.

State Troops Have Been Called Out to Suppress Lawlessness and Protect Property of the Street Car Lines—Trolley Wires Are Destroyed.

NORFOLK, Va., March 4.—A mob of 500 strike sympathizers today held the streets of Norfolk, and the police were unable to cope with it. The street cars were repeatedly derailed, wagon loads of stones piled on the tracks, and free fights between the military and the crowd, occurred at frequent intervals. In one difficulty a sergeant ran a bayonet into the arm of H. H. Harmansef, a barber. Mrs. Harmansef, who was standing by her husband, knocked the sergeant to the ground with both fists, and discolored the face of Lieutenant Gale, who was near her. Eight companies of militia are on guard.

Martial law will be declared in Norfolk in the morning. Four more infantry companies from Emporia, Suffolk, Smithfield and Franklin, making the entire 1st Regiment, have been ordered out.

The strikers tonight cut a mile of trolley wire in the city. The troops are now guarding the power plant. At a meeting tonight the Central Labor Union boycotted the street cars.

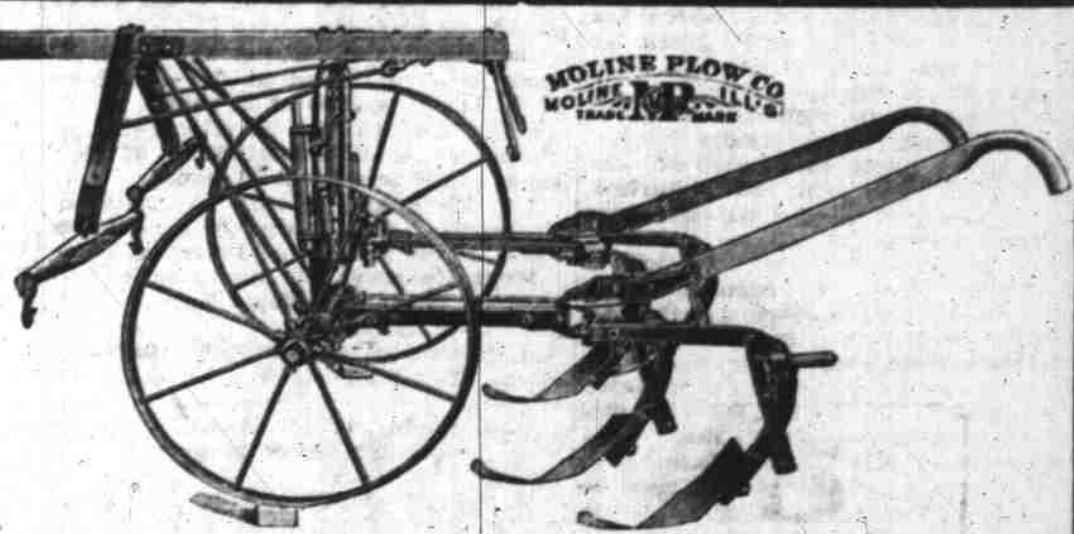
