

PROTOCOL ON PANAMA CANAL

Enacted into a Treaty at Washington Yesterday

SIGNED BY SECRETARY HAY

EXCLUSIVE RIGHTS TO CONSTRUCT, OPERATE AND PROTECT THE WATERWAY.

Given to the United States by the Republic of Colombia in the Convention Just Concluded—The Zone Is Six Miles Wide—Joint Judicial Control of the Two Nations.

WASHINGTON, April 23.—Secretary Hay and Minister Concha, of Colombia, today signed a treaty providing for the transfer to the United States of the rights incident to the construction of the proposed Panama Canal. The treaty is similar to the protocol recently signed, the terms of which have been published.

The following statement concerning the propositions of Colombia was made public today:

The United States is granted the exclusive right to construct, operate and protect the canal, and all railroads, telegraph and telephone lines, and auxiliary works within the zone.

The zone is six miles wide, and includes the islands of Flamenco, Naos, and Perico, in Panama Bay. It is to be under the joint judicial control of the United States and Colombia.

Colombia gives her unqualified consent to the sale and transfer of the Panama Canal Company's right to the United States, and exempts the country from all taxes, etc. She grants to the United States the lease of the canal strip in perpetuity. Colombia asks for the payment of \$7,000,000 after the exchange of ratifications, to be considered as an account. For fourteen years Colombia waives all compensation for the canal rights.

McCrea Reports.

Washington, April 23.—Secretary Long has received the following from Commander McCrea, of the gunboat Machias:

"Bocas del Toro, Colombia, has been evacuated. The former government is peacefully re-established. The insurgent forces have been withdrawn. I shall await the usual conditions before returning to Colon."

AN ASSESSMENT LEVIED.

On the Stockholders of the Vancouver National Bank.

VANCOUVER, Wash., April 23.—Receiver Eastham, of the First National Bank, which suspended a year ago, has received notice from the Controller of the Currency, stating an assessment of 60 per cent has been levied upon the stockholders. It is estimated that the amount raised by the assessment will be sufficient with the remaining assets of the bank, to make up the deficit of 25 per cent still due the depositors, with interest and pay other creditors.

SMUGGLING CHINESE.

Two Men Caught in the Act of Bringing in Six Celestials.

SEATTLE, Wash., April 23.—Customs inspectors Brinker and Delaney captured six contraband Chinese, and two white men who were bringing them into this country early this morning. The Chinese were pounced upon while they lay hidden underneath the folds of canvas in the bottom of a canoe. The two white men in charge, John Williams and George Ross, made a peaceable surrender.

CHINESE FOR AFRICA.

Labor Speculation of Mongolian Merchants—Men Shipped in Bond.

VANCOUVER, B. C., April 23.—A syndicate of Chinese merchants has entered into a contract labor speculation, and plans the Oriental invasion of South Africa. Two hundred Chinese, brought by the steamer Empress of China last night, are now in the custody of the customs authorities. They will be shipped in bond to Johannesburg, where they are under contract to remain five years.

INTERNATIONAL TRIBUNAL.

President Roosevelt Has Filled Vacancies Existing.

WASHINGTON, April 23.—The President has determined the succession to the vacancy on the International Tribunal in Egypt, by promoting Judge Batchelor, from the Court of First Instance to the Court of Appeals.

Judge Van Horn, of Utah, has been named to fill the vacancy in the lower court caused by the promotion.

FUNSTON CALLED OWN.

President Orders the Young General to Do Less Talking.

WASHINGTON, April 23.—By order of the President, General Funston has been directed to cease further discussion of public questions. The President has telegraphed General Funston not to speak at the Middlesex banquet in Boston.

Denver, Colo., April 23.—To a representative of the Associated Press, General Funston said with reference to the statement from Washington that the President had directed him (Funston) to cease further discussion of public questions, that he had not as yet received any such order from Washington. Continuing the conversation, the General said that in future his public utterances would be free of any reference to the Philippines, intimating that the published reports of his speeches were as a rule full of misstatement and very badly garbled.

