Commemorated by the American's Republican Club

IN PITTSBURG LAST NIGHT

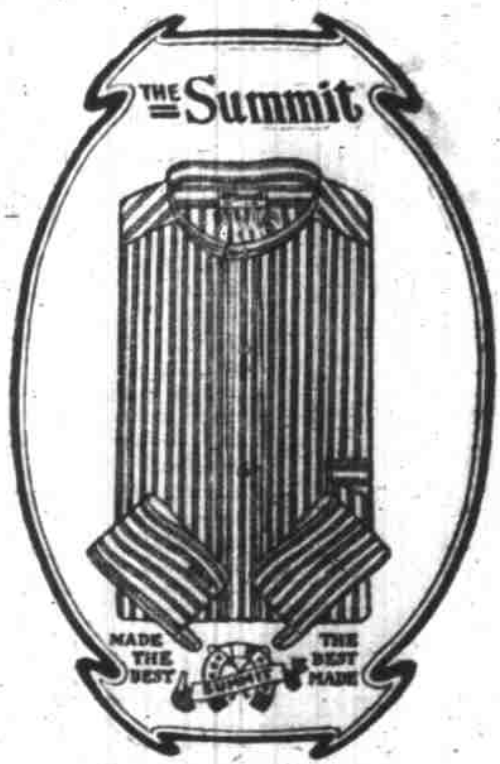
Many Eminent Men Were in Attendance at the Dinner

PRESIDENT ROOSEVELT SENT HIS REGRETS—A TOAST TO THE MEMORY OF THE GREAT GENERAL—THE DAY OBSERVED IN NEW YORK BY A BANQUET.

PITTSBURG, Pa., April 26.—The sixteenth annual dinner of the American's Republican Club, in commemoration of the birthday of General Ulysses S. Grant, was held to-night. P. C. Knox, attorney-general of the United States, officiated as the toastmaster, and among those seated about him were L. M. Shaw, secretary of the treasury; H. C. Payne, postmaster general; Congressmen Chas. E. Littlefield, of Maine, and John P. Eldkins, attorney-general of Pennsylvania.

President Roosevelt sent a message regretting his inability to be present. A standing toast was drunk to the health of the President of the United States, followed by a silent toast to the great general in commemoration of whose birth the celebration was held.

Congressman Littlefield responded to the toast "Grant," L. M. Shaw, secretary of the treasury, to the toast "Government Evolution," and H. C. Payne, postmaster general, spoke on "Men of Our Times."

SPOTTED FEVER.

Butte, Mont., April 26.—A special to the Miner from Missoula says that the spotted fever scourge in the Bitter Root valley has broken out with great violence. Eight persons already have died of the strange malady within a week, and the deaths of several more are expected.

The disease is unknown elsewhere, and thus far has baffled the physicians. The disease commences with a fever like typhoid and spots begin to show all over the body. At death the victim is spotted like a rattlesnake.

HIS SPEECH ENDED

SENATOR CARMACK HAS COMPLETED HIS WORK OF ABUSING THE ADMINISTRATION.

WASHINGTON, April 26.—Carmack, of Tennessee, in the Senate today, completed his speech on the Philippine Government bill, which began yesterday. He continued his exceedingly caustic criticism of the Administration's policy and the ultimate end to which it would lead, concluding by expressing the hope that the Administration would turn from the "bloody gospel of a strenuous life" to paths of peace.

Washington, April 26.—The House today, after devoting an hour to the passage of bills by unanimous consent, suspended public business, and for the remainder of the afternoon listened to tributes to memories of the late Representative Stokes, of South Carolina, and Crump, of Michigan.

THE ANIMAL SHOWS

NORRIS & ROWE GAVE TWO EXCELLENT PERFORMANCES IN SALEM YESTERDAY.

Norris & Rowe's Trained Animal Shows were in Salem yesterday, and the Capital City's young America was delighted. Early the streets were filled with boys and girls and even the older people, to see the big parade, and when it passed through the streets at 11 o'clock, the younger generation feasted its eyes on the splendid spectacle.

At 2 p. m. the first performance in the big tent at the passenger station commenced, with over 2500 people in the seats at the ringside, and every act, from the grand procession to the last number in the concert, was enjoyed to the full by the audience, principally boys and girls, being delighted. The feature of the performance receiving the greatest applause was the fire scene, when a little cabin, placed in the ring was burned, while the fire department, a hook-and-ladder outfit, an engine, etc., manned by dogs and monkeys, rushed to the rescue, quenched the flames and rescued the inmates—dogs.

The evening performance was again well attended and Norris & Rowe may well feel proud at the praise received for their splendid performances, while the training displayed by their animals is a never ceasing source of wonder. The show goes to Portland from here.

FOR THE CORONATION

LONDON IS PREPARING FOR ITS BIG HOLIDAY—MANY FALSE STATEMENTS.

LONDON, April 26.—The permanent residents of London are suffering from the efforts being made by the city for the coronation. There is scarcely a street through which the procession will pass but has been torn up.

The newspapers both here and in America, are full of misstatements concerning the cost of seats to view the coronation proceedings, and as to what hotels will charge visitors. Ridiculous statements as to prices paid for certain windows or seats in Piccadilly or elsewhere have been constantly published. Seats in the best positions in Piccadilly, the most sought after situations, could yesterday be had for from 8 to 20 guineas for the first day's procession. For the second day the prices asked are from 3 to 7 guineas.

