THE EAGLE TO SCREAM

First Steps Taken to Have a Big, Rousing Celebration

OF THE NATIONAL BIRTHDAY

SALEM WILL OBSERVE INDEPENDENCE DAY IN A FITTING MANNER THIS YEAR.

Great Enthusiasm, Music and Speeches at Last Night's Mass Meeting Were Followed by Preliminary Steps Looking Toward a Grand Jubilee on July Fourth—Everybody Help.

Salem will celebrate the National holiday this year as it never has been celebrated in the Willamette valley before. The city will do itself proud, and will make the eagle scream with a vengeance, and everybody will be asked to take part in one of the most rousing celebrations ever witnessed and enjoyed by the Salem people. This much was decided upon at a mass meeting of the business men and citizens of Salem last night, the largest and most enthusiastic crowd of Salem's citizens ever gathered at the initial meeting of a campaign for celebration. This spirit of patriotism and enthusiasm will keep up, and it augurs well for the project. Salem's citizens will, therefore, not be compelled to go away from home to celebrate the Fourth of July as they were compelled to do last year, but will have a rousing time at home. The result of last night's preliminary work was the appointment of an excellent committee, composed of the flower of Salem's business men, and these gentlemen will put their heads together and devise plans that will eventually into one of the most glorious celebrations in the state.

There was an exceptionally large crowd of business men and citizens in attendance at the public meeting, held at the city hall last evening, in response to a call of the Greater Salem Commercial Club, for the purpose of taking the initial steps toward making arrangements for the celebration of the Fourth of July in this city this year. The Salem Military Band rendered a number of choice selections of appropriate music on the streets and at the hall which was to a considerable extent responsible for the large representation of the business men present. The meeting was called to order at 8 o'clock and N. J. Judah was chosen as chairman for the evening, and F. J. Wilson secretary.

Several minutes of the fore part of the meeting was devoted to brief remarks from such enthusiasts as Hon. P. H. D'Arcy, Judge John H. Scott, Hon. E. Hofer, C. A. Murphy and A. W. Prescott, all of which were most cheering and were received with applause by the meeting and the result was that a more enthusiastic gathering was never held in this city. When the meeting finally settled down to business, the sentiment of all present was framed and expressed in a motion offered by A. W. Prescott to the effect that it was the sense of the meeting that Salem celebrate the Fourth of July and such a celebration as has never been witnessed before in the history of Salem, which motion was unanimously adopted amid the clapping of hands and other demonstrations of hearty approval.

After a somewhat lengthy discussion as to what was the best course for this meeting to pursue it was finally decided, upon motion, following an address by C. H. Hinges, that a general committee composed of seven members be elected at this meeting, which committee have the power to appoint all of the necessary sub-committees and to have full executive control of all of the arrangements for the celebration. The nominations for this committee were declared open and County Judge John H. Scott, C. H. Hinges, H. D. Patton, W. Merriman, C. A. Murphy, Hermann W. Barr and J. G. Graham were placed in nomination, and these gentlemen were elected by acclamation.

As the arrangements were left in the hands of this committee, which is a most excellent one, no attempt was made to outline any mode of procedure and, after a vote of thanks was extended to the Salem Military Band for the courtesies shown to the movement, adjournment was had until 7:30 o'clock Monday evening, April 22nd, when another meeting will be held for the purpose of receiving the report of the general committee, and arrange such other matters as may come up and it is hoped that everybody will turn out at their gathering, which is considered a most important one, to lend all of the assistance in their power to the success of the project. After the meeting adjourned the general committee went into session to outline a plan of work to be followed.

MILLIONS IN MONEY

The River and Harbor Bill Has Passed the Senate

WITHOUT A WORD OF DEBATE

IMPROVEMENTS ON THE UPPER COLUMBIA RIVER ADDED BY SENATOR MITCHELL.

He Urges the Conference Committee to Retain the Item in the Bill—The Race Question Discussed in the House by a Kentuckian—A Northern Congressman Makes Reply.

WASHINGTON, April 21.—Without a word of discussion of the merits of the measure, the Senate today passed the River and Harbor bill, carrying in appropriations about \$70,000,000. So thoroughly had the bill been considered by the Commerce Committee that every Senator was content that it should pass as reported from the committee. All amendments of the committee were agreed to in the course of reading the measure.

Mitchell (Oregon) read a statement of the proposed improvement of the Columbia river between The Dalles and Celilo, reviewing the work already done, looking to that improvement. He said that no more important proposition was involved in the bill than that relating to this improvement, and he urged that the Conference Committee should insist upon the amendment inserted in the measure by the Senate Committee. The bill was passed without further comment.

The Race Question.

Washington, April 21.—The House today entered upon the consideration of the Military Academy bill. In addition to the regular items it contains provisions for extensive improvements of the grounds and buildings at West Point. These improvements are to cost \$6,500,000 of which \$3,000,000 is appropriated in the bill. Cannon, chairman of the Committee on Appropriations, characterized the proposed expenditure at West Point as the "ranked kind of extravagance."

Gilbert (Kentucky) took occasion to reply to some remarks recently made by Gillette (Massachusetts); Brownell (Ohio) and General Funston, which he thought reflected upon his state. In the course of his remarks Gilbert said that in Kentucky, and in fact in all the South, they looked with supreme contempt upon the social equality of the races. The most ignorant white girl in his state, he said, would infinitely prefer to marry the lowest, meanest, most ignorant white man in the world, to the most cultivated negro in America.

"The gentleman on the other side could not cry down the 'taint in the blood.'" He recalled the fact that when a colored man sat on the other side of the House, not one of his colleagues invited him to his house. Prejudice against social equality was as strong in the North as in the South, he declared, and all this talk was "hypocritical rant and rot."

Gilbert's remarks drew a reply from Gillette (Massachusetts). Gillette said he was willing to admit the prejudice against the negro in New England. He thought when the negro man raised himself above his fellows and led a pure, clean, manly life, his worth should be recognized. He did not sympathize with the state of society which accepted the man whose hands were stained with the blood of lynching, or with election frauds, but who rejected a worthy, pure man, simply because his color was black.

IN COUNTY COURT

A DEMURRER TO PETITION ASKING FOR REMOVAL OF AN ADMINISTRATOR.

In the Marion county court yesterday, John F. Theo. Brentano, by his attorneys Bonham & Martin, filed a demurrer to the petitions of William Foley, Louis Marie Bartholomy DeLorme and F. X. Blanchet for the removal of Brentano from the administration of the estate of B. DeLorme, deceased, on the grounds that neither of the petitions state facts sufficient to entitle the petitioners to the relief prayed for in their petitions.

Upon the petition of Administrator F. M. Brooks, of the estate of Platt A. Davis, deceased, the court ordered that the personal property belonging to the estate valued at about \$2000 be sold at public auction and that \$350 of the money realized therefrom be paid to the widow of the deceased for her support and maintenance.

Matilda M. Kirk, guardian of Joseph W. Kirk, minor, yesterday petitioned the probate court for authority to sell certain property belonging to the estate of Peter Kirk, deceased, and the court ordered that May 21, 1902, be fixed as the date for hearing objections to said sale.

PEMBERTON—At the Salem Hospital, Salem, Oregon, Sunday, April 20, 1902, at 1 o'clock a. m., Ross Pemberton, aged 18 years, of appendicitis.

Deceased was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Clarkson Pemberton, who reside at Rosedale, six miles south of this city, and was taken to the hospital about one week ago, where an operation was performed for appendicitis, but the disease was too far advanced for surgical aid and he expired as stated above.