General Funston announced last Saturday that he would not attend the Middlesex Club banquet at Boston. He has accepted an invitation to attend a banquet to be given in his honor on May 1st by the Colorado Volunteers' Association.

Washington, April 23.—By direction of President Roosevelt, Acting Secre-

tary of War Sanger has addressed the following letter to General Frederick Funston:

"War Department, Washington, April 22.—Sir: I am directed by the President to instruct you that he wishes you to cease further public discussion of the situation in the Philippines, and also to express his regret that you should make a Senator of the United States the subject of discussion or criticism. Very respectfully,

"WILLIAM CAREY SANGER,

"Acting Secretary of War."

At a banquet last Saturday night of the Colorado Sons of the Revolution, General Funston is reported to have said of Senator Hoar:

"I have only sympathy for the senior Senator from Massachusetts for suffering from an overheated conscience."

Probably what caused the issue of this Presidential letter, was an application from General Funston for leave of absence in order that he might attend the banquet in Boston given by the Middlesex Club. It was understood he was to deliver another address there and as the President deprecates the discussion of public matters in this manner by United States officers, the letter was sent. The request for a leave of absence was refused.

A copy of Mr. Sanger's letter was forwarded to Senator Hoar.

THE INDIANA REPUBLICANS

Meet in State Convention Amid Great Enthusiasm

ADDRESS BY SENATOR BEVERIDGE

THE ABLE YOUNG LEADER OUTLINED PRINCIPLES ENDORSED IN WASHINGTON.

Fairbanks Also Present—He Declared the Party Had Been as Conspicuous in Its Ability as the Democrats Had in Inability to Govern the Nation—Hanna's Name Cheered.

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., April 23.—Much oratory and enthusiasm marked the opening of the Republican State Convention this afternoon. Senator Beveridge delivered an eloquent address in which he outlined the principles upon which the Republicans of Indiana will enter the coming campaign, and although the committee on resolutions had not yet reported, it is understood the planks in the platform will not vary widely from the general statements made by Senator Beveridge.

The Senator declined to say that he was the mouthpiece of the Administration, but would not deny that what he had said had already been approved at Washington.

Following Senator Beveridge came Senator Fairbanks, who declared the Republican party had been as conspicuous in its ability to rule as the Democratic party had been in its inability to govern the country.

Frederick Landis of Wabash, brought forth loud cheers by the assertion that he voted "in the party of Mark Hanna, who had never lost a fight and never would lose one."

The outburst of applause that met the name of Hanna was fully as generous as any that had been given during the day. The convention adjourned until Thursday morning.

DEPOSITION OF THE EMPRESS

Is Anticipated in Peking and Excitement Prevails

SHE IS OUT OF THE CAPITAL

THE FOREIGN REPRESENTATIVES TAKING UNUSUAL PRECAUTIONARY MEASURES.

The American Legation Is Continually Patrolled by Troops Sent There to Protect Minister Conger and His Household and Officials—Rebellion Is Gaining Great Strength.

PEKING, April 22.—The Dowager Empress has decided to remain at the hunting park, five miles from Peking, for one week. Rumors of some political coup, possibly the deposition of the Dowager Empress, are rife. The Foreign Legations here continue their unusual precautionary measures. At the American Legation a squad of soldiers patrol the wall every night.

The Rebellion.

Victoria, B. C., April 22.—R. W. Little, of the North China Herald, who arrived by the steamer Empress of China today, says the rebellion in Kwang Si is far beyond the power of the Government troops to suppress it. Marshal Su has only 4000 troops to dispatch against the rebels, and it is unlikely that the Viceroy of other provinces will aid him. The most that can be looked for from their rulers is to guard their own borders. A strict censorship is maintained in Canton, and the tendency of the officials is to belittle the rising, the only news of which can be obtained from refugees. The Government forces were divided, 1000 being sent under Admiral Ching by the river route, and 3000 under Marshal Su, went overland. These forces, weakened by heavy desertions to the rebels, were defeated and were awaiting reinforcements.

AUSTRALIAN LEGISLATION.

Tariff Duties on Imported Machinery Is Reduced—Against Trusts.

