**ROAD CREATED BY DEDICATION**

**Interesting Case Decided by the Supreme Court**

**NEGLIGENCE IN A CASE WHERE A BOY ACTING AS BRAKEMAN ON A LOGGING ROAD WAS MAIMED—THE COMPANY HELD LIABLE FOR THE DAMAGES.**

The Supreme Court yesterday handed down several important decisions in appeal cases. Among them are the following:

S. Spencer, respondent, vs. V. C. Peterson, appellant; appeal from Marion county, Hon. Geo. H. Burnee, judge; affirmed; opinion by Associate Justice F. A. Moore.

This was an action for damages for obstructing an alleged highway. The plaintiff avers that he has, since May 6, 1891, been in possession of certain real estate from which he has been in the habit of passing, with vehicles and on foot along a duly dedicated highway to the county court; that such highway is the only accessible route to and from his premises and that defendant wrongfully obstructed the same by placing a fence across it, to plaintiff's damage in the sum of \$1500. The answer denied the material allegations and the trial resulted in a verdict for the plaintiff for \$100, and defendant appealed. Defendant contended that the court erred in admitting in evidence, over objection, the recorded plat of the Waldo Hills Fruit Farms, showing the land subdivided in tracts, to be cut up with roads, laid out by the original owners of the land, and in the dedication those roads are designated as such to assure the purchasers of the lands the dense in case, and that they are roads. The appellate court holds that the recorded plat or map, so designating these roads, was admissible as evidence in the case, and that the roads, even though the county had performed no work on them, hence there was no error in admitting this testimony. The plaintiff having filed a cost bill, the item, among others, of "To sheriff's fees, \$3." was objected to, but allowed by the court, and this was assigned as error. It is found the sheriff traveled 30 miles in serving the summons, and the appellate court finds he was entitled to 10 cents a mile traveled, under the laws of Oregon, 1889, p. 66. The judgment is affirmed.

Curtis E. Bowers, an infant, by Daniel C. Bowers, his guardian, respondent, vs. Star Logging & Lumber Company, appellant; appeal from Columbia county; Hon. T. A. McBride, judge; affirmed; opinion by Chief Justice R. S. Bear.

Plaintiff, on March 6, 1879, when 18 years old and employed by the defendant for a short time, was put to work as brakeman on a logging railroad, and while attempting to set a brake, fell or was thrown in front of the car, so that his arm was crushed, resulting in its amputation. The complaint charges neglect on the ground that defendant knowingly that the boy was inexperienced negligently directed him to act as brakeman, without cautioning him of the danger and that the brake was defective and dangerous. The plaintiff secured a verdict in the trial court, and defendant appealed, assigning the admission of certain testimony and the overruling of the motion for a nonsuit. The court holds that the testimony, the admission of which was complained of, was properly admitted, as it went to show, what plaintiff contended, that the brakel appliances were out of repair. In concluding its opinion the court says: "If the danger to which the plaintiff was exposed was such an open one as that, considering his age, intelligence and experience, he ought in the exercise of reasonable care have known and appreciated it, then he assumed the risk by entering the service and would not be entitled to recover for an injury received on account thereof. On the other hand, if the danger was not open and obvious to a person of his age, experience and intelligence, then he did not assume the risk, unless he had been sufficiently informed of the danger. All these questions are not much involved in doubt, that they were for the jury to decide, and could not be determined by the court as a matter of law. The testimony certainly tended to show that the position of brakeman on the logging train was a very dangerous employment, and had elements of danger that were not open and obvious to inexperienced persons. It is at least required some experience to do the work safely. The plaintiff was a boy inexperienced in that kind of work, and there is evidence tending to show that he was not adequately warned of its dangers. The judgment must, therefore, be affirmed.

The following case was also decided:

Mamie N. Starr, respondent, vs. Kate M. Kaiser, appellant; appeal from Multnomah county; Hon. J. B. Cleland, judge; affirmed; opinion by Associate Justice C. E. Wolverton.

Minor orders were made by the court in the following cases:

John McCourt, respondent, vs. John E. Beam, appellant; appeal from Umatilla county; on motion file an undertaking; opinion per curiam; motion for leave to serve and file an undertaking for the appeal allowed, but motion to recall writ will be continued for argument at the Pendleton term.

J. Levi, et al., appellants, vs. Wm. Frazier, sheriff, respondent; ordered on stipulation that appellants have until May 20th to serve and file brief. Salem Light & Traction Company, respondent, vs. F. R. Anson, appellant; ordered that transcript be corrected as stipulated, and that appellant have until May 1st to serve and file his brief, and may have such correction granted.

New Zealand Insurance Company, respondent, vs. E. J. Frazier, et al., appellants; ordered on suggestion of a diminution of the record that clerk complete the transcript, and that respondent have 30 days additional time to serve and file additional abstract and at the same time to serve and file brief.

In the Skinner estate, George E. Lewis, respondent, vs. T. W. Wann, appellant; motion to dismiss appeal continued until the hearing on the merits, and may be renewed at that time.

The appeal case of A. W. Hesse, respondent, vs. N. A. Barrett, et al., appellants, was argued and submitted by George R. Bagley for appellant, and E. B. Tongue for respondent.

**E. F. HUTCHINS PASSES AWAY**

**Died at Independence After an Extended Illness.**

Mr. Hutchins was for a number of years a business partner of F. E. Southwick, of this city, and the firm had several important building contracts here, among them being the erection of Salem's magnificent city hall. Deceased was a member of Olive Lodge No. 18, I. O. O. F., and Salem Camp No. 118, both of this city. He leaves a wife, but no children. The funeral will be held tomorrow at 2 p. m., at Dallas, the procession leaving Independence at 10 a. m., and will be held under the auspices of the Woodmen.

**Laid to Rest.**

Rev. G. R. Bennett, of Port Lavaca, Texas, arrived in Salem yesterday morning, and his mission was a sad one. He formerly resided in Stayton, and recently went to Texas, leaving his wife, who was ill, here for a short time. During his absence she died, passing away a week ago Sunday. Rev. Bennett was communicated with, and he at once started for this city. The remains of Mrs. Bennett had, in the meantime, been embalmed, and held pending the sorrowing husband's arrival.

A son of the family, E. F. Bennett, of Portland, formerly the publisher of the Stayton Times, also came up yesterday, and during the afternoon the funeral of the late Mrs. Bennett was held from the First M. E. church. The remains were laid to rest in Lee Mission cemetery.
