

FAST TRAIN IS DERAILED

Passenger Train on the Santa Fe was Ditched

FOUR LIVES WERE LOST

And the Coaches Were Destroyed—The Diner Rolled Over

DETAILS FROM THE GLENROSE, TEXAS, TORNADO SHOW THAT EIGHT PEOPLE WERE KILLED, AND FIFTY-SEVEN INJURED. OTHERS WILL DIE.

KEOKUK, Ia., April 29.—The California limited train on the Atchison, Topeka & Santa Fe Road, eastbound, was derailed at Cama, five miles west of Medilla, Mo., this morning, while going at a high rate of speed. Four persons were killed and twenty-three injured. The killed are:

A. Wertheimer, San Diego, Cal.
Little son of Henry C. Bates, Australia.

Rufus Buster, Chicago, waiter on the dining car.

C. C. Fairbanks, Chicago, waiter, diner.

The injured include Conductor Chas. Sargent and twin sister of the Gates boy. The parents of the twins were also badly bruised.

The train was late and passed Wyconda, the last station west, at a rate of sixty-five miles an hour. When the heavy train struck the curve at Cama the rails spread.

The train consisted of two mail cars, seven Pullmans and a dining car. The mail car, the dining car and first two sleepers went into the ditch. The derailed coaches were smashed into kindling wood.

The conductor went to a farm house and telephoned a report of the wreck, and the railroad officers hurried a relief train from Fort Madison. The place of the wreck is distant from all communication.

Fourteen injured were taken to Fort Madison, the others continuing on their journey. The dining car turned completely over and rolled down a ten foot embankment.

The Texas Tornado.

Dallas, Tex., April 29.—A dispatch from Granbury, Tex., confirms the report of the damage done at Glenrose, by a tornado, yesterday. One additional death—making a total of eight—is reported, and three of the injured will probably die. The revised list of the dead is as follows:

There were fifty-seven persons injured, but with the exception of the three mentioned as fatally hurt, it was thought all will recover.

William Fouts, a farmer, was fatally injured. Three others in the Fouts family were badly hurt.

OREGON BOY'S RECORD

BROWNSVILLE SUSPECTS HELD TO THE CIRCUIT COURT—EVIDENCE IS NOT STRONG.

BROWNSVILLE, April 29.—William O. Tyer and Thomas Vennum were bound over to the Circuit Court today on a charge of robbing the bank of Brownsville yesterday of \$1700. Their bonds were placed at \$2000 each.

The two young men arrested, William O. Tyer and Thomas Vennum, were both raised here, and both belong to good families. The evidence against them at present is not very strong.

BY A FALLING TREE

A YOUNG LADY MEETS DEATH ON THE ROAD NEAR VANCOUVER.

VANCOUVER, Wash., April 29.—Miss Rose Grath, 19 years old, was instantly killed yesterday evening by a falling tree. The young woman's mother was also severely injured. The two women were driving in a buggy when a dead tree was overturned by the wind and fell across the buggy, striking the younger woman's head, breaking her neck.

TAFT TALKS TO STUDENTS

The Water Cure in the Philippine Islands

PRACTICED BY SOLDIERS

Are Exceptional Instances, and Not the Rule in the Army

IN AN ARMY OF SIXTY THOUSAND MEN IT IS TO BE EXPECTED THAT SOME WOULD BE BRUTES WHO WOULD YIELD TO TEMPTATION.

NEW HAVEN, Conn., April 29.—Governor General Taft, of the Philippines, addressed about 700 students, professors and others in the college hall at Yale tonight. With respect to the water cure and other cruelties, Governor Taft said it must be remembered that an army of 40,000 to 60,000 men by reason of guerrilla warfare, had to be divided into 500 posts, many of which were commanded by first and second lieutenants and captains and sometimes by sergeants. Exceptional instances of such abuses might occur without typifying the conduct of the army, which on the whole was considerate toward the natives. It was not to be expected that in an army of 60,000 men there should not be brutes or weak men, who would yield to temptation of arbitrary power.

Spirited Debate.

Washington, April 29.—A spirited discussion of the Philippine situation occurred in the Senate today. It revolved around the order alleged to have been issued by General Jacob H. Smith to make the Island of Samar a "howling wilderness" and to kill all male inhabitants over the age of 10 years. The debate took a wide range and many other points were discussed.

SALES OF PROPERTY

INDEPENDENCE HAS A BOOM IN THE REAL ESTATE BUSINESS. HOUSES SOLD.

INDEPENDENCE, April 29.—More business changes have occurred and more residence property has been sold here the past two weeks than for two years past. The changes mean the bringing in of thousands of dollars by the new purchasers. The fine residence property of Postmaster J. A. Wheeler was sold to A. Quasdorf, a wealthy Iowa farmer, who has gone East to arrange to bring his family here at once; L. C. Gilmore's residence, one of the choicest dwellings in the city, has been sold to D. Davidson, a business man of this city; the E. E. Padlock residence, on Monmouth street, has been purchased by A. Huston, a retired farmer who has moved to the city; Otis Welch has secured the Hartman residence, near the schoolhouse; the Gelwick property, on B street, will be soon occupied by I. Dickinson, the purchaser; the J. R. Baldwin property has been sold to Merritt Tillery, and a number of less important transfers were made. In every instance the sale is made to well-to-do people, who are bringing money in to invest.