MELBOURNE, Victoria, April 23.—The Federal House of Representatives today reduced the duty on imported machinery from 20 to 15 per cent. The tariff bill was afterwards passed through the committee stage. It goes to the Senate April 23d. The bill contains a provision allowing the suspension of duties where there is evidence that such duties lead to the formation of trusts and combinations.

YOKOHAMA, April 22, via Victoria, B. C., April 22.—Prince Charles Schwartzberg, Secretary of the Austro-Hungarian Legation at Tokio, is dead of scarlet fever.

The Japanese men-of-war Asama and Sakasago left Yokohama on the 7th inst., for Singapore, en route for England, where they will take part in the coronation review. Magnificent presents from the Emperor to his ally of England, were taken on board.

THE RIVER DISASTER.

About Seventy Lives Lost in the Awful Fire on the Mississippi.

CAIRO, Ill., April 22.—Those who have been keeping a memorandum of the people who were on board the burned steamer City of Pittsburg, report that eighty are known to be saved, fifty-one known to be lost and more than twenty missing. It is believed the death list will reach seventy.

A NEW GOVERNOR.

LOS ANGELES, Cal., April 22.—A special to the Express from Phoenix, Ariz., says: Governor Murphy announces in his paper this morning that he will resign. Alexander O. Brodie, Lieutenant Colonel of Roosevelt's Rough Riders, will succeed him, having already been named by President Roosevelt, to take place upon the expiration of Murphy's term. The decision, which is expected today, in the case of Governor Murphy as Auditor, who has been on a trial on a charge of misappropriating funds, is believed to have influenced the Governor's announcement.

TWINS BURNED.

DES MOINES, Ia., April 22.—The 3-year-old twin children of M. Shields, residing at Bear Grove, Dallas county, were found in the debris resulting from a fire that consumed a barn last evening. The fire originated in a pile of rubbish and communicated to the barn. Unknown to the parents the children were playing inside the building.

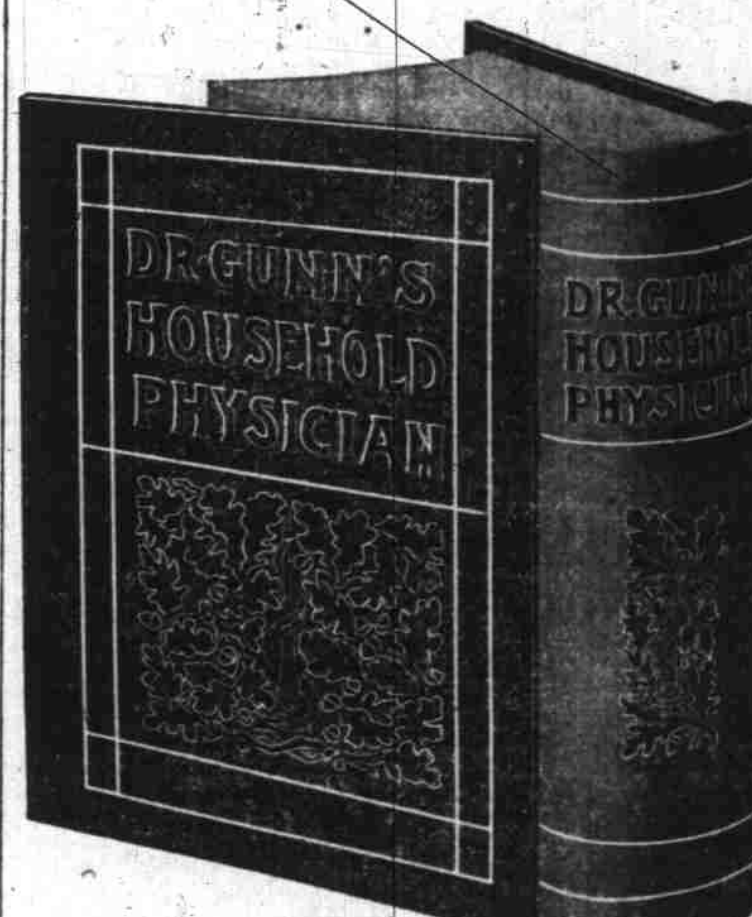
