FOR ANNUAL CONVENTION

Arrangements Making for State Teachers' Association

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE SENDS OUT A LETTER GIVING INFORMATION ON RATES FOR THOSE WISHING TO ATTEND—LOW FARES ON RAILWAYS.

The executive committee of the Western Division of the State Teachers' Association is preparing for its annual meeting to be held in June, and yesterday issued a circular letter urging the teachers to attend, and giving information as to low railroad rates and other accommodations provided for those who will attend. The text of the letter, sent out yesterday, is as follows:

"The Western Division of the Oregon State Teachers' Association will hold its session at Eugene, June 25, 26, 27, 28, 1902, programs for which will soon be issued.

"The Southern Pacific Company is offering rates as follows: Charter car rates from Ashland to Eugene and return, \$227 per coach, limit 50 passengers, and any over that number to pay \$6.55 each. From Roseburg to Eugene and return, \$150 per coach, limit 50 passengers, the rate for additional persons over that number, \$3 each. From Salem to Eugene and return, \$142.50 per coach, limit 50 passengers, rate for additional passenger, \$2.55. From Portland to Eugene and return, \$250 per coach, limit 50 passengers, rate for additional passenger, \$5.

"To take care of travel from West Side point a car will be started on train No. 2 from McMinnville, southbound by the way of Corvallis and Albany to Eugene, and the car will be returned special from Eugene to Albany in time to connect with the C. & E. train leaving that point for Corvallis at 12:45 p. m., at the rate of \$250 for the coach, limit 50 passengers, each additional passenger to pay \$5; people attending points from between McMinnville and Portland can pay local fare to either point as desired. Those attending from points between Portland and Salem can have benefit of Portland rate or pay local fare into Salem, joining the car from there.

"The people south of Salem can have benefit of car rates from that point in cases where desirable. Between Roseburg and Ashland passenger can pay the Ashland rate or local to Roseburg to join the coach at that point, and between Roseburg and Eugene can have benefit of Roseburg rate where same is lower than local fares to Eugene and return.

"Arrangements will also be made for special rate at one and one-third fare from all points on Southern Pacific lines to Eugene and return, so that in cases where this rate will be cheaper it can be taken advantage of by those attending.

"Attendants using car rates should figure on 50 cents additional for membership fee. Attendants using the one and one-third rate will take receipt at starting point for fare paid to Eugene and the Secretary will certify thereon that the holder has been in attendance at the meeting. On presentation of these receipts to the S. P. agent at Eugene within 48 hours after the adjournment of the meeting, the agent at that point will sell tickets for return at one-third fare.

NO MEETING HELD

GREATER SALEM COMMERCIAL CLUB TO BE CALLED FOR NEXT WEDNESDAY NIGHT.

The regular meeting of the Greater Salem Commercial Club, yesterday afternoon, did not materialize, for the reason that a quorum could not be secured, the business men being too busy to attend. In view of this state of affairs, President H. E. Thiesen and Secretary N. J. Judah, after consultation, decided on holding night sessions hereafter, and a meeting will be called for next Wednesday evening, at 8 o'clock, when arrangements will be made to hold night sessions during the summer months.

The lease for the North Front street mill property between the Salem Flouring Mills Co. and Eugene Bosse, manager of the flour people, was yesterday executed by Mr. Bosse for a term of 15 months, and will be sent to President T. B. Wilcox, of the Salem Flouring Mills Co., at Portland, for signature.

Mr. Bosse has secured 220 acres for flax and has 40 acres planted. If the weather remains pleasant he will finish seeding in a couple of weeks. He is well pleased with the climate but thinks spring is a trifle late.

Secretary N. J. Judah, of the Greater Salem Commercial Club, last evening received a letter from G. M. Hyland, of Portland, acknowledging the receipt of the invitation of the club to be present at the mass meeting to be held at the city hall on Friday evening, May 9th, for the purpose of organizing an improvement league, thanking the club for the honor and stating that he will be pleased to address the meeting upon the civic improvement question and that he will not fail to appear. Mr. Hyland is one of the best informed men on the Pacific Coast on the civic improvement question and it is predicted that his address upon that subject will be a treat which no one can afford to miss.

ASK FOR CLEMENCY

TWO PETITIONS FOR PARDON RECEIVED BY GOVERNOR GEER YESTERDAY.

Gov. T. T. Geer has received a petition for the pardon of Walter Lerwell, convicted from Douglas county, in November, 1900, of the crime of assault with a dangerous weapon, and sentenced to serve one year in the Penitentiary. The petition states that the

jury found him guilty because of his resistance to an officer when arrested, and that in fact he did not commit the assault, but that he attempted to stop a fight at a dance where his son was attacked by two others. The prisoner belongs to a highly respected family, has lived in Oregon 40 years, and has reared five sons and three daughters, who are highly respected citizens of Oregon. The petitioners further state that the jury recommended the defendant to the extreme mercy of the court, and urge that under this recommendation the lightest penalty possible—fine of \$100—ought to have been imposed. The petition is numerously signed by the residents of Douglas county. Defendant himself was shot at the time of the trouble and from the effects of the wound will be a cripple for life. He is 55 years old.

Another petition was received for the pardon of William Barre, serving a life sentence for murder in the second degree, and was received at the Penitentiary October 23, 1896. Barre was tried, together with another man, for the murder of a pedlar, and at his trial the jury in his case, on the first ballot stood eight for acquittal, but finally he was found guilty. The man alleged to have been murdered disappeared in Grant county, and while his body was never found, these men were charged with killing him.

The Governor has not looked into the merits of the two cases yet, but will investigate in due course of time.