AN INVESTIGATION.

Boise Ida, April 26.—The public investigation of the charges against Surveyor General Perrault began today, conducted by Inspector Greene, a special representative of the Interior Department. The charges, made by the Civil Service Committee set forth the alleged collection of political assessments in 1900, and repeated the charge that the Surveyor General dismissed several employees in 1897, in violation of the Civil Service law.

AMERICANS WON.

BOSTON, Mass., April 26.—The chess match by cable between the American Universities of Columbia, Harvard, Yale and Princeton, against Oxford and Cambridge, was concluded this evening. The Americans won four games, lost one, and drew one, making a total of 4½ points to their opponents 1½.

MISSOURI DEMOCRATS.

ST. LOUIS, Mo., April 26.—The Democrats of the First Missouri District today renominated Congressman James Lloyd. The Democrats of the Eighth District renominated Congressman Champ Clark.

Killed by Explosion.

Seattle, Wash., April 25.—Will Price and Bernard Suter were killed by an explosion of dynamite at Issaquah this afternoon. Suter's body was blown all to pieces. No one knows just how the explosion occurred.

THREE DEAD, MANY HURT

Result of the Tornado at Joplin Much Worse

THAN AT FIRST REPORTED

Heavy Storm on the Lakes Has Done Some Damage

A BOAT FOUNDERED NEAR PUT-IN-BAY, OHIO, AND THE MEN WERE LAST SEEN CLINGING TO THE RIGGING—AN EXPLOSION KILLS TWO PERSONS.

JOPLIN, Mo., April 26.—Today it is known that three persons were killed and about thirty injured in the tornado that swept through Joplin late yesterday. Of the injured perhaps eight are fatally hurt. The total loss is estimated at \$100,000.

Violent Storms.

Ashtabula, O., April 26.—One of the most violent wind storms in years is raging here, and the schooner Pretoria is aground near the piers. Seven men are on board.

In Perilous Position.

Put-In-Bay, O., April 26.—A boat was seen to founder west of this point this afternoon, with men clinging to the rigging. No further details were received.

THE STRIKE HAS ENDED

Street Railway Tie-up in San Francisco Settled

THE EMPLOYEES WON OUT

All Their Principal Demands Conceded by the Company

NEW WAGE SCALE, SHORTER HOURS AND GREATER LIBERTY FOR THE MEN AGREED TO—THE PENNSYLVANIA COAL MINERS' TROUBLES BEING ARBITRATED.

SAN FRANCISCO, April 26.—The strike on the street railway system of the United Railroads was officially declared off tonight. Victory rests with the employees, who are conceded all the principal demands. The United Railroads have granted an advance in the wages, a 10-hour day, and in a measure recognized the Car Men's Union. The company agrees to pay a flat rate of 25 cents an hour, or 23½ cents an hour, together with a bonus for long service, as the employee may elect. Thirty cents per hour will be paid for overtime. All runs are to be finished within fourteen hours from the time of commencement, and employees are to be allowed full liberty when off duty.

Arbitration Committee.

New York, April 26.—The meeting of

the Conciliation Committee of the National Civic Federation was held today, to take up the differences between the United Mineworkers and the coal operators. When the session adjourned it was announced that no definite results had been reached. A sub-committee of employers and men was appointed to take up the matters in dispute. It will report Thursday next.

Senator Hanna was asked whether the question of recognizing the Union was brought before the conference. "I do not understand that that was an issue," he replied. President Gompers, of the American Federation of Labor, said:

FORCE WAS EMPLOYED

BY THE SHIPPING COMBINE TO BRING CANADIAN PACIFIC TO TERMS.

LONDON, April 26.—The Daily Express asserts positively that the shipping combine has forced the Canadian Pacific Railway to boycott the Beaver line of steamers, by the threat that if the road failed to comply with the demands of the combine, no emigrant carried on any ship under the control of the combination would be allowed to travel over the Canadian Pacific.

London, April 26.—A revelation of the terms of the agreement made between the German lines of steamers and the shipping combination had led to renewed newspaper attacks upon the British Government. W. J. Pierre, head of the shipbuilding firm of Harland & Wolfe, will meet J. P. Morgan in London to settle the various details connected with the combination, and to prepare a circular for the shareholders of the companies concerned.

SENSATION IN MONTANA

Serious Charges of Misconduct Against a Judge

ARE PROMPTLY RESENTED

Two Attorneys Are Fined and Sent to Jail for Contempt

THE LAWYERS DECLARED THAT THE COURT HAD BEEN UNDULY INFLUENCED BY A WOMAN—MEN RELEASED ON HABEAS CORPUS LAST NIGHT.

BUTTE, Mont., April 26.—A sensation was developed in the hearing of the Minnie Healy mining case today, in Judge Harney's court. The Amalgamated Company made serious charges of misconduct against Judge Harney, declaring the court had been unduly influenced by a woman in the employ of Augustus Heinze.

Judge Harney read the order declaring Attorneys Forbis and Evans, of the Amalgamated Company in contempt of court, fining each \$500, and committing each to the sheriff for imprisonment for 24 hours.

The Men Released.

Helena, Mont., April 26.—Late tonight Chief Justice Brantley signed a writ of habeas corpus, for the release of John Forbis and L. O. Evans, who were adjudged guilty of contempt of court by Judge Harney at Butte.