A SOLDIER BOY'S LUCK

RETURNED FROM THE PHILIPPINES AND FOUND HIMSELF RICH.

SAN FRANCISCO, April 29.—Back from the war and its hardships to find himself the possessor of unexpected riches, comes Charles R. Rogers, a private in Company H, Twelfth United State Infantry, who arrived in port with his regiment on the transport Grant. For three years Rogers fought for his country in the Philippines, earning a soldier's pay, unconscious all the time that there awaited him in Chicago an estate valued at \$23,000. The property consists of 32 acres of rich land near Fort Sheridan, and was left to Private Rogers by his uncle, George Rogers, a lumber merchant of the Lake Side City. Young Rogers ran away from his Chicago home when he was 14 years old. He received the news of his good fortune in a letter which was awaiting him here from George Presby, a Chicago attorney.

SHAFFER IS ENDORSED

HE REMAINS THE BIG MAN IN THE AMALGAMATED ASSOCIATION.

WHEELING, W. Va., April 29.—It is now practically certain that President Theodore Shaffer is the big man of the Amalgamated Association. Today the Convention, with a few dissenting voices, endorsed his annual report. It is not likely there will be much opposition to Shaffer's election.

The Packers' Trust.

Chicago, April 29.—Tomorrow or the next day the specific status of the proposed action of the Government against the big packers will be laid before Attorney General Knox at Washington. The allegations which the bill will contain have been practically determined upon by District Attorney Bethea. The bill will have to travel to Washington and back before Bethea can act as the character of the evidence is to be submitted to the Attorney General for suggestions.

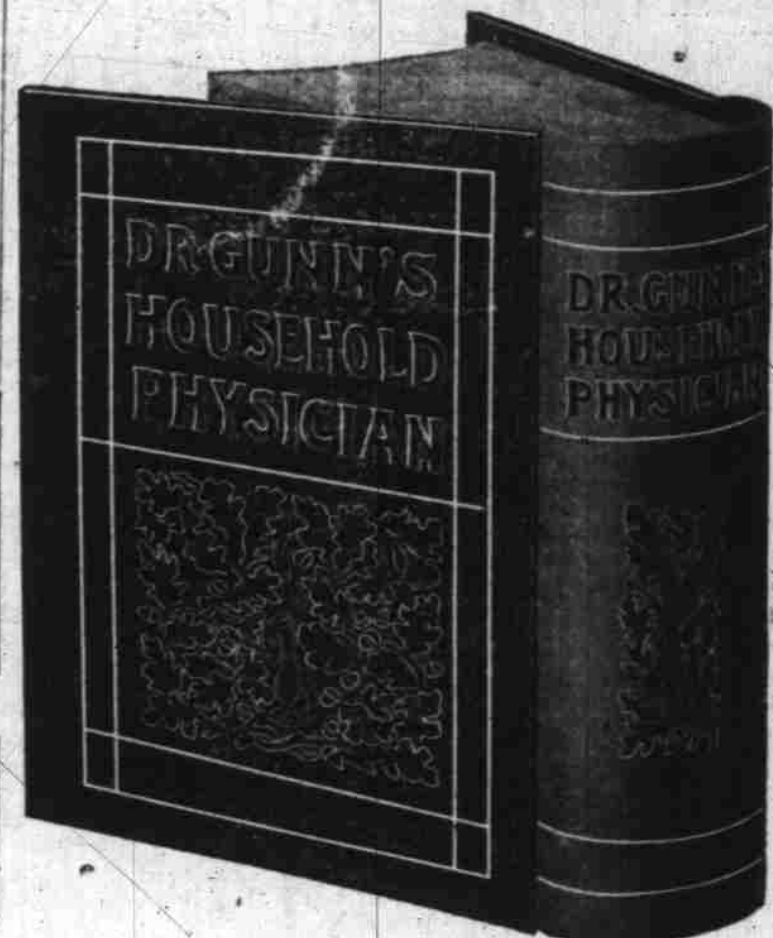

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COOL GARDEN SPOTS.

A glacier, when it dislodges itself and sails away over the Arctic ocean, never travels alone. In the wake of every large one floats a line of smaller companions. The Eskimos call this phenomenon "the duck and ducklings," and any one who has watched the progress of the elder duck followed by her brood will appreciate the aptitude of the name. Strange as it may seem, plants grow and blossom upon these great ice mountains. When a glacier is at rest moss attaches itself to it,

protecting the ice beneath, just as sawdust does. After a time the moss decays and forms a soil, in which the seeds of buttercups and dandelions, brought by the wind, take root and flourish. Those who have travelled in Arctic lands say they have found no point yet where the poppy does not bloom during the brief northern summer.
